

JAINS MADE HISTORY IN THE U.S. CONGRESS

Jains of North America made history on May 22, 2001 when Gurudev Chitrabhanuji delivered the opening prayer in the House of Representative in celebration of 2600th birth anniversary of Lord Mahavir. For the first time in the history of the United States of America, Jainism and Jains of North America received this unprecedented recognition and honor of delivering a prayer in the US House of Representative. The cover photograph was taken on the steps of the Capital Building after this historic event.

After the prayer, congressman Frank Pallone, Jr. of New Jer-

sey, the sponsor of the event, paid tributes to the Jain philosophy of non-violence and to the Jain community in North America for organizing this event. He Stated "Jains all around the world celebrated the 2600th Birth Anniversary of Lord Mahavir, the last of the revered 24 Jinas who spread the Jain message. I guess you could say, in a way, Lord Mahavir was ahead of his times, once proclaiming that all human beings are equal whether male or female, rich or poor. The Jain religion, which places heavy emphasis on personal and societal non-violence in

thoughts, speech and actions, has flourished in India for over 3500 years". He congratulated Dr. Sushil Jain for organizing, and thanked House Chaplain Coughlin for allowing Jains the opportunity to celebrate the Jain spirit on the House floor.

The prayer was delivered in English in accordance with the rules for the prayer in the congress. It started with "Let us all join our hands, heads and hearts together and bow to all perfect and liberated souls, and to all spiritual teachers" and ended with trans-

lation of Shivamastu "May the entire universe attain bliss. May all beings be interested in one another's well being. May all faults be eliminated. May people be happy everywhere. Om Shanti! Shanti! Shanti!".

Over 140 delegates of Jain community from all over USA and Canada along with the representatives from Indian Embassy witnessed this momentous event from the Gallery of the House of Representatives. Among the delegates were Shree Manak Muniji, current President of JAINA, Dr. Mahendra Pandya, accompanied by all the past presidents of JAINA (Drs. Manoj Dharamsi, Tansukh Salgia, Sulekh Jain, Jagat Jain, Manibhai Mehta, and Dhiraj Shah), Jain Center Presidents and other Jain dignitaries. The day before, the Jain Society of Metropolitan Washington, D.C. held a reception at the Jain Center in honor of all the out of town visiting dignitaries.

After the ceremonies, Congressman Frank Pallone held a reception for all the delegates of Jain community. Father Daniel Coughlin, Chaplain for the House also participated in the reception, and thanked the Jain community for taking the initiative. JAINA representatives also presented a set of books on Jainism to Congressman Pallone, Chaplain Coughlin and their staff. Following the reception, a senior staff member of Congressman Pallone also gave an extensive tour of the Capitol Buildings to all Jain


delegates who attended the prayer.

A group of JAINA Delegates met with Senator Hillary Rodham Clinton of New York to follow-up on the invitation to be the Chief Guest at the 11th Biennial JAINA convention. Senator Clinton expressed a strong desire to accept the invitation. This delegation also met with Senator George Voinovich of Ohio to co-sponsor similar prayer in the US Senate some-

later this year.

This landmark event was initiated and guided by Dr. Sushil Jain, Chairman of the JAINA Public Affairs Council and Dr. Manoj Dharamsi, Chairman of the 2600th Birth Anniversary Celebrations of Lord Mahavir.

The Prime Minister released *Vardhman*, a book on Jainism and the constitution of the World Jain Confederation. The Prime Minister and the other speakers spoke of relevance of Mahavir's message of Ahimsa and Anekantwad in the world today.

PRATISHTHA IN MILWAUKEE

A small community of less than 30 Jain families in Milwaukee now has a Jain temple of their own. Under the banner of Jain Religion Center of Wisconsin, they have come together and have completed a temple adjacent to the Hindu Temple. The temple now has three beautiful Pratimajis of Lord Mahavira (37"), Parswanth (33") and Adinath Bhagwan (33"), specially carved from top quality Makrana Marble.

For three days this past Memorial Day weekend, Jains from all over the United States and India celebrated "Pratishtha Mahotsav" in a traditional manner. Pandit Nirmal Doshi from Mumbai and Shri Devendrakeerty Bhattarakji conducted the Pratishtha ceremonies. Sadhavi Shri Shubhamji of Veerayatan and Saman Shrutpragyaji and Sthitpragyaji of Ladnun also graced the occasion and provided spiritual discourses. Three large video screens were set up in various halls on the campus to make sure that all present were able to participate in all of the Pujas and rituals. Saturday evening's performance of the musical drama Nem Rajul attracted a crowd of record size. The weather Sunday morning started out cold and rainy but at the time of 108 Kalash Rath Yatra the skies cleared and the sun came out, making the sight of the procession truly heart warming. The highlight of the day was the actual pratishtha at 11.31 A.M. The welcoming of the lords in the murtis' final positions sparked spontaneous dancing and singing. All present had tears of joy in their eyes. The atmosphere was filled with singing, dancing and the celebratory ringing of the bell. Faith and emotions had overwhelmed the entire crowd of about 1,000 devotees. The evening's Raja Kumarpal Aarti of 108 divas with a band and dancing procession was another emotional experience for the entire congregation. Many claimed that they

> had a religious experience of a lifetime during this event. A program of Bhajans and Dandia Ras concluded this remarkable day in Wisconsin for Jains.

> Everyone that attended the pratishtha walked away with renewed enthusiasm in his or her belief in Jainism. Many out of town guests said they are now encouraged to build temples in other cities in the United States. For local adults and children these experiences strengthened their faith in the Jain religion and brought it closer to their hearts.

JAINA EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETS IN CHICAGO

The Executive Committee of JAINA held its meeting on March 31, 2001 at the Temple in Bartlett, IL.

The following items were discussed at this meeting:

- The meeting was opened with the recitation of Namokar Mantra.
- JAINA President Mahendra Pandya was unable to attend the meeting due to health problems. In his absence Bipin Parikh, First Vice President, JAINA chaired the meeting and welcomed the Executive Committee members, Convention Board members and other guests.
- Bipin Parikh and Vinay Vakani, Secretary, JAINA stated that Mahendra Pandya had been hospitalized in India and wished him a quick recovery. All attendees expressed the same sentiments.
- Vinay Vakani read the minutes of the meeting held on September 30, 2000 at Siddhachalam. The following items were discussed prior to approving the minutes:
- 1. Dhiraj Shah raised a question regarding the discussion at Siddhachalam that all JAINA Committee Chairpersons should do the disbursement of the funds after review by the Executive Committee. He stated that individual committee traditionally disbursed the funds raised by the committee and did not see need for informing the Executive Committee about this matter. Vinay Vakani stated that all funds raised by various committees were received in the name of JAINA. It was therefore appropriate and prudent that JAINA Executive Committee was apprised (not specifically seeking an approval) of disbursement of the funds. Anop Vora, Treasurer, JAINA stated that he felt comfortable with the current arrangement and did not see the need for informing the Executive Committee. Since there was no resolution adopted on this issue at Sidhhachalam meeting, it was decided to delete the reference to this subject from the minutes.
- 2. The Minutes of the Meeting inadvertently omitted to record the resolution that was adopted at Sidhhachalam meeting that elected Rajiv Pandya as the chairman of the Calendar Committee. The resolution was adopted at the time of splitting the Education Committee into various committees. This omission was discovered while discussing the funds needed for JAINA's deficit for the year. For the record, Rajiv Pandya is the duly appointed chairman of the Calendar Committee.

The minutes of the meeting were approved with above two amendments.

- Bipin Parikh, the acting President, presented the following President's Report:
- The celebration of Bhagwan Mahavir's 2600th Janma Kalyanak (Birth Anniversary) will be a focal point of the JAINA Convention.

- On April 6th, 2001, there will be a program on 2600th Birth Anniversary in New Delhi and JAINA will be represented. Dhiraj Shah whould represent JAINA as a member of the Executive Committee.
- JAINA calendar was very well received by our community. Rajiv Pandya is already working on the 2002 calendar.
- Gujarat earthquake relief work is going on well. Some of the JAINA members had already visited the affected area.
- April 7th, 2001 is the last day for sending the names of Board of Directors for 2001 to Vinay Jain, Chairman, Nomination and Election Committee.
- The First Vice President of JAINA traditionally acts as the chairman of the Award Committee. Though he would like to stay on the committee, because of other responsibilities he proposed to include Chandrakant Mehta from New Jersey as a member. Executive Committee approved the proposal. Award nomination details went out with the JAINA Convention flyer- first two award are one each and the remaining number would be decided later.
- Anop Vora presented the Treasurer's report. He pointed out that JAINA did not have sufficient funds in General Fund. He proposed to take \$20,000 out of Calendar and Booksource Committee's account. According to Anop Vora, Calendar and Booksource Committee has a balance of \$45,000 and it needs only \$20,000 to publish calendars. It was reasoned that when people send money to JAINA in response to calendar they are really supporting JAINA and not just the Calendar Committee's effort. So it should be acceptable to take the money from Calendar Committee's account. Anop Vora also proposed to get \$10,000 from JAINA Charitable trust.

Dhiraj Shah suggested that just as Jain Digest is a JAINA project we should make calendar also a JAINA project. This way any donation received against the calendar will go to JAINA General Fund.

Vinay Vakani stated that it is totally inappropriate to take money from the Calendar and Booksource Committee without first discussing it with the committee chairman. In light of previous discussion on disbursement of funds by the committee chairpersons, it is only proper to follow the same guidelines. He proposed that Bipin Parikh should talk this over with Mahendra Pandya, and both of them approach Rajiv Pandya to obtain his views on this matter.

Dilip Shah suggested that the general practice of JAINA should be to request the committee for money and not take away directly as these committees raise money for their own use. Manibhai Mehta's suggestion was to send a Jain Digest registration form along with the calendar, so that we can increase the Jain Digest registration.

Kishore Shah suggested that JAINA General Fund should charge some amount to each committee for administrative expenses. This way we can build the JAINA general funds.

It was decided that Bipin Parikh should discuss the matter with Rajiv Pandya. It was also agreed to request JAINA charitable trust to give \$10,000 for operating expenses of JAINA.

Dilip Shah put forth a proposal to make Jain Digest self-supporting by selling the advertisement space in Jain digest. To achieve this, he proposed that the Executive Committee should create a marketing manager's position. The marketing manager will compile the demographics of Jain Digest readers and present that information to companies to get their advertisement. This will create a continuous stream of revenue, which will support the publication of the Jain Digest.

Lata Champsee, liked the idea of making Jain digest self-sufficient. However, she felt that advertising fee would have to be between \$500- \$1000 for a page and there should be guidelines for the kind of ads we publish.

Vinay Vakani expressed skepticism about treating the Jain Digest as an advertising tool- like a for-profit publication. He also asked whether JAINA – as non-profit organization – could sell advertising space.

Bipin Parikh proposed Samprati Shah as marketing manager for Jain Digest. Dilip Shah suggested that Executive Committee should create an Editorial Board (at present there is an Editorial Board that will be dismantled) that can respond to the readers and the advertisers in a coordinated manner.

It was decided to establish a Managerial Board for the Jain Digest, which will comprise of Editor-in-Chief, marketing manager and circulation manager. It was also agreed that Editor-in-Chief would act as the chairperson of this board.

• JAINA Patrons: JAINA should deliver all the services and privileges to the Patrons as promised. Bipin Parikh assured that steps have been taken on this issue for 2001 Convention to avoid the past mistakes. The Patrons will be given lapel pin and the preferred seating at the opening ceremony, cultural programs, etc. JAINA Committee Reports:

• YJA Committee: Chintan Shah reported that YJA have elected 4 new members to the YJA Board during their January meeting. They also started 7 new projects. They have started a project to involve more youths in voluntary activities at the local level. YJA was involved in collecting and shipping much needed supplies for the victims of the earthquake.

They have also started a project nicknamed Adinath to upgrade and enhance their website. The website will be more interactive and will also feature online Pathshala. To celebrate the 2600th Birth Anniversary of Bhagwan Mahavir, YJA has created a play depicting the 27 lives of Bhagwan Mahavir. The play will be performed at various Jain Centers throughout North America. They requested donation for this effort.

He also mentioned that they had planned 5 regional conferences over Thanksgiving weekend last year out of which 3 took place. The conferences were self-supported by the attendees and no money from YJA was spent on it.

Shama Khandwala mentioned that YJA have started a project to update their membership database. She also mentioned YJA website has all the information about the projects that they are working on for 2002 YJA convention. The bids are being accepted from different cities to host the convention. So far one bid has been received. YJA is involved in the Chicago Convention

YJA is also in contact with young Jains in UK, Singapore, and Japan to have more open communication.

Anop Vora suggested to YJA members that they collect all the accounting information within 3 months after the YJA convention and submit it to JAINA Treasurer. This will make the accounting easier. Bipin Parikh suggested that all committees including YJA use accounting guidelines set by JAINA.

- Mahavir Memorial Committee: On behalf of Mahavir Memorial Committee, Sushil Jain reported on the efforts that are being made to kickoff the North American celebration of 2600th Janma Kalyanak of Bhagwan Mahavir. He stated that the committee had prepared a flyer narrating the history and the tenets of Jainism, and the life of Bhagwan Mahavir. This is for distribution to Jains as well as non-Jains while kicking off our celebration.
- Education Committee: Pravin Shah (NC), Chairman of the Education Committee reported that he had contacted the Pathshala coordinators and Pathshala teachers to obtain their input in developing the plans for future activities. The committee will set up a website that will allow all Pathshalas to communicate with each other. Starting in May 2001, he wants to start a 2-day class on Jainism for the Executive Committee members as well as other adults. There will be \$50 fee that will cover food and lodging. If there is good response to this offer, he plans to continue this program every month.
- Website Committee: Girish Shah, Chairman of the Website Committee is planning to have 7 members to work on setting up the website and other IT infrastructure. The committee will have a sub-committee involved in fund raising to support the IT projects. There will also be a sub-committee that will manage the content to be published on the website. Vinay Vakani asked about the advisability of publishing the phone numbers, e-mail addresses and other personal data about the JAINA volunteers. Girish Shah also expressed his concern about this matter and promised to look into the potential problems.

HEADQUARTERS NEWS....

• Media Watch and Public Relations Committee: Sushil Jain, Chairman of the Media Watch and Public Relations Committee informed the attendees that Jain prayers would be recited in the upcoming session of the United States House of Representatives and the Senate on May 22, 2001. For the first time in the history of the United States of America, Jainism and Jains will receive this unprecedented recognition and honor. Bipin Parikh and Vinay Vakani enthusiastically commended the achievements of the committee and all present applauded. (See details on this historic event and committee report else where in this issue)

Sushil Jain proposed to change the name of JAINA Media Watch to JAINA Public Affairs Council because the term council would have a lot more impact during press briefings. The Executive Committee members approved the proposal.

- Jain Digest Membership Committee: Keerti Shah, Chairman of the membership Committee stated that more Jain Digest members were added since last year. He suggested that it would be good if we could make it a requirement that new directors become life members of Jain digest. He also suggested that all Jain Centers should take the opportunity of Mahavir Jayanti celebration to start the drive to increase Jain Digest membership. Kirit Daftary suggested that the life membership should be increased to \$201 from \$101. Dhiraj Shah suggested increasing the life membership fee to \$151fee starting July 2001. No decision was made. Keerti Shah mentioned that currently some people get multiple copies of the Jain Digest. This needs to be corrected. Veerendra Shah (CA) volunteered to correct this problem for his Jain Center.
- Pilgrimage Committee: Dilip Shah, Chairman of the Pilgrimage Committee reported on the last pilgrimage to Sammet Shikhar. During this pilgrimage, they visited 75 Kalyanaks in 15 days. The details of the pilgrimage are published in the Spring Issue of the Jain Digest. Next year the pilgrimage will include a visit to Shatrunjaya (Palitana), Girnar and Kutch around the same time and for approximately the same cost as this year. Reference material on JAINA was distributed to Jain centers in India to familiarize them with JAINA and its activities.
- Tirthoddhar Committee: Kirit Daftary, Chairman of the Tirthoddhar Committee talked about the visit to Lachwad during the pilgrimage. A local school that is in complete disrepair was promised to be rehabilitated. The committee has made arrangement Veerayatan to manage the work and the committee will finance it. Veerayatan is building a new eye hospital in Lachwad.
- World Community Service: Dhiraj Shah presented a report on behalf of the Committee. He informed that JAINA has participated with Bhartiya Jain Sangh in setting up schools in earthquake affected areas. JAINA has so far raised \$300,000 in donations. The largest donation of \$100,000 came from the Jain Cen-

ter of America, New York. A total of 500 families have contributed out of which 22 are Jain Centers. Some of the Jain Centers have given donations for specific projects. There are two additional projects- (1) Community Health Center and (2) First Aid Center- that needs funding. If any Jain Center is interested, they need to donate at least \$25,000. Government of Gujarat is likely support these projects in terms of providing land. JAINA plans to sponsor 250 pre-fabricated houses. The houses will be donated based on approved criteria. JAINA has already donated half the money required to build a school in Samakhyani. The committee has also donated to take care of 600 people who were taking shelter in Samakhyani. When Dhiraj Shah went to Gujarat, he took along with him 5000 blankets, 10000 food packets, 10000 mineral water bottles, 1000 torches, and 30000 lbs. of clothes. The second container carrying essentials is on the way to Gujarat. He has also sent 100 wheelchairs, 72 crutches and 18 canes. We still need \$100,000 in donations. The names of the donors are available on www.jaina.org website.

Veerendra Shah of Los Angeles Jain Center gave an update on the relief activity that they carried out to help the victims of the earthquake. He informed the Executive Committee that \$350,000 were collected in the form of donations and 11 containers of essential supplies were sent. He mentioned, he had gathered a lot of information on relief work and was willing to share it.

• New Committee: Kirit Daftary proposed a new committee called Book Depot. As per his proposal, the committee will sell books to any individual. The books could be sold at the Convention. Also people can order books for Prabhavna distributions and Gift certificates will also be available. The book depot will work on no profit no loss basis. Currently two publishers in India have agreed to supply books. Girish Shah suggested the name of the committee should be Book Store instead of Book Depot.

Pravin Shah suggested when we sell the books through bookstore, we should ask for donations, because if you sell anything, you have to pay sales tax and that will become very complicated. Instead we can ask for donations. There were others who expressed concern about JAINA selling books (or other artifacts).

The Executive Committee approved the formation of new Book Depot Committee and Rohit Doshi was selected as the chairman of this committee.

• JAINA Convention Board: The Executive Committee was briefed on the activities planned for the July Convention by various individuals involved in those activities.

Vinay Vakani recited the prayer "Khamemi Savva Jeeve..." and the Meeting was adjourned.

THE LIFE OF VIRCHAND RAGHAVJI GANDHI

Mr. Pravin K. Shah, New York, NY



V R Gandhi 1864-1901

2001 is the Death Centenary Year of first Jain ever landed on American soil Shri Virchand Raghavji Gandhi. He came more than one hundred years ago to attend the first Parliament of World Religions, in 1893 in Chicago, to represent Jain religion, at the age of 29. Shrimad Acharya Vijayanand Suri (Atmanandji) was invited to at-

tend. But being Jain monk, he could not. So Jain Association of India selected him. He attended it in traditional Kathiawadi costume wearing dhoti, kurta, golden bordered turban(paghdi), white shawl on his shoulder and pointed shoes. To commemorate the centenary of his great historical visit and honor him, Chicago Jain Center had installed his statue at the temple in 1995. JAINA has also established a scholarship in his name.

Shri Virchand Gandhi was born at Mahuva, Gujarat on Aug. 25, 1864.He was a great exponent of Indian culture, religion and philosophy as well as a brilliant scholar of Jainism. He was a great patriot and humanitarian too. He mastered fourteen languages. He was the first Jain graduate of Bombay University in 1884 at the age of 20.He was the first elected secretary of Jain associations of India, in 1885 at the age of 21.He was also the first Jain Barrister qualified in London.

IN INDIA: He represented Jains at "Dharma Mohotsav," held at Ajmer, in 1895 and received gold medal. He founded Hemchandracharya Institution, in India. He fought and won in closing down proposed animal fat manufacturing plant at Sametshikhar and in abolishing Poll-Tax levied on Jain Pilgrims at Shatrunjaya amid lots of risks, including his own life. Sametshikhar at that time was in Bengal and all documents were in Bengali. He stayed in Calcutta for 6 months to learn Bengali to study documents. He not only won the Sametshikhar case but proved in the High Court that Sametshikhar belonged to Jains only.

IN THE WEST: He delivered about 535 speeches on Jainism, which received wide publications. He spoke as a Jain, but as Indian first. He illustrated the specific Jain Code Of Conduct, Jain way of life, non-violence, Anekantvad and Karma philosophy and convinced people about Jain religion as a rational and authentic religion. His approach was the most non- sectarian. He also gave lectures on Vedanta and Budhdhism.

He had an impartial ideology. He had a deep knowledge of all world religions. He criticized none (of the religions). He defended Hindu religion when Christian missionaries attacked it. He was awarded a silver medal. Many literary and spiritual institutions, churches, societies honored him and accorded him warm welcome. Many people thought though he was a household man and not a monk, can expound so well how capable his Guru was to whom he represented. Swami Vivekanand in his letters praised his (VRG's) life style and work.

He talked about economics and political freedom of India well before five decades of India becoming independent. His speeches echoed the true spirit, culture, and perspective of India. He tried to corrected the false, twisted and perverse impression of India.

When he was in USA in 1897, India was engulfed in worst famine. He arranged whole ship loads of food grains and forty thousand rupees. He had established a relief committee, under the chairmanship of Mr. C.C. Bonney, then president of Parliament of World Religions. He had also visited England, France, Germany, etc. and gave lectures about Jainism there. Thousands of his followers became Jains under his influence and performed Jain rituals and became vegetarians. One of them, English gentleman, Herbert Warren wrote books about Jainism.

VRG had founded the following organizations in the West.

- 1. "Gandhi Philosophical Society" in Washington.
- 2. "Society For the Education of Women In India", in Chicago.
- 3. School of the Oriental Philosophy.
- 4. "Jain Literature Society" in London.

ASPIRATIONS AND EARLY DEMISE:

Several Jains in India opposed his travel to the West sailing seas. Every time he returned from the West, they boycotted him, but prominent Jains and nonJains, dignitaries like Premchand Raichand and Mahadeo Govind Rande, Chief Justice, welcomed and felicitated him.

His lifetime ambition was to serve Jain Community and spread Lord Mahavir's message of universal love and nonviolence, across the world. But this young promising man, full of hopes and aspirations, died at the young age of thirty seven on Aug. 7 1901 within a few months of his return from the West of short illness, caused by weather, exhaustion of three long journeys to the West since 1893. The Jain Community mourned his death and kept their businesses closed for five days. His short life span was full of multifarious achievements. He lived and died for the cause of Jainism. It is unfortunate that Jains did not continue his unfinished work.

Year 2001 is his death centenary year and we should make every effort to achieve his lifetime goal. We, Jains, owe him too much for his service to our community. It is our humble duty to leave no stone unturned to revive his memory and accomplish his unfinished work.

SHRI VIRCHAND RAGHAVJI GANDHI'S CONTRIBUTION TO JAINISM

Certain personalities leave indelible footprints on the sands of time, their legacy is not affected by the constantly revolving wheel of time.

At the World Religions Conference held in Chicago, U. S. A., over a century ago, America, and the west, for the first time, heard the determined, spirited, resonant voice of ancient India, and the message of Indian philosophy and culture. Two Indian delegates participating at this conference awakened the western world to the spiritual heritage of India. One of these was Swami Vivekanand whose success in the World Religions Conference of Chicago is fresh in everyone's memory today. But the contribution of another Indian delegate to the same Conference, Shri Virchand Raghavji Gandhi, the representative of the Jain religion, has a claim to equal attention by virtue of the success he achieved at the Conference and also by his work as a religious thinker.

Hundred years ago in 1893, more than three thousand delegates of different nations and religions had assembled at the conference. The conference was inaugurated on 11th September, 1893, and Virchand Gandhi, Swami Vivekanand, P. C. Majumdar and other eminent scholars from India were present as distinguished participants. The aim of this religious conference was to impart to the world the knowledge of different religions and to promote a feeling of fraternity between followers of diverse religious persuasion, and so to pave the way for world peace.

Virchand Gandhi, a young man of twenty-nine, impressed the delegates not only by his eloquence, but also by the sheer weight of his scholarship. He wore a long and loose kurta, a white shawl on his shoulder, a golden-bordered Kathiawadi turban and country shoes. This external appearance bore the imprint of India. The scholarship, the impartiality of outlook and the oratorical skill of this man fascinated the delegates at the conference of World Religions. An American newspaper wrote, "of all Eastern scholars it was this youth whose lecture of Jain faith and conduct was listened to with the interest engaging the greatest attention."

Virchand Gandhi talked about the doctrines of Jainism in such a coherent manner that some newspapers published the text of his lecture in full. He had a most effective way of handling the otherwise abstruse terminology of Jainism. He had an extraordinary ability to clarify his statements in a consistent and logical manner. As he expounded his views, he would give his own interpretations of some of the most difficult points. His lectures demonstrated the fact that the study of Sanskrit and Prakrit alone was not enough for a proper understanding and exposition of Indian philosophy; it was also necessary to assimilate and to realise India's past culture in its proper context. Virchand Gandhi had realised the cultural context and that is why he was never dogmatic; he

spoke as a Jain and yet he often took sides with Hindus but above all, he always spoke as an Indian.

At the conference Virchand Gandhi made a brief but striking presentation on the fundamentals of the Jain religion. He expounded the Jain religion in two of its main aspects, namely, Jain philosophy and the Jain way of life. He elucidated the nine elements, the six types of Jivas, the subtle strands of thought in Jain philosophy regarding Dravyarthik and Paryayarthi-kanaya, the Syadvad and other philosophical aspects which fascinated all. He illustrated the specific Jain code of conduct, the Jain way of life and explained the cardinal principles of Jain cosmology, comparing it with Buddhism and other religions. He also established the fact that Jainism is older than Buddhism. His discourses convinced the elite of America of the fact that the Jain religion has an authentic and rational religious tradition. Expressing his joy about this new knowledge, an American gentlemen gave his opinion about Virchand Gandhi in these words:

"In this religious gathering a number of philosophers, preachers and scholars came from India and delivered lectures and each one of them presented a new perspective and presented a new element so as to convince that their religion ranks high with great religions of the world, moreover, their oratory and devotion presented distinct types and were full of wisdom and contemplation. Among them was an outstanding young man of Jain religion who gave new ideas about morality and philosophy. Though he is only a house-holder and not a monk or religious preacher, he can expound so well. Who must then be his gurus? His simple but striking philosophy of life is worth knowing, worth understanding."

Another special characteristic of Virchand Raghavji Gandhi's lectures on the Jain religion was that they did not deal in criticism of other religions. Free from sectarian preferences and prejudices, his impartial ideology is an apt expression of the Jain who practices Ahimsa in life and Anekanta in thoughts. His lectures were marked by a fusion of natural sentiments, profound study, and genuine enthusiasm. The lectures served to educate the American society regarding the salient features of Indian culture. Virchand Raghavji Gandhi is the author of The 'Yoga Philosophy', 'The Jain Philosophy' and other books of which 'The Karma Philosophy' may be regarded as his best contribution. In discussing the Jain doctrine of Karma in the book, the author reveals his profound devotion to studies and his awakened and discerning religious sentiments.

Virchand Gandhi was not only a philosophical thinker but he also had the welfare of the nation at heart. There prevailed in America the belief that India was a country of tigers, serpents, magicians and the Kings. Chirstian missionaries also presented to

foreign countries a missionaries also presented to foreign countries a distorted picture of the people in India. Virchand Gandhi made as great an effort as Vivekanand did to give to the people abroad the true perspective on India. Explaining the importance of Indian culture to foreigners, he said, "It is an astonishing fact that foreigners have been constantly attacking India and face that foreigners have been constantly attacking India and in the face of all these aggressions the soul of India has stood vital and watchful. Her conduct and religion are safe and the whole world looks at India with a steady gaze."

"Cultural distinctions, art, artistic skill, literature, good conduct, means of knowledge and science, hospitality, feminism, love and respect – all these are found in India in quite a different form. If that culture was purchasable, England could have purchased it, adopted it. But it has not happened, it cannot happen."

As early as in 1893 Virchand Gandhi talked of the economic and political freedom of India. He said to the American people :

"India is at present under the foreign hell. She is independent in the field of religion but when India will be free, she will not invade any country in a violent manner."

Virchand Gandhi had a rare ability to see beyond the immediately visible world. He could see beyond this world, he could know the future. Even before the dawn of political independence, Virchand Gandhi had foreseen the proper role of India.

"If India becomes free, she will live in political co-operation with all countries." Five decades before the independence of India, Virchand Gandhi had the prophetic sense; he said in his lecture of 'The Jain Philosophy' – "You know my brothers and sisters, that we are not an independent nation. We are subjects of Her Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria" the 'defender of the faith', but if we are a nation in all that name implies with our own government and our own rulers, with our laws and institutions controlled by us free and independent, I affirm that we should seek to establish and forever maintain peaceful relations with all the nations of the world."

Virchand Gandhi made such a great impact that the conveners and scholars of the conference of world religions awarded a silver medal to him. Subsequently on 8th August 1894 the citizens of Kasadova awarded a gold medal to him. In this city he delivered a lecture on 'Some mistakes corrected.' The newspaper, 'Buffalo Courier', records the immense success of the lecture. In America Virchand Gandhi founded two institutions namely, 'The Gandhi Philosophical Society' and 'The School of Oriental Philosophy'. In Chicago he founded an institution namely 'Society for the Education of Women of India.' The secretary of this institution was Mrs. Howard who had adopted pure vegetarianism and other codes of conduct of Jainism under the influence of Virchand Gandhi. As sister Nivedita became Swami Vivekananda's

disciple, so Mrs. Howard became Virchand Gandhi's disciple and like Jain she practised Samayika.

Later, Virchand Gandhi went to England, where he fulfilled his desire to be a barrister but he did not use this training for monetary gain. Considering the curiosity for Jainism in England, he started a coaching class. Later he founded the 'Jain Literature Society' in London. Herbert Warren, a religious enthusiast, abandoned non-vegetarianism and adopted the Jain religion. He took notes of Virchand Gandhi's lectures and wrote in English a book on the Jain religion. Moreover, Charles C. Bonny, the President of the Conference of world religions, was impressed by him. At the time of the famine of 1896-97 in India, Mr. Bonny was the president of the Famine Relief Committee founded in America by Virchand Gandhi. This committee immediately sent to India forty thousand Rupees and a steamer full of corn. During this travel Virchand Gandhi delivered as many as 535 lectures. He had the command of fourteen languages including Gujarati, Hindi, Bengali, English, Sanskrit and French.

Thus a young man of twenty-nine, preached religion in foreign countries in the face of opposition from his own community who objected to travel abroad. He toured abroad three times to spread the message of Jain Philosophy and he was equally a spokesman of Indian Philosophy.

The short life span of Virchand Raghavji Gandhi is full of multifarious achievements. He was the first graduate of the Jain society to get his BA with Hons. in 1884. When his father died in 1890, he did not allow the primitive practices of wailing and breast-beating during mourning. At the age of twenty-one, as the secretary of 'Shri Jain Association of India', he worked for the abolition of poll-tax levied on pilgrims to Palitana.

Annoyed by poll-tax and other forms of harassment, the Anandji Kalyanji firm had filed a suit against the ruler of Palitana. But Sursinghji, the ruler (Thakor) of Palitana, was a right-hand man of the Political Agent. The Political Agent did not give fair justice. Virchand Gandhi took up the problem. In those days to protest against the dictates of the ruler was to invite severe punishment and even death. He often went up form Mahuva to Palitana and prepared the ground for compromise. He met Lord Ray, the governor of Bombay, and Colonel Watson, the Political Agent and made a strong representation and eventually forced the abolition of the poll-tax. An Englishman set up at Mt. Sametshikhar, a place of pilgrimage in Bihar, a factory for extracting pig's fat on order. Virchand Gandhi went all the way to Calcutta to have the work on the project stopped. He stayed in Calcutta for six months studying the papers regarding the case and learnt the Bengali language and ultimately got this verdict issued.

"Sametshikhar is a place of Jain pilgrimage and nobody else has any right to interfere there." He did not give up his fight until

SHRI VIRCHAND R. GANDHI'S LITERATURE

Shri Virchand Gandhi was a brilliant scholar of Jainism and a great exponent of Indian culture. His speeches at the first parliament of world religion conference in Chicago echoed the true spirit of Jainism and true culture of India. He spoke as a Jain but forcefully defended Hinduism from the attack of Westerners at the Parliament. Above all, he was first Indian then Jain.

He was the only the Jain representing Jainism at the first parliament of world religions held in Chicago in 1893. After the conference he stayed about two years in the USA and delivered more than 535 lectures on Jainism, Yoga, Indian systems of philosophy, Indian culture, occultism, and spiritualism at various institutions.

Virchand Gandhi talked about the doctrines of Jainism in such a coherent manner that some newspapers published the text of his lectures in full. He had a most effective way of handling the otherwise difficult terminology of Jainism. He had an extraordinary ability to clarify his statements in a consistent and logical manner. At the conference, he made a brief but striking presentation on the fundamentals of the Jain religion. He expounded the main aspect of the Jain religion namely: Jain philosophy, Jain way of life, and Jain code of conduct.

The following is the list of publications that summarizes his lectures and articles that were compiled and published either by him or by others after his death.

1. The Jaina Philosophy

His lectures on Jain philosophy, logic, and anekantwad have been published in a book named 'The Jaina Philosophy'. The book was compiled by Shri Bhagu F. Karbhari and published by Shri Agamodaya Samit, Bombay in 1910. In these lectures he made the Jaina positions comprehensible to a non-Jain and non-Indian audience. His approach was most non-sectarian and rational. He explained the following basic topics of Jainism in his lectures;

Shaddravya Six substances of the universe

Navatatva Nine principles covering philosophy of karma and path of liberation

Chargati Four states of existence

Panchavrata Five great and small vows of conduct

Moksha Ultimate state of soul when liberated from karma

Nyayavad Assertion of truth from a particular point of view

Anekanthavad Principle of Jain Philosophy, which explains that truth should be viewed from all different point of views.

2. The Karma Philosophy

His lectures on the Jaina theory of Karma have also been published in a book 'The Karma Philosophy'. The book was com-

piled by Shri Bhagu F. Karbhari and published by Shri Agamodaya Samit, Bombay in 1913. All Indian religions agree that each action entails its fruit or its result; none can escape the consequences of one's own actions. This fundamental idea on which the doctrine of Karma is based holds crucial importance in the development of ethical thoughts of ancient Indians. The Jaina version of it is illuminating in more ways than one.

V. Glasenapp, a well-known German scholar on Jainism, wrote his doctoral dissertation on the Jaina doctrine of Karma; and acknowledged Gandhi's lectures as his sole influence. Even today, these lectures remain unsurpassed and serve as an independent source of enlightenment on the subject.

3. The Systems of Indian Philosophy

His lectures on the various systems of Indian philosophy have been compiled by Shri K. K. Dixit and published under the title 'The Systems of Indian Philosophy' by Shri Mahavira Jaina Vidyalaya, Bombay in 1970. It explains the various Indian philosophies, which are Sankhya, Yoga, Nyaya (Vaisesika), Mimamsa, Vedanta, Buddhism, and Jainism.

These lectures bear testimony of his powers of comprehension, his philosophical acumen and his profound learning. He is particularly conscious of the fact that the true strength of India lies in what is moral and spiritual in Indians. He draws no distinction among Brahmanic(Hindu), Jain, or Buddhist cultures. According to him, the basic Indian culture is neither Hindu, nor Jain nor Buddhist. By giving an impressive account of Indian life, he draws a true picture of the social and moral status of ancient Indians.

4. Yoga Philosophy

His lectures on the various aspect of yoga have been compiled by Shri Bhagu F. Karbhari and published by Shri Agamodaya Samit, Bombay in 1912. His exposition of Yoga philosophy and its technique of eight-fold yoga to achieve the suppression of the manifestations of mind entailing the unagitated pure state of mind, is brilliant. He aptly discusses the interesting topic of miraculous powers, which a yogi acquires by reason of performing the highest form of concentration on the required event, aspect, or thing.

The source of the positive power lies in the soul. The very wording of the definition of yoga involves the supposition of the existence of a power which can control and suppress the manifestations of the mind.

5. Essay - "Radya Kutvani Hanikarak Chal"

Shri Virchand Gandhi was a great social reformer at a very young age. He wrote a 37 page long essay "Radya Kutvani Hanikarak Chal" (crying and breast-beating by a widow or other women relatives after a death of a person) against social evils at the

young age of 22. When his father died in 1890, he did not allow the primitive practices of wailing and breast-beating during mourning. He continuously fought against social evils and was successful in eradicating some.

6. The Unknown Life of Jesus Christ

Shri Virchand Gandhi wrote this book by translating an ancient manuscript. The book was published in India in 1894 while he was in Chicago.

7. Savirya-dhyan

Shri Virchand Gandhi translated the first two chapters of the original text "Jnanarnav" written by Acharya Shubhachandra. The translation was published in the book called Savirya-dhyan in 1903.

8. Concentration

This small book consisting of 64 pages was first published in 1916. It contains a summary of Shri Virchand Gandhi's 12 lectures on meditation according to Jain tradition. He describes that the need of meditation is to attain mental peace and to rise above feelings of worry and anxiety. Next he explains the basic rule governing the practice of meditation.

It can be said that Gandhi was a formidable champion of Jain philosophy, a brilliant exponent of the systems of Indian philosophy, and a fervent lover of Indian culture. He was the most astrounding scholar with a versatile personality combined with a catholicity of outlook. Various publishers republished most of his literature in 1993 on the occasion of the 2nd parliament of world religions conference.

he achieved his objectives and got the factory closed down. He brought the dispute regarding the temple at Kavi to a happy resolution. He attended the International Commerce Conference as an all-Asia delegate. As a delegate from Bombay, he attended the Indian National Congress held at Pune in 1895. He was a strong advocate of Rashtriya Mahasabha or the congress. He seems to have come in intimate contact with Mahatma Gandhi. In a letter written to V. R. Gandhi's son, Gandhiji sends his blessing and asks

'Have you adopted any ideals of your father?'

Virchand Gandhi passed away in 1901 when he was only thirty seven. He rendered yeoman service to India and Jainism by interpreting Indian culture and religion in its true spirit to the western worlds. In this respect he enjoys the pride of place in the galaxy of Indian thinkers and philosophers and his name will continue to be remembered as a great champion of Jain religion.

WORLD COMMUNITY SERVICES:

GUJARAT EARTHQUAKE AND JAINA

It is a matter of great pride and pleasure to inform all of you that the Federation of Jain Association in North America (JAINA) has raised \$350,000. JAINA sincerely appreciates 25 Jain Sanghs and more than 500 donors who generously responded and contributed such a large amount to alleviate pain and suffering caused by this massive natural calamity.

JAINA has spent so far \$24,000 cash for earthquake victims. Distribution of 500 blankets, 10,000 food packages, 10,000 water bottles, 1000 flashlights, sponsoring a primary school at Samkhyali near Bhachau, feeding 600 people for one month at Mandvi, immediately after the earthquake were carried out. JAINA also donated ten (10) computers for children, victims of earthquake at Veerayatan Vidhyapeeth, Bhuj. JAINA also shipped 100,000 lbs. of clothes, 100 wheelchairs, 50 walkers, 100 crutches, 100 canes and medical supplies to earthquake affected area, worth hundred thousand dollars.

WHAT JAINA PLANS TO DO IN NEAR FUTURE:

JAINA has planned to rehabilitate 250 families who lost everything and have no source of income. e.g. a widow with a child or children who have lost their bread winner, widower (who has lost his business or job) with child or children, widows, physically handicapped, old aged couples who have no family members to

support. JAINA also intends to build primary and middle school, library, community hall and first aid health care center.

Average house will be 350 sq. feet, built on a 1000 sq. feet plot. Total cost for each unit will be approximately \$3000. JAINA's share per unit will be \$1500 (50% of total cost), the other \$1500 will come from Government and local N.G.Os. JAINA is still short of approximately \$50,000 for the construction of 250 houses. Jain Sanghs who have raised funds for earthquake victims and have not forwarded them to JAINA are humbly requested to do so.

Primary school is sponsored by Jain Society of Toronto. Middle school is sponsored by Jain center of greater Boston. Library is sponsored by a community from upstate New York. Community hall and first aid health care center each costing \$30,000 needs a sponsor. Jain Sanghs sponsoring any of above projects will have privilege to inscribe their names on marble plaques in front of these buildings.

Marble plaque in front of Mahavir nagar or Vardhman nagar (a name of entire project) will have the name of the Federation of Jain Associations in North America and Jain Center of America, New York, NY. The Jain Center of America contributed very generous sum of \$96,000 for this humanitarian project. The entire project will be built near village Bhujodi, Seven (7) kilometers away from Bhuj.

We urge all the individuals and Sanghs who have yet to contribute to JAINA, please do so as soon as possible.

MEDIA WATCH & PUBLIC RELATIONS COMMITTEE:

For the past 4-5 months the Committee has been involved in clearing misconception in the media about Jainism. Sushil Jain has prepared an Interfaith Alliance statement and issued a statement on gun control and a statement on houses of worship. The committee is continuing the work with Interfaith Alliance in educating the public about bias against prayers in the community. Regarding Mr. John Ashcroft's nomination as Attorney General, the Committee neither opposed it nor endorsed it, instead questions were sent to the United States Senate asking how Mr. Ashcroft will distance himself when making race related decisions. The Committee also issued a statement on faith-based charity. The Committee was successful in not allowing Sun Microsoft's claim to make JAIN as their company-owned trademark. This issue may come up again in about 5 years, so we need to educate non-Jains and non-Hindus about Jainism. This should also include interfaith leaders, United States Congressmen and Senators so that they would be aware of Jainism as a faith. The Committee worked with Interfaith Alliance in issuing a statement on campaign finance reforms and is preparing a statement against hate crimes. The Committee is currently looking at other religion-websites to see how they are organized and what they offer.

Jain prayers would be recited in the upcoming session of the United States House of Representatives and the Senate on May 22, 2001. For the first time in the history of the United States of America, Jainism and Jains will receive this unprecedented recognition and honor. (See report about this historic event elsewhere in this issue)

MAHAVIR MEMORIAL COMMITTEE



YJP Embraces the New Millennium: Fourth Annual YJP Conference in Everglades National Park

From its inception in 1997, the Young Jain Professionals Organization (YJP) has come a long way. The seed was planted when a group of young Jains envisioned having an organization devoted to the needs of a growing population of North American Jains—those just beginning their professional lives seeking to better incorporate Jainism into their professional and personal lives. YJP strives to increase the knowledge and application of Jainism principles Jains between 24 and 39. This is done through creative events that promote our understanding of Jainism as well as encourage professional and social networking.

The 4th Annual Young Jain Professionals Convention was held in Florida from March 2nd to 5th, 2001. Young Jains from the US, Canada and England left their hectic lives retreated to the Everglades National Park to engage in peer-led introspective and educational discussions based on the Jain Vrats, or vows; Asteya, Ahimsa, Aparigraha, Bhramacharya, and Satya. Creative scenarios, role-playing, and smaller group discussions were used to explore the application of the five Vrats in our daily practice of Jainism. We noted differences between how the Vrats apply to householders versus sadhus and sadhvis. We identified those pressures stemming from home, work and social situations that challenge our adherence to the Vrats and ultimately our ability to attain Moksa, and explored "Jain" ways to deal with such pressures.

The weekend began with opening remarks by our keynote speaker, Professor Anne Vallely, from McGill University, who led an inspiring and insightful presentation illustrating the broader perception of Jainism in North America, that is rooted in ecology, environmental concerns and is an evolving tradition as we are faced with new challenges daily. Dr. Vallely did her doctorate dissertation on Jainism from the University of Toronto. She has written Custodians of the Lokottar: An Ethnography of a Jain Ascetic Community, based on her research among Jain ascetics in Rajasthan. Currently, Dr. Vallely teaches at McGill University and Concordia University in Montreal.

Dr. Vallely, and our five facilitators, Ms. Paulomi Gudka, Mr. Amar Salgia, Mr. Gabriel Figueroa, Ms. Neha Jhaveri and Dr. Rita Kothari are commended for an exceptional job! In order to better understand the application of the Vrats, a Jain Experiment was initiated to encourage each participant to take a vow to practice the five Vrats in thought, word, and deed, to the greatest extent possible, beginning a week prior to the conference; individual experiences were shared in a wrap-up session.

In addition to nourishment for the soul, our bodies were energized by the gourmet vegetarian cuisine that was served. We were very lucky to have a chef that found the vegetarian/vegan menu a personal challenge. His efforts far surpassed all of our expectations. Participants also took advantage of the many outdoor activities such as canoeing, kayaking, bicycling, and hiking. Rest assured there were no casualties from alligator encounters. In addition, the participants enjoyed a sunset riverboat cruise with an informative guide who spoke of the history and wildlife of the Everglades.

The Fourth Annual Young Jain Professional Conference proved an invigorating experience for all who participated. All had a wonderful time, as old and new friendships were strengthened and participants had the rare opportunity to discuss applying Jainism to our daily lives in a National Park setting. A special thanks to all the participants for making the event a success!

Young Jains of America (YJA) is the umbrella youth organization of the Federation of Jain Associations in North America (JAINA). The mission of YJA is to be recognized nationally and internationally as an umbrella youth organization for establishing a network to share Jain heritage and religion through youth.

I was so excited! Just a few months ago I had turned vegan, and I was searching everywhere for a natural foods store that would meet my needs. And there it was, I had finally found one! All this time it was right under my nose, only a five minute drive from my house here in Delaware.

First on my grocery checklist was Vegan Chocolate! MMMmmm, so good. I had tried some a few days ago at a veggie market in Philadelphia and enjoyed it very much. The chocolate taste itself was nothing special, but just knowing it was vegan made me love biting into it all the more.

After I had found my chocolate, I walked around a bit more. My eyes showed my enthusiasm as I roamed the aisles in astonishment. About fifty percent of the total goods in the Newark Coop Natural Foods store were vegan, and I was loving it! I found everything I needed and so much more. Vegan items from marshmallows and cereals, to cheese, recipes and even toothpaste, were abundant and ready for my taking.

The toothpaste was something that really made me smile. I had only recently learned that the majority of brand named toothpastes out there were made with cow bones and other similar ingredients. I could no longer look in the mirror each morning knowing that my teeth were being cleaned at the expense of a sentient being. Not only that, but sixty-one percent of the cow's value is based upon the sales of its by-product (Stepaniak Pg 114). Meaning, farmers make most of their money by us using products like these toothpastes with animal by-products in them.

Unfortunately, I was faced with a dilemma. The natural toothpaste was made with the underground vegetable ginger. Although I had only given up some underground vegetables, (reasons were for strengthening of will power) I had never given much thought to ginger. So I contemplated whether to buy the product.

Contemplation took thirty seconds. What is worse, I told myself, to continue to use a product that supports the killing of sentient being, or to get an underground derived toothpaste for now, and look for others that are not made with a root later? Although we are deciding from one of two necessary evils, the answer is simple. Why do I raise this if it is so easy to understand?

Avoidance of underground vegetables originally came about by those who began to take karmic principles to the next level. Minimization of suffering, one of the great Jain themes, was the basis behind this action. Underground vegetable extraction was associated with the harming of beings in the ground and the destruction of the actual soul of the plant (when pulling an apple off a tree the tree itself is still intact but when pulling a carrot out of the ground, the whole carrot plant dies).

At that time, the suffering of higher sense beings was unheard of (someone who was concerned about the suffering of lower sense beings was not causing harm to higher sense beings). Does it

make sense to devote much of our attention to the avoiding onions and potatoes when we are still consuming products that support the killing of cows and other higher sensed beings?

Jains and Non-Jains alike often ask me whether this "Vegan thing" is a "Jain thing". When I reply I often illustrate this analogy for them: Recall a restaurant that you recently visited. See if you can recall the menu. Did it have any "Fried Human Legs" on the appetizers list? What about "Cat Dung"? If they answer yes that is another issue, but if they answer no I ask them why. The general answer I get is that it is unheard of. "Who serves cat dung at a restaurant?" they often ask me. In that same sense, it was previously unheard of for a practitioner of the Jain religion to support the killing of a five-sense being. The concept of being a Vegan was never an issue for the Jain community, because animals were treated with great care. Previously cows were not injured while obtaining milk, previously animal products were not used in the cooking and preserving of materials and foods, but they are today. What we must realize is that usage has caused immense amounts of suffering to our surrounding environment.

I think it is great that people avoid onions and other underground vegetables. I think it is great that people are vegetarian. I also think it is great that people eat one less meat because they have had an encounter with one of you lovely members of society. In addition, I realize that veganism, like avoiding underground vegetables, is only one small step in the gigantic ladder we are trying to ascend. I don't consider myself better than someone who is vegetarian, but I do consider myself fortunate to have had the experiences that led me to it. For those who have not had similar experience, it is my obligation to present them with it.

We must take some time to sit down and think about our actions and the reactions that follow. We cannot go by what others have said, rather we must learn to investigate for ourselves and come to our own conclusions. However, we can only come to conclusions after we have investigated.

This is Jainism.

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


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
