

I am confident that this convention will become a memorable memorial to that spirit and the future of Jainism in North America.

 - e) Organizing/coordinating visits of Jain scholars/monks in North America.
 - f) Establishing/serving Jain organizations and/or organizing conferences locally, regionally, nationally or internationally.
 - g) Participating in lectures, discussions and presentations.
 - h) Promoting the Jain principle of caring for the needy in the community at-large.
 - i) Establishing contacts between Jains of North America and the world.

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

Toronto, ON

Over 600 people celebrated Mahavir Jayanti on May 1, 1994 at the Jain Society of Toronto. The program began with Mahavir Pooja, Snatra Pooja, and the singing of stavan. The children of the pathshala recited schlokas and danced. The children put a great deal of effort into the program under the guidance of Kumud Bhimani and Arvind and Meena Shah. The audience was very appreciative. The program concluded with Namokar Mantra, Arti and Mangal Divo. The evening ended with sumptuous dinner sponsored by the families of Om Prakash and Trishala Jain.

The news of Guruji's sudden death reached Toronto within an hour, from our trustee Ramesh Jain, who was in Delhi on April 22, 1994. Mahavir Jayanti celebrations were postponed the same evening and a Shanti Path was conducted for three days at the Jain Centre. The members of the Executive Board and the Board of Trustees asked Ramesh Jain to represent

the Toronto Jain Society at Guruji's funeral. A twelve hour Namokar Mantra Jaap was held in memory of Guruji at the home of Surinder and Subhas Jain on May 8, 1994. The Canadian Council of Hindus paid tribute to Guruji at Ganesh Temple on Saturday May 7, 1994.

The Jain Society of Toronto held their 1994 elections at the end of March. The results were: Gyan Chand Jain, President 1994-96; Jashwant Shah, Vice-President; Arhant Jain, General Secretary; Ramesh Varia, Treasurer. The new Executive Committee is Kumud Bhimani, Ladies Representative and Entertainment; Premal Shah, Youth; Om Prakash Jain, Food; Pritam Mehta, Pathshala; S. Khamesra, Public Relations and Samayak; Bharat Shah, Snatra Pooja and Picnic; Pravin Shah and Anil Vora, Fund Raising. The opening ceremony for the Canadian Regional Office of JAINA was held in February, 1994. After the opening about fifty officers and active members of various Jain organizations attended the Center's Leadership Effectiveness Workshop (CLEW) that was organized by JAINA.

Chicago, IL

The newly elected officers of the Jain Society took office on January 1, 1994. The center has continued to attract people from all over the area. Snatra Pooja and Digambar Pooja are performed every Sunday morning. Sthanakwasi friends come together on the first Sunday of every month for Samayika and the chanting of Namokar Mantra. Shrimad Bhakti is held on the third Sunday of every month in the Jnanmandir. Panchakalyanak and other poojas are performed frequently with the active participation of the ladies from the Mahavir Mahila Mandal. Arti and Mangal Dip are performed every evening in the temple and in the Inanmandir (Temple of Knowledge).

Religion classes began in January. Four separate classes are conducted for children. The classes are based on age and are conducted in accordance with the course outline prescribed for each class. In addition, there is a class for adults with an emphasis on the essence of Jainism. All classes are conducted simultaneously from 11:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon after common prayer which is held from 10:50 to 11:00 a.m. About 100 children and 25 adults have been taking advantage of these classes. A class in Gujarati began in May.

During Chaitri Oli arrangements were made for Ayambils at the center on April, 17 and 23, 1994. More than 150 people observed Ayambil.

The 2592nd birthday of Lord Mahavir was celebrated on April 24, 1994. More than 1,200 people attended. A speaking contest for children was the main part of the program. The theme was the impact of the Jain Center in your life. The thirty children who participated were divided into three age groups. By the manner in which the children expressed this theme, one can state that the Jain Center is going to play a very significant role in preserving Jain heritage. Prizes of \$51, \$31 and \$21 were awarded to the top three participants in each age group. The following children were the recipients:

In addition, \$5 was presented to every participant by Rajendra Shah. The program ended with Arti and Mangal Dip followed by dinner.

On hearing the sad news of the passing away of Acharya Shree Sushil Kumar Ji on April 22, 1994, the center sent a telegram to his Ashram in New Delhi. A resolution to that effect was passed on April 24, 1994. In addition, Kausagga and two minutes silence were observed, praying for the bliss of the departed soul.

More then ninty people participated in observing the 93rd anniversary of Shrimad Rajchandra's Samadhi on May 1, 1994. Followers enthusiastically recited Atmasiddhishastra and chanted the Smaran Mantra. The program concluded with Arti, Mangal Dip and dinner.

A drive was undertaken to collect useable clothing for distribution in India. With the cooperation of the Indiraben Doshi Memorial Trust, 106 parcels of clothes were sent to Baltimore for shipment to India.

Detroit, MI

Mahavir Jayanti was celebrated on April 24, 1994. The program started with Snatra Pooja and concluded with dinner. A dramatic presentation of the Chandanbala story was the highlight of the celebration. There was folk dancing by the youth.

Construction of the temple is proceeding well. The community feels very excited about seeing this plan become a reality.

Prayers, bhajans, religious classes and other programs are held by the Jain Center every month. In February, the program included a video presentation on Buddhism. Albany, NY

The Jain Society of the Capital District celebrated Mahavir Jayanti and the first anniversary of Mahavir Pratistha on May 7, 1994 at the Hindu Temple. Snatra Pooja and Panch Kalyanaka Pooja were performed with *Bhakti Sangeet* (devotional songs) by Vinod Shah of the New Jersey Jain Center followed by a children's program.

Children ages 5 to 18 recited Namokar Mantra, and displayed charts of the eight Karmas, nine Tattvas, five vows and twelve Bhavnas. A Jain Academy Bowl was organized. Two teams were asked 30 questions based on the above mentioned topics. The 150 members who attended were delighted by the performance and encouraged the children with hearty applause. Boston, MA

Ratibhai Dodhia of the Jain Center of Greater Boston has written three books: Primer of Jainism, Levels I, II, and III. These books explain the principles, history and practices of Jainism in simple terms. They are easy to read and would be ideal source material for teaching pathshalas.

The Level I book discusses topics like: Tirthankar Bhagwaans, five auspicious events in life of a Tirthankar, proper conduct, Bhagwaan Adinath, Bhagwaan Mahavir, sense organs, living and non-living. This book is suitable for students ages 6 to 8.

The Level II book discusses history of Jainism, Jain cosmology, substance, gaatis, reality, passions, householder's conduct, non-violence, Paryushan Parva, and Dash-Laxana parva. This book is suitable for students ages 9 to 12.

The Level III book provides an incisive description of topics of bondage and karmas, the three spiritual jewels, salvation, stages of evolution for a householder, themes of meditation, Jain logic, and nonabsolute point of view. Buffalo, NY

The Jain Community of Buffalo was saddened by the sudden death of Acharya Sushil Kumar Ji. Mahavir Jayanti was celebrated at the HCS on Sunday, April 17, 1994. The children recited the meaning of Meri Bhavna in English under the guidance of Jagat Jain. The celebration also included a special pooja by Arihant Jain of Toronto and singing of Jain stavans. Gyan Jain, president of the Jain Society of Toronto, spoke about the unity of the Hindu and Jain communities in Buffalo. The day ended with Swamivatsalya lunch.

Essex Fells, NJ

Many members of the Jain Center of New Jersey (JCNJ) attended a memorial service at Sidhhachalam for Acharya Sushil Kumar Ji to expressed their sorrow at sudden passing away of a great supporter of the JCNJ. The children from the JCNJ pathshala sang a special tribute at this meeting. On April 17 and 23, 1994, many members participated in Aayambil Tapasyas.

Mahavir Jayanti was celebrated on April 24, 1994. Over 100 children participated in performing a pooja dance, singing Jain *stavans* (hymns) and taking part in a drama about Jain philosophy.

On May 8, 1994 about 150 members of JCNJ traveled to Washington, D.C. to visit the Jain Temple in nearby Silver Spring, MD. The Jain Society of Metropolitan Washington (JSMW) graciously hosted our visit and made everyone feel very welcome. Everyone performed Panch Kalayanaka Pooja celebrating the five Kalyanakas of Bhagwaan Parshwanath. The visit strengthened the friendship between our two Jain communities. Hartford, CT

The Jain Center of Greater Hartford celebrated Mahavir Jayanti on April 24, 1994 at the Storrs campus of the University of Connecticut. The program began with observing one minute of silence in memory of Acharya Sushil Kumar Ji. High school students read passages from Samayasara and the Tattavarth Sutra followed by Deva, Shastra Guru, Snatra and Mahavir Poojas, Bhajans and Arti. More than 150 people attended including, students from UConn, families from Connecticut and neighboring states. An entertainment program, which included: folk and individual dances, songs, and a tabla/ sitar recital by Kader Khan and Mushtaq Khan was followed by dinner.

New York, NY

Mahavir Jayanti was celebrated by the Jain Center of America (JCA) on April 24, 1994. It began with Shraddhanjali to Acharya Sushil Kumar Ji. Many Jain Munis, Shramaniji (Samans) and scholars are scheduled to speak at the temple in Queens from now through September.

Syracuse, NY

The Syracuse Jain Center has approximately 13 member families. These families meet once a month for religious and social activities on a Sunday at 4:00 p.m. at the home of a host family.

These get togethers begin with Namokar Mantra. Young people ages 10 to 20 present stories they have written on Jainism. Discussions on Jainism, vegetarian diet and JAINA news are held. Everyone is encouraged to participate. Occasionally a short "test" is given on the principles and rituals of Jainism. The winners are awarded prizes. At the end of the evening dinner is served.

April's meeting was held on the 17th and was dedicated to Mahavir Jayanti. A few members presented stories on the twenty-seven birth cycles of Bhagwaan Mahavir and the fourteen *swapnas* (dreams) of Trishla. 

In early days of Guruji's stay in America, he used a traditional mask (*Muhapatti*), as would any Sthanakvasi monk. Guruji not only cheerfully explained the purpose, but also gave him one of his masks, which delighted Vivek. In the later years, Guruji discontinued the use of the mask, at least in public, because it narrowly identified him as a conservative Sthanakvasi. Similarly, he encouraged establishment of temples, and worked hard to build a beautiful temple at Siddhachalam in New Jersey. These examples demonstrate Guruji's broad based approach and leadership to unite the entire Jain community, regardless of the traditional differences and sub-sects. Guruji provided a great living example of the practice of ANEKANTVAD.

His Holiness Acharya Sushil Kumarji Maharaj, our beloved Guruji, led a spiritual renaissance. His dynamic and spiritual form of leadership opened up new dimension that was concealed under the cobwebs of tradition and inertia. This was the dimension of activism and positivism in Guruji's practice of affirmative Ahimsa. This affirmative and active Ahimsa was indeed the Ahimsa preached and practiced by Lord Mahavir. It was this positive Ahimsa that took Lord Mahavir to Chand Kaishik. This was the Ahimsa of the valiant and fearless. This was the Ahimsa of one who was not prepared to kill but, was certainly prepared to die.

Guruji preached that religion was the spiritual song of the soul. He transcended all divisions and found a common ground in that spiritual song, that one to one relationship of each soul.

Guruji was always in the thick of action. He brought Ahimsa to the battle-ground, where it was needed most. He brought the teachings of Lord Mahavir to a world struggling against strife and war. He came out of India. In doing so, broke all traditions and taboos.

Guruji was an Acharya. Since the days of that great Jain Acharya Hemchandracharya, Guruji was the first Jain Acharya who saw no reason to run away from politics and policies. In this tradition, Guruji concerned himself with action in all fields of life. He brought the Jain religion back to life and to the service of human beings, animals and plants. He was on an ad hoc basis, the defacto Raj Guru for successive governments. Guruji saw beyond

India and began working on the global scale. It was his mission to serve all humanity.

In the past few years my family and I had the good fortune to be able to spend time at the lotus feet of Guruji. Sidhdhachalam became our second home. Indeed, it was our hope that Sidhdhachalam would be our only home. What was there for us at Sidhdhachalam? Thousands of people came there whenever there was a major event, lectures, worship services and many other activities. When these events ended, people returned to their homes and only Guruji and a handful of Ashram devotees remained. The time we spent at Guruji's lotus feet was the most blissful. A time of anand-mangal. I did not ask questions. Indeed, I thought I was not fit to do so! But, there was no need for words. Just being there with Guruji was all that was necessary. In the mornings, Guruji would come to the temple and recite the Mantras. The magnificent Ashram with its glorious temple and divine murtis resonated with the sounds of mantras being chanted in Guruji's ringing voice. The group chanting that followed would fill everyone with bliss and peace. In that moment of spiritual abandonment one could reach into the depths of one's being.

There is no denying that Guruji attained Samadhi on Mahavir Jayanti and although we feel the pain, our faith and confidence remains. Guruji said a name is more than the person. I once told of my inability to seek his blessing, even though I thought about him earnestly. He told me it was the right thing to do and added that whatever he achieved through his meditations was to be found in his name. Many years ago, Guruji did some difficult sadhana. Kirtichandraji Maharaj said that no Jain monk or Acharya did such a rigorous sadhana in the past few centuries. Thus, all that is needed now is Guruji's name and meditation to be able to sit at his lotus feet.

Guruji was self-realized. His knowledge and perception were from within. He was beyond the intellect, books and shastras. There were moments when he would speak about this kind of original knowledge. What is significant is that although Guruji had written books many years ago and was a scholar of the classics and shastras he went well beyond this.

Jain monks are addressed as Maharaj, not because they have given up everything but, because they do not desire anything. In a sense Guruji was truly royal. Kirtichandraji Maharaj used to say light heartedly, "Guruji is holding his durbar." Indeed, Guruji did hold his durbar, on a spiritual throne where he gave everything away. Bliss to everyone! During the 7th World Religions Conference, Guruji recited a couplet in Urdu which describes himself.

"Amiri ki to aisi ki, kii Apna ghar loota baithe! Fakiri ki to aisi ki, kii uhnke gharmen ja baithe!"

For decades, Guruji has dwelled spiritually in the house of the Lord!

Vegetarian of the Year Award



Shantinath Temple

Bombay, India - The controversy over the question of how to deal with the deteriorating condition of the 18th Century,

Shantinath Maharaj Temple, Payadhuni in the heart of Bombay has raised many questions. The temple dedicated to the 16th Tirthanker, was built in 1797 by the philanthropist, Shri Motishah Sheth.

The temple houses some fine examples of 18th Century art work, and inscriptions of the Kalpa Sutra. The artifacts are meanful to the historic and cultural heritage of India.

Several factions wanted to see the temple demolished and rebuilt. However, Gurudev Chitrabhanuji proposed that the temple's *Sabha Mandap* be renovated and only rebuild the *Ghabhara*. Stating that renovation is a nobler solution that embodies "good action" since it follows the principle of *ahimsa*.

School Anniversary

Bhuj, Kutch, India -The Matru Chaya School in Bhuj, Kutch run by the Jain Medical and Educational Trust, celebrated its 20th anniversary. Dr. Dhiraj H. Shah of Buffalo, New York expressed his cooperation to help modernize the school.

Keynote speaker, Gurudev Chitrabhanuji spoke about the school as a blessing because of the important work it does to educate and shape lives of the young students.

In his remarks, he divided the word *jeevan* (life) into three syllables - *jivavu*, meaning to live in the beauty of life; *vadhnvu*, meaning to grow in knowledge, love, peace and prosperity and *namanu*, meaning to be noble and humble. He pointed out that to grow with love and to humbly accept whatever you receive, is the essence of life.

Gurudev Chitrabhanuji stated that nature is a generous giver that does not confine its resources. Likewise, anyone who understands philanthrophy is the true - *Lakshmipati*. According to him poverty is undesireable, but hoarding wealth is worse.

Young Jains International Conference

London, England - For the first time this July there will an international gathering of Jain youth in London, England. Delegates will meet with the aim of adapting Jainism to the 21st Century. Some of the issues on the agenda will include:

- life and activities of Jain youth in various parts of the world.
- practicing Jainism in everyday life.
- the relevance of Jainism to global problems.
- networking with non-Jain organizations,

Greenpeace, vegetarian societies and environmental organizations

Dr. Michael Tobias, one of the United States foremost environmental engineers and the author of *Life Force: the World of Jainism* and Mr. Satish Kumar, a former Jain monk and now one of England's leading environmentalist and editior of *Resurgence*, England's first 'green journal' will be the guest speakers.

Dr. Tobias has challenged the youth to "convey emphatically the possibilities of Jainism in a world sundered by ill-will and suffering." "What stands out in Jainism is its penetrating insights, phenomenal integrity and childlike idealism . . . " Delegates are expected to come from North America, Europe, Africa and Asia. They will have special opportunities to meet and make new friends and participate in workshops that are geared for learning.





JAIN BBS: ACCESSING JAINISM WITH USE OF TECHNOLOGY

A computer-based JAIN Education and Information Bulletin Board SyStem (JAIN BBS) has

mow become available. It makes information about Jainism and commentaries on other world religions readily available at the simple touch of a finger, mainly due to the usage of computer tech-This computer-based nology. electronic system is intended to promote education and provide information about many aspects of Jainism for youth, as well as adults in North America. A personal computer and access to a modem lets the user connect to a wealth of information free of charge. Access to the JAIN BBS can be made available worldwide as many universities and corporations have arrangements for free connection to the Internet system. The JAIN Bulletin Board Service is an educational service co-sponsored by JAINA and the Jain Center of North Carolina to provide information and news about many aspects of Jainism. Currently, the JAIN BBS has all information in English. In the future, we will include materials in Indian languages such as Hindi, Gujarati, and other languages as software in these lanacquired. guages Access to JAIN BBS: Access to the JAIN BBS has expanded significantly to make information rapidly available on a wider scale, and also as freely and economically as possible. There are now four different ways to receive this information. The original and direct access is via a modem connection to the JAIN BBS master database. As this involves long distance phone costs, parts of the database have

been made available via Internet, the second method. This is through a "telnet" access to the JAIN BBS database on the University of North Carolina Sunsite computer data-The third method of disseminating JAIN BBS information is through periodic JAIN BBS E-mail Bulletins. Subscription to the email service is free. For those individuals not having email access, a fourth method has now become available. The JAIN BBS E-mail Bulletins will now be sent by telefax (Fax). Subscription to the Fax service is US \$12 per year or US \$100 for a lifetime subscription.


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
