

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#### LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor:

I am the desperate mother of a 14 year old son who has leukemia. The only cure for him is a bone marrow transplant. With a good matching bone marrow transplant, he will be cured of the leukemia, otherwise he could die.

For the past five months, we have called hundreds of people to organize bone marrow drives in their city's temples or other functions. We have been only moderately successful in organizing bone marrow drives, but we have yet to find any matching bone marrow for my son. We are exhausted, frustrated and very scared.

Since we are Indians and Jain, the possibility of finding a match is higher among Jains and Indians. Even within the Indian population, the odds are one in 100,000 of finding a perfect match. On the National Marrow Donor Program (NMDP) there are only about 6,000 Indians registered. We need to increase the number of Indians in a NMDP registry to save some lives.

To organize a bone marrow drive call one of the numbers below or call us at 217/787-7739 and we will help you set up a drive. The NMDP staff would come to your function, party or Puja and take blood samples from prticipants in bone marrow drive. The result of your blood test is entered into the National Registry. When a person needs a bone marrow transplant, they contact the National Registry who in turn contacts you (if your bone marrow matches) asking for your bone marrow. Giving bone marrow is not dangerous or very painful. Through a simple surgical procedure (usually as an outpatient) blood is drawn from your bone marrow, from the hip and not the spine. Your body regenerates that blood within a week. The donor would experience some soreness for two to three days but that is all. In return, you are SAVING THE LIFE of a child or a person desperately in need. You are giving a mother back her son! How can we go wrong in doing this? How can we not do it? Is this not what our religion is all about?

Bone marrow is a gift of life. Please give. I am appealing to all your readers to organize a bone marrow drive in your city or temple. Even if you have organized a drive in the past, every new person who registers has a potential to save my son's life; so please help organize a bone marrow drive — big or small. I hope and pray that no other parents have to go through what we are going through right now. This would help save my son's life.

# SHREE BIDADA SARVODAYA TRUST 1.6 MILLIAON PATIENTS TREATED IN 26 YEARS

The 26<sup>th</sup> Medical camp was organized from January 3 to 17, 2000 covering 18 medical specialties. 15,573 patients were treated, 2,314 patients went for special investigations or operations, 101 patients were referred to Mumbai for major surgeries. Trust extended the medical activity in Atmavallabh Hospital, Idar, Gujarat, and plan to continue every year.

Urologist Dr. Manibhai Mehta from CA inaugurated the camp and it was sponsored by Radiologist Dr. Naresh Shah from Wilkesbare, PA. 53 volunteers and donors from America participated in the camp including 9 doctors and 5 resident doctors.

England's Deputy High Commissioner, Mr. Michael Bates inaugurated the cardiac and rheumatic heart camp, which was sponsored by Jain Center of Southern California and JAINA.

Highlight of the camp was a major surgery of a 7 year old Manjula for a 10 pound tumor in the abdomen. The girl was operated by Dr. Ila Meisheri, Dr. Rashik Shah, Asst. Dr. Bela Chheda (USA), and Team of Medical people.

#### PARLIAMENT OF THE WORLD'S RELIGIONS

The Third Parliament of the World's Religions was held in Cape Town, South Africa from Dec. 1<sup>st</sup> to 8<sup>th</sup>, 1999. There can not be a better selection of site like Cape Town, a location where two oceans, the Atlantic, and Indian meet. A location, which has historical significance of uniting west and east since Vacso-De-Gama in 1548, found the sea route to travel from Europe to India. While the world is becoming a global village, there cannot be a better choice than Cape Town where the process of globalization began, way back in the 15<sup>th</sup> century.

More than 3000 delegates from all over the world representing Christians, Jewish, Hindu, Buddhist, Muslim Bahai, Sikh, Zoroastrian and Jain religion attended the Parliament. There were 32 Jain delegates from all over the world including India, North America, U.K., and Kenya. The 'JAIN' delegation was coordinated by Nemu Chandaria of the 'Institute of Jainology', U.K. JAINA was represented by immediate past presidents, Dhiraj Shah, Manibhai Mehta, and Pravin and Aarati Shah of Raleigh, NC, Narendra Shah and Vijay Shah of Atlanta, GA, Savita Mehta of LA and C.A. Patel of Gaithersburg, MD.

Jain speakers included Dr. L.M. Singhvi, Dr. N.P. Jain, Mr. Niraj Jain, Sadhvi Shilapiji, Dr. Kumarpal Desai, Dr. Vinod Kapashi, Dr. Sohanlal Gandhi, and Mr.Pravin Shah. Gurudev Chitrabhanu's lecture was read by Dr. N.P. Jain in the absence of Gurudev, because of his health.

The conference covered a wide variety of subjects including discussions on the environment, health, non-violence, global understanding, earth charter, and different faith traditions.

The Parliament was held at very appropriate time when "Today there is a broad and deep movement towards openness, goo'dwill, and warm-hearted and loving engagement among religious and spiritual communities around the world. Sustained encounters between people of different religious, spiritual and cultural traditions have created heightened momentum towards actualizing our many visions of a better world as well as stronger possibilities for establishing ethical common ground. New awareness and shared ethical principles opens the way into a new era of creative engagement, where we find and implement new modes of outreach, cooperation, and constructive common action, not only among the world's religions but among all of the world's guiding institutions." The Parliament ended on positive note. Anglican Archbishop Ndungane called for a New World order that puts people ahead of profit.

#### RITUALS OR A NEW SPIRITUAL AWAKENING

Today we are very proud as Jain community to have Jain centers in every state and in every metropolitan area, thanks to the vision of JAINA and visionary leaders like Gurudev Chitrabhanu and Acharya Sushilkumarji.

As we are on the threshold of the new millenium, we may stop to do some soul searching to reflect on what is our purpose on earth, whom am I, what is my true form, and how can I fulfill my dreams spiritually, socially, emotionally, economically and be worthy to my fellow Jain brothers and sisters. We need to examine our inner soul to answer some questions. For example, we as Jain community are spending millions of dollars and countless years of devoted effort to build very valuable Jain centers and beautiful Jain temples all over America. Are we making good use of those centers for the benefit of Jain community? Are we advancing spiritually every year? Or are we falling into power struggle and routine rituals with irrational faith?

According to the most respected Jain texts, Tatvarthsutra, the main objective of this human life is to attain self realization by devoting major portion of our time to study of the scriptures.

It says

Samyag darshan gnana charitrani mokshmargah tattvartha shraddhanam samyagdarshanam

(Tattvartha Sutra- Acharya Umaswati)

In other words, first we must prepare ourselves to study the Jain philosophy including the properties of soul and matter, theory of karma, and perform all our activities in such a way that it allows us to grow spiritually. This would only happen if we change our course of religious practices from simplistic rituals to study of scriptures and self introspection.

Let us examine typical activities of a Jain temple. It mainly consists of conducting monthly pujas, Mahavir Jayanti celebrations, Paryushana activities with big event being the Swapana Darshan and Diwali and New Year Manglik jap. If we take the percentage of time and effort we spend in temples, it appears like almost 75% of our activities are mostly ritualistic, which also includes playing of dandiya raas and gheeboli. In performing these rituals, we seem to ignore the real purpose of the pujas. Various pujas, such as Snatra or Antray Karma Nivaran were designed by great Jain acharyas with a depth of spiritual meaning. Unfortunately, they are performed as means of social entertainment with major emphasis on mundane aspects of how well we are dressed up to stand up with a divo or how fast we can recite them.

Does it not seem like we have been following the rituals blindfolded without giving much thought to spiritual meaning of each puja or event? Do we want to spend valuable time in simply rituals or do we really want a true spiritual awakening? Great Jain teacher Srimad Rajchandra cautions us on overly ritualistic activity in Atmasiddhi Sastra as follows:

Koi kriya jad thai rahya, shushkagnanma koi maane marag mokshano karuna upaje joi

(AtamasiddhiShastra-Shrimad Rajchandra)

Following seven point program would allow our generation to understand the purpose of rituals and begin a new journey to spiritual awakening in the new millenium.

- Change the emphasis of our temple activities from ritualistic and entertainment events into spiritual activities stressing more on Swadhyay, meditation and reading of scriptures.
- Schedule puja events with emphasis on understanding the meaning of each verse of the puja away from the current accent on how well we sing or be entertained by music.
- Invite local Jain scholars from different centers to conduct truly spiritual Shibirs and Swadhyay activities year round. We need not depend upon four months of "scholars imported from India". Summer activities to transform us from ritualistic society into a spiritually oriented Jain community. There is plenty of talent in America; let us utilize it and appreciate it.
- Use some of the gheeboli funds and donations to help needy Jain families, battered women and children, and set up funds for Jain scholarships on merit basis for youngsters in North America. We need to stay in touch with the community in North America.
- Develop keen interest among all Jain families to devote at least one hour every day at home to read Jain scriptures regularly. This habit can transform a ritualistic mind into a spiritual person in due time.
- Each family should make a habit of involving all the family members in a religious discussion at home on a regular basis. When children are young it is the best time to get them interested in family worship. Remember the saying "the family that prays together stays together".
- Encourage youngsters to participate in all temple activities by being good role model and organizing special events for them. Time that we invest in our children to have them understand our religion will benefit us all. Let us strive to make Jain community thrive spiritually.

#### JIV DAYA COMMITTEE

Jiv Daya Committee supports a large (4,000 children) school in Maharashtra and have "a *sponsor a child*" program. Over 200 children are sponsored by U. S. residents. Listed are some of the acitivities of Jiv Daya Committee:

- 1) AHIMSA with only 4 active volunteers, have networked with hundreds of animal right groups to educate general public on the plight of animals in the USA. We are networking with many groups to stop the killing of healthy innocent animals at animal controls and shelters. We encourage and educate the public to spray and neuter their pets so unwanted animals will not be killed.
- 2) In the name of Jiv Daya and Ahimsa, we have dedicated the Dharma Donkey Sanctuary at a school in Maharashtra and this sanctuary will be used to not only care for sick and abused and aged donkeys but to educate 30 surrounding villagers on care and kindess to animals. \$1800 was raised from Jains last year and that money was used to drill the water wells and create natural fencing for this sanctuary. So far the 145 acres of land, the spray and neuter clinic, sterilization clinic for people, health clinic, computer center etc. have been funded by us personally and 2 computers donated by the Indian Lions Club of Dallas.
- 3) At least 12 Jain families are sponsoring needy children annually.
- 4) We invite the local Jain Temple youth groups to visit our 30 acre sanctuary and learn more about the animals who live here with us and educated them about the needs of all animals and how they can help. We try to involve them to do work with their local humane societies.
- 5) Our presence at many Jain temple meetings makes people ware of the needs of animals.
- 6) By working with PFA of India and represent them in the USA we are starting a program where any Jain family can donate money via Jiv Daya committee and earmark it for anywhere in India their native village or city. We can guarantee that the money will be delivered via PFA and us to someone who will use it to help animals. They will hear directly from that person and be assured that every rupee of their money is being used properly.
- 7) Our other accomplishment is education. We have been preaching to Jain groups in both India and U.S. that giving money to panjrapoles in India is a total waste of money. Instead we ask them to give money to Jiv Daya so the money is used for the animals. The vast majority of panjrapoles do not provide proper veternary care for the animals. They do not sterilize and so more animals are born into miserable coniditons in the panjrapoles.

Without placing monetary value on time and efforts of the volunteers, it costs about \$40,000 per year to publish four issues of Jain Digest and send to every family in North America and Jain Sanghs abroad free of charge.

The JAINA has created an endowment fund for this purpose. So far \$60,000 has been collected in this fund. More than 500 Jain families have contributed \$101 (tax deductible) by becoming a life member of Jain Digest. The principal of endowment fund is never used to support Jain Digest, only the interest income is taken out every year to support Jain Digest. At the moment it amounts to about \$4000 per year. Advertisements bring about another \$6000 per year leaving \$30,000 deficit per year.

JAINA is committed to continue quarterly publication of Jain Digest with the help from generous donors. It is essential for all of us to become life members of Jain Digest, by contributing tax deductible donations of \$101. It will assure all of us and our future generations to continue to receive Jain Digest.

The Dubai group discussed with him their plans for a place of worship where they will install a statue of Mahavir.

The visit to Muscat was truly memorable as well. The local Jain Community took the initiative for organizing events which involved a number of public lectures that attracted Jains, Hindus, Sikhs and all others. The visit was made possible by the efforts of B.S. Mehta and Dileep Mehta among others. Gurudev praised the achievements of the community and counseled them about the need for spreading compassion and fostering brotherhood/sisterhood in this haven of peace.

Visit to Nairobi:Gurudev Shri Chitrabhanuji and Pramodaben visited Nairobi on the 16th anniversary of the Muni Suvrat Swamy Temple – a magnificent and unique replica of the Jain Delwara Temple in Mount Abu. The temple's setting is impressive and has been an inspiration because of its multifaceted activities. The temple complex was first initiated in 1971 with guidance of Guruji. In the footsteps of the spectacularly successful first ever JAINA pilgrimage of October 98 covering Samet Sikhar and nearby Tirths, JAINA executive committee created a Pilgrimage committee with the responsibility to organize at least one pilgrimage every year. This time, Dr. Dhiraj Shah suggested to cover Tirthdhams of Rajasthan and Gujarat, hence a preliminary itinerary JAINA YATRA 2000 - was distributed at JAINA convention in Philadelphia.

Kiritbhai proposed a medical camp in Palitana for Sadhus and Sadhvis for the two days we were planning to be there. Our Yatris will have opportunity to perform a fundamental duty of Shravaks and Shravikas- serving our Sadhus and Sadhvis.

The third aspect of this Yatra was visiting some Jain institutions along the way to observe how Jainism is practised. To this end, we chose to visit a Pathshala, a Panjarapol, couple of Poostak Bhandars, a research institute, a hospital run by a Jain charitable trust, couple of ashrams, a Jain primary school and a Jain art museum. We also planned to meet with local Jain communities through local chapters of Jain Social Groups. Thus began a stream of letters, faxes, phone calls and e-mails making contacts in India and selection of travel agents, contractors for land arrangements, hotels, dharmsalas etc. We entrusted Metro Travel of Eslin, NJ to arrange air travel to and from India and flights within India. Meena Shah of Metro Travel also helped with details of the itinerary and she was so committed to the success of the yatra that she also traveled with us all the way to Udaipur just to make sure that all the air travel went smoothly.

Altogether 84 Yatris registered from many different states. Our youngest Yatri was 22 year old and few in their sixties and up. We had a good mix of all the different sects fairly represented. Our Sangh looked like a true delegation of JAINA.

Offers of help came from many sides. As they had done last time, Jit and Manda Turakhia donated special Yatra 2000 badges

with colorful ribbons for Yatris for easy identification. Dr. Jaya Shah from Cleveland gathered cartons of surplus medical supplies (syringes, I.V. insertion kits etc.) from area hospitals for donations to Orissa relief program and other hospitals. Gurudev Chitrabhanu offered to come to the Bombay airport, at the beginning of the Yatra for Manglik Vanchan. Navkar Sarvar Kendra of Ahemdabad agreed to hold the medical camp in Palitana for Sadhus and Sadhvis. They also provided musical group for couple of evenings for Bhakti Geets. Federation of Jain Social Groups in Bombay requested their chapters in the cities we were going to be to help us in any way they can. We got warm cooperation from every organization we contacted.

Day of departure January 18 was a beautiful day (We dodged a brutal snow storm on the east coast by a whisker). At the New York JFK terminal, many prominent members of New York Sangh along with the newly elected President Dr. Sumtibhai Shah came to bid ceremonial send off. Arrival in Bombay was uneventful except the customs- We did not have sufficient paperwork for the medical supplies we were carrying in 7 huge cartons but in the end, after 4 hours of negotiations, cooler heads prevailed and our precious cargo was permitted to go through. During this time another Air India flight from Chicago with 30 Yatris arrived and we all proceeded to the domestic airport for flight to Udaipur.

Two of our Yatris, Dr Kantibhai Shah of Oklahoma and Dr. Anil Shah of Chicago, veterans of the Samet Sikhar Yatra agreed once again to serve as medical officers for the Sangh. Dr. Anil Shah also served as one of the 6 group leaders. Other group leaders were - Kirit Daftary of TX, Madhukar Mehta of NC, Keerti Shah of Chicago and Sevanti Shah of Phoenix, AZ. These leaders and their wives worked hard to look after Yatris and assured smooth functioning of the Sangh. Anil Shah of NJ was appointed as the treasurer for our Sangh. He and his wife Hemlata disbursed donations to temples and other institutions in the name of JAINA from the special Yatra fund created with voluntary contributions of Yatris. From Bombay we had purchased sets of Poojapo (Traditional offering of Snatra Pooja Samagris, saffron, new pooja clothes etc. to temples from visiting Sanghs as an effort to replace temple items used by Yatris). Chandrakant and Bhanuben Shah of NY took charge of distribution of these items at each temple.

On the morning of 20th January, we reached Udaipur and settled in a country style hotel with cottages. This was designated as a day of rest but instead, in the evening, Yatris took the opportunity to visit the City Palace, a lake and a temple of Shri Padmanabh who will be the first Tirthankara of the next Chauvisi. A special Yatra souvenir prepared by Diptiben Shah of Bombay with information on all the Tirths, maps and Stavans was distributed to the Yatris and it proved to be very useful at every juncture

in the Yatra. At night a special musical group from Ahemdabad arrived for a spiritually uplifting singing of Bhakti geets.

We divided Yatris into 6 groups of 14 Yatris each with a team leader. We started next morning in 3 air-conditioned luxury buses for Kesariyaji temple. Shri Adinath temple in Kesariyaji is over 600 years old but the black idol is believed to be from the era of Shri Munisuvratswami. This town is the Dhuleva Mandap town we sing in Aarti. Traditionally people (Jains and Non Jains) offer lots of Kesar (saffron) and as a result, the temple is known as Kesariyaji. After Darshan and Pooja, we proceeded to Ranakpur.

It was a night of full moon and at 8:30 the temple had just closed. It would take at least an hour before we could get rooms but our Yatris were not disheartened in any way. Outside the temple they all set down on the floor and under the moonlight enhanced the quiet of the serene atmosphere with the sounds of Bhaktamar Stotra and other Bhakti Geets. There was no doubt that this Yatra was going to be a spiritual extravaganza. Next morning Yatris were in the temple before 7:00 A.M. for Darshan and recitation of Bhaktamar Stotra. Splendor of Ranakpur temple at sunrise slowly sank into yetis. The architecture for which Ranakpur temple is most famous is amazing — the 1444 carved marble pillars designed in such a way that from any given point in any direction you look, one of the idols is visible.

Jodhpur was our next stop. The long bus trip was made bearable by group singing and chanting in the buses. We settled in a hotel for the night and next morning visited a 250 year old Parswanath temple on a lake. Inside the compound in front of Padmavati Devi, we all sat down to listen to Dr. Jwala and Aruna Prasad of Cincinnati, as they recited stotras and narrated story of Jindattcharaya of Humcha. Together they also sang Padmavati Stuti in Sanskrit in a beautiful melody. This was a very moving scene. Many of us, not familiar with south Indian languages are not aware of how deep rooted Jainism is in the southern part of India. Learning from each other is an added bonus of a Sangh Yatra and this was a very good example of how JAINA is bringing Jains of all stripes together. Yatris were developing new bonds with others on their bus and in anticipation of reaching Jaisalmer that night smiles were all over. On the way, we visited Osianji temple and Falodi. Luckily for us, the hotel in Jaisalmer where we were to spend two nights was a beautiful fort like complex just recently opened for the tourists. After breakfast early next morning we proceeded to the fort and the temple.

The tour guide at the Chintamani Parswanath temple was very knowledgeable and he explained some of the fundamentals of Jain Moorti Shastra and temple construction particularly the 12 dancing Devis in the Rangmandap. In the next temple, he pointed out a carving in the size of a rice grain of a temple and an idol within. We saw stone carving of Jain cosmology and many more salient features and also visited the Poostak Bhandar underneath the temple. - a true treasure of ancient Jain manuscripts. Because of the special arrangements made on our behalf, three

trustees of the Jaisalmer Teeth were present to provide a rare access to the inner sanctum of the vault. This is where most of the manuscripts are carefully guarded in steel cabinets and aluminum boxes of various sizes customized for the size of manuscripts. A small window at the bottom of the floor is the only entrance to the wall and one has to crawl to enter. But rewards of the effort to get there were immediate and immense. We also saw a mysterious pillar containing hidden knowledge believed to be waiting for appropriate person (Yug Purush) to come and for whom the pillar will open and the knowledge will be bestowed upon him.

After coming down from the steps of the fort and the emotional high, we visited Patwa Haveli - world famous tourist attraction with exquisite stone carvings that take your breath away. In the evening, we went to Thar Desert. Unlike other tourists, we did not ride the camels but instead hired the camels just to walk with us or take pictures with. On couple of sand dunes Yatris watched the sunset and contemplated on the very uplifting day that had just ended.

Back at the hotel, with dinner we were entertained by Rajasthani folk singers and dancers. Next morning we went to Amarsagar for Darshan and Lodravaar for Darshan and Pooja of Sahastrafeni Parswanath. After lunch before we started long journey to Nakodaji, everyone posed for one group photograph in front of the hotel. To foster friendship between Yatris, half the Yatris changed buses to meet new people.

On our way to Nakodaji, we stopped at three temples of Badnasar for Darshan and dinner and arrived at Nakodaji Dharmasala late at night. Next morning on January 26, after darshan and pooja at Nakodaji, few of us went to a local school for flag hoisting ceremony. Shanti Niketan School, run by a Jain Trust was a very gracious host to our Sangh and kids presented variety entertainment program filled with such items as Yoga demonstration, patriotic songs and regional dances. We all joined kids on stage singing "Saare Jahan Se Achha Hindustan Hamara". Some of our yatris wanted to donate funds to the school but were politely turned down.

On the way to Mt. Abu we stopped near Jhalore where a new Shantinath temple in the shape of a Ship is being built. From there we went to Bramanwada where Bhagwan Mahavir had Upsarga - nails driven through his ears. We saw the mini Samet Sikharji and reached Mt. Abu late at night.

Morning was reserved for visit to the Adinath temple at Delwara. The world famous artistry and carvings in marble spell-binds you eternally with dreams of white marble clouds journeying you to salvation. From the Delwara temples we went to Adinath temple at Achalgadh. In the evening we went to the sunset point, a very prominent tourist spot and Nakhi lake.

On the way to Ider next morning we stopped in a small town near Vadali where a new Tirth is being built to install 23 of the many idols unearthed from Samprati Maharaj time. In Ider we first stopped at Atmavallabha hospital run by a Jain trust. A warm reception at the gate of the hospital was arranged and we entered the compound singing "Maitri Bhavnu Pavitra Jharnu". We presented a carton of medical supplies and doctors among the Yatris took a tour of the hospital. In the lobby of the hospital we saw a huge sign on the wall acknowledging donations from JAINA and Jain Centers of Chicago, New York and New Jersey.

In the afternoon we went to Shrimad Rajchandra's ashram on a small hill. Shantibhai Kothari gave a very inspired talk about Shrimad's teachings. Yatris spent some time meditating and listening to one Sadhu. Some of the yatris visited Ider Gadh - Shri Shantinath temple established by Samprati Maharaja. On the way to Mehsana from Ider, although not on our itinerary, we took a chance to visit Mahudi. But it was not to be, the temple had just closed and disappointed we proceeded to Mehsana.

The Water Park hotel outside Mehsana complex was one of the best accommodations during the Yatra. We visited Shri Simandherswamy temple for Darshan and pooja and Choumukhi Adinath temple. In the same temple complex, there were some Sadhus and we paid our respects. The local Jain Social group had arranged a reception and refreshments for the Yatris.

In the afternoon we visited Yashovijay Jain Sanskrit Pathshala. Here students live and study Jain scriptures for four to six years. Most Pathshala teachers in India are graduates of this school. North American Jain community is familiar with Pandit Dhirajlal who is a former student of this institution. We were so mesmerized by the talk given by a young student that we invited the entire student body to our hotel at night for more interaction with them. From the Yatra fund, we donated Rs25,000 for sponsoring a student for full four years. This inspired three others among us to sponsor one student each and raised enough money for a fifth student.

In the evening we visited Linch Mahajan Panjarapol. Many Yatris confessed to have never seen a panjrapol before. Jain principle of Karuna for all living beings is practiced in these institutions that run entirely by charity. This Panjarapol just outside Mehsana is in a poor town. Harsh weather of last two years have put this Panjrapol in financial straps. That night after dinner at the hotel, the Jain Social Group of Mehsana had arranged a Bhavna program at the hotel. We were lucky to have Jain Social Group's support in various cities as they helped with logistics, emergency medical help and smoothing our paths.

Next morning we proceeded to the 1200 years old Panchasar Parswanath Temple in Patan. This 52 Jinalay temple was last rebuilt in 1955. This is one of the 108 Parswanath Tirth and Just out side the temple is the Gyan Mandir of Kalikal Sarvagna Shri Hemchandracharya. Patan Jain Mandal had kindly arranged for a very knowledgeable scholar to show the rich collection of old manuscripts and artifacts. Some of our Yatris spent four hours in this revered house of knowledge. In the afternoon we went

sightseeing. Ranki Vaav - a well with seven story stone carving was awe-inspiring. Patan is most famous for Patola weavers of Patan. This is a vanishing art as there are only 5 families that are still producing Patolas and one has to order them three to six months ahead as each Patola takes three months of weaving.

From Patan we started for Sankheswara and arrived at the Dharmasala late at night. Darshan and Pooja at the main temple was eagerly awaited by many Yatris. Individually, Yatris also went to Agam Mandir and 108 Parswanath temple. At the 108 Parswanath temple, Acharya Labdhisuri Maharaj was present. The temple was celebrating completion of his 50th year of monkhood. An exhibition of books and musical Pooja in the Rangmandap was added bonus to the Yatris.

We started for Palitana that afternoon and the six hour Journey became a ten-hour affair. We reached Palitana Dharmasala at two in the morning. Most did not retire until 3:30 A.M. but Pahad Yatra early that morning was not something anyone was going to miss. Mysteriously, every one was energized and present in Dada's Darbar for Pooja and Darshan. Also at 9:00 am in Palitana, 2-day JAINA Medical Camp with help of Navkar Sarvar Kendra was inaugurated. Bharatbhai Kothari, the 70 year old leader of Navkar Sarvar Kendra was present for the inauguration of Medical camp although that day was his birthday. Instead of celebrating his birthday with his grand children, he spent that day and the next in service of the cause he has championed. Many items like tiger balm, magnifying plastic sheets, cotton socks, kamblis etc. were distributed to the Sadhus and Sadhvis as they were also examined by Vaidrajs. Only Ayurvedic medicines that are also acceptable to Jains is carried by the Navkar Sarvar Kendra. Many of our Yatris got to meet and talk with our holy Sadhu/Sadhvis in the bhakti atmosphere. This was quite a learning experience as well as rewarding one to the Yatris.

At night we had a Bhavna Geet program arranged by Navkar Sarvar Kendra and during that program, the Yatris thanked the 46 member staff of Patni tours for wonderful food and service provided during the yatra. Each staff member was called by name, applauded and handed an envelope with cash as further sign of gratitude. Dr. Kantibhai Shah, in celebration of his birthday distributed a book by Shri Anandghanji to all the yatris and Navkar Sarvar Kendra gave a two volume set on Tirthdhams to each Yatri families. Kirit Daftrary and his wife Pramilaben also presented a check for \$7,000 from the Tirthodhdhar committee of JAINA to Navkar Sarvar Kendra.

After a good night's sleep, next morning was free for yatris to visit other temples in Palitana and after lunch we started towards Ahemdabad. Our first stop was Songadh where beautiful temple complex with a model of Nandi Dwip and Shri Kanji Swami's Ashram is located. Next, we stopped at Bagodra, where a 12' Pratima of Parswanath is installed in what one day will be a mini Samet Sikhar Tirth. The last stop of the day was Koba. Al-

though we were one hour late arriving Koba, Shri Atmanandji addressed the assembly and gave his blessings. They had also made very comfortable arrangements for night stay of all the yatris and the Patni's staff.

In the morning, the last day of our yatra, once again the Yatris got to hear Atmanandji as he participated in Bhav Pooja. Next door to the Ashram stands a beautiful temple, Jain art exhibition and Poostak Bhandar. Koba is commendable job of cataloging old manuscripts of other Poostak Bhandars like that of Jaisalmer and Patan in the country. Their plan is to copy the material digitally for preservation and world wide distribution. It would be a fitting memory of this Sangh to fund latest equipment (Scanners, computers and a CD burner) so that our Jain heritage is preserved for the future generations.

From Koba, we proceeded to Tapovan. The serene atmosphere in this Jain Boarding School for about 350 students is a sight to behold. A neat and clean establishment with a Goshala, beautiful temple, and learning halls with names like Nalanda. Bright young boys Veer Sainiks of tomorrow in their white uniforms won hearts of the yatris. We saw their computer class room and noticed many of their computers were so old that they could not load Windows on them and students were using WordStar for word processing! Outside the classrooms Yatris raised within minutes enough money to buy one Pentium II based computer. We also donated money to sponsor one student for full four years. Students presented an inspiring program on the stage and as we left Tapovan with the feeling that institutions like Tapovan will assure bright future for Jainism.

This last day was now looking like a very long day. By the afternoon as we reached Hathesingh Temple everyone was tired. Yatris Rashmikant and Bakula Jhaveri sponsored the lunch and that did revitalize us. A small ceremony was held to thank 11 member Patani family who had made all of our travel arrangements. Our Sangh's resident poet, Ila Mehta of Ohio dished out a very moving poetry praising their efforts and expressing feelings of the Yatris. They fed us wonderful meals, took care of us and arranged 15 day Yatra very comfortably, not just as customers but as though we were members of their family. We presented a JAINA plaque of "Excellence in Service" to them. Tears were on many faces as every one realized that yatra 2000 was about to end, and separation from newly acquired friends was inevitable.

Our last stop was L D institute of Indology. Jain art exhibition at the institute could not possibly be seen or enjoyed in the couple of hours we had on hand. Lalit Kumar, curator of the museum was so knowledgeable and so giving that the Yatris felt guilty rushing out to the library and the research facility next door. Again, time was short but the elderly gentleman at the library patiently showed how they were preserving the old manuscripts and showed some old writings on palm leaves.

The Yatra was now complete. Conscious efforts and goodwill of all the yatris to achieve something great did result in 18/JAIN DIGEST-SPRING 2000

a memorable experience of a lifetime. The success of the yatra was also a result of excellent teamwork of the group leaders.

After dinner at a restaurant, many stayed behind in Ahemdabad and others took train to Bombay. Soon planning for the 2001 Yatra will have to begin.

#### SAMANS VISIT USA AND AFRICA

Saman Sthitpragya and Saman Ashwanipragya, disciples of Anuvrat Anusashta Acharyashri Mahapragya, successfully completed a six-month tour of USA and Africa. After a three-month stay in USA, Samans left on a tour of several African countries that included Nigeria, South Africa, Mauritius, Harare, Tanzania, Kenya and Dubai. In Nigeria, the Samans presented lectures on Stress Management and Preksha Meditation to the Nigerians. A 5-book set by Gurudev Shri Chitrabhanu

For the new millennium the elder Jain master - Gurudev Chitrabhanu - has bottled the keys to enlightenment in this set of five books, a foundation for all seekers of truth, the basic principles of Jainism and inner happiness. In his characteristic clear English and succinct examples, he has distilled very complex subjects into a readable delight.

Twelve Facets of Reality: is "Shant Sudharas Sagar" of Mahopadhyaya Vinayvijayji- 12 Bhavnas in capsule form. This book is the preface to his immortal song "Maitri Bhavnu Pavitra Jhurnu". If you like the song, you will love this book. The concepts of Anitya, Asharan, Aashrava, Nirjara, Nitya, etc. routinely take thousands of words and a great deal of contemplation but the Gurudev has magically converted them into twelve facets of the most precious of gems – Mukti.

Realize What You Are: is a collection of instructions given by Gurudev on the fundamentals of Jain Meditation: a primer for a 5-week meditation course. This step by step approach for the uninitiated is heaven-sent. He describes meditation not as a religion but as a means of learning the art of living, growing and communicating. As a first step, he has prescribed 24 minutes a day for practice. For those whose life is so busy that they cannot find one minute out of every hour of the day for themselves, he has just these words: "Reorder your priorities!" After a few preliminary matters of selecting the time and space for meditation, the book quickly gets down to the serious business on hand and soon the reader will be chanting Veerum and Sohum. The book goes on to philosophy of meditation and its role in our daily lives. He asserts that meditation will improve your communication skills and you will be at peace with yourself.

The Psychology of Enlightenment: advances his meditation instructions, dealing with each of the seven centers of energy corresponding to seven levels of awareness from which we can begin to discern our true nature. 
