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

It is a pleasure to visit you. This Quarter we achieve some goals. Following is the progress report during this quarter.

- On line JAINA convention 2003 registration has already started. Please register before Jan 15 2003 to get early bird rates. It is \$90 for each person 12 and up, and \$60 for each child under 12. Please look inside for full details. Also, there is other concurrent convention; hotel rooms will be in short supply. Hence, book your rooms as early as possible.
- It was a great pleasure to join the Chaitya Pari party organized by Jain center of America, New York on Sept 29, 2002. 19 Buses full of members left Queens for Jain Temple near Atlantic City NJ. Mr. & Mrs. Ghelani and other members of the sangh received us and treated us tremendously well. It is an excellent example of how even a small community can serve a group of 1000 yatris. The executive committee and members of Jain Center of America, New York organized the whole event very well.
- Our Hearty Congratulations to Keshubhai Chandaria for receiving the Golden Jubilee Award from Government of Canada.

# JAINA ANNUAL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE & DIRECTORS MEETING SEPTEMBER 28, 2002 SIDDHACHALAM

Meeting started with Navkar Mantra, led by Rekhaben Parikh.

Minutes of July 13, 2002 meeting were approved with the following corrections: The entrance fees for the seniors were mentioned as \$60/pp for the early registration should have been \$90/pp for the early registration.

President's report: JAINA needs to collect at least \$100,000 in reserve funds to take care of emergency health care of visiting scholars and Jain Sadhus. A Fund raising committee needs to be in place ASAP.

He appointed following three committees:

2003 JAINA Ratna, Recognition and Ahmisa Award committee. JAINA recognizes and awards individuals based on their contribution to JAIN community. The committee will evaluate names sent by all Jain centers. Committee is made up of Co Chairs - Anop Vora and Dr. Dilip Shah aided by Dr. Mahendra Mehta, Mr. Praveen Jain and Suchita Shah.

2003 JAINA nomination & election committee: Executive committee gets nominated and elected during convention years. To oversee this process Dr. Vinay K. Jain: Chairperson aided by Dr. Kirit Gosalia, Prem Jain, Mohanbhai Mehta and Dr. Dinesh M. Shah were appointed.

JAINA Constitutional amendments: Year 1990 was the last time when there were changes made to this. It needs to address many issues, few of them are: Formula for directors of JAINA, Directors' positions and their roles with JAINA, Fee structure of various membership of JAINA. JAINA committees - Its creation procedures, charters, missions, goals, longevity, etc., Boundaries of member societies, Internet privacies. This would be a standing committee, as it will have a longer longevity. Chairperson: Dr. Manibhai Mehta, aided by members Dr. Dhiraj Shah, Keshubhai Chanderia, Arvind Vora, Pankaj Dalal, Dr. Manoj Dharamasi and Prem Jain

Committee's separate accounts: Currently there are several committees of JAINA, have separate bank accounts like World com-

munity services, YJA, YJP, Convention accounts, JAINA Trust, etc. To maintain better control it is necessary to have only one account. He proposed the following motion on the floor for the discussion, seconded by Anop Vora: "All JAINA related financial transaction activities would be under direct supervision of the JAINA Treasurer. The committee functions will remain same, except the funds will be accounted separately"

There was a concern that committee's funds should not be used for any other purposes then what was it collected for. It was agreed that there would not be any changes in the current procedures, except that all the funds would be deposited in main account and the treasurer would make all disbursements. The chairman of the committee if so desired by the treasurer may issue receipts. After much discussion, Executive Committee approved the motion unanimously.

#### Anop Vora gave report on Convention activities:

Cleveland Sangh will design, build and install the temple at the convention center for all pujas at a cost not to exceed \$10,000.

To help bring awareness of the convention and raise funds for the convention posters of the convention event would be made available to all JAIN Genters before Diwali functions.

Current budget: \$755,000 based on paid registration of 4,000. Over 60% of the budget is for food, facilities and programming related.

Key note speakers: Have asked for the suggestions from various centers for keynote speakers.

He requested all directors and regional vice presidents to get active and help raise \$200,000.

Booths will be available to JAINA committee for their exhibits. Contact Mr. Ramesh Shah.

Online registration will be available first week of October.

We have committed 750 rooms with Crown Plaza, Hyatt and Hilton hotels at \$95/room rate.

Smallest room for speakers would hold 100 people.

Amrendra Muniji: Naresh Jain reported that after spending over 6 weeks at the rehab center, and now at home of Dr. Subhash Jain he is recovering fast. Currently he is undergoing rehab training twice a week for 2 hours/session. This would be accelerated to thrice a week. Our current weekly rehab cost will increase from \$400 to \$500. So far we have spent \$9,600 at the Forest Rehab center. JAINA has already paid this amount with the contributions from various Jain Centers and individuals. He thanked JAINA for taking lead in raising funds for Amrendra Muniji' medical expenses. Naresh brought Muniji with him, as he wanted to meet JAINA executive board members and others during this annual meeting. Muniji is currently able to walk short distance with the support of walker. The situation looks very hopeful.

#### HEADQUARTERS NEWS ....

Jain Center of New Jersey sponsored the Lunch.

Membership committee: Mr. Kamlesh Shah, reported receiving following applications for membership in JAINA:

Panama City, FL: They meet regularly since 1992. Currently have over 25 members but do not have temple yet.

Jain Society of Lansing, MI. They have over 25 members, but do not have temple yet.

JAANA-Jain Adhyatma Academy of North America. Their mission was to spread the word of Mahavir to all Jains and distribute Jain books and publications at no charge.

International Jain Sangh: They have over 100 members and they meet regularly, but do not have a temple yet.

Mr. Mahendra Shah, President of Philadelphia Hindu Jain Sangh submitted their application and the fees for JAINA membership. They will be admitted as member upon receipt of the by laws and charter per earlier resolution of March 2002 executive committee meeting in Chicago.

Chairman assured us that he would submit guidelines and requirements of JAINA membership for acceptance by the executive committee. All above application were accepted unanimously.

YJA report by Ronak Shah and Suchita Shah: They were able to accommodate only 800 youths from total application of 1,000+youths. They had over 16 sessions, various workshops and social activities. At the request of JAINA executive committee their initial budget of \$450,000 was reduced to \$325,000 without sacrificing quality or the content. They felt they might have made over \$90,000+ profit. This was achieved by cost cutting and aggressive fund raising campaign. 40% of the profit will go to local New Jersey Sanghs. They will spend the money for the youth activities. YJA's goals are as follows:

Regional conferences: To increase the participation at the local level, and reduce the time between conventions, they would like to hold six regional conferences. The local sanghs would have to pick up part of the cost. Some shortfall may come from the convention surpluses.

Veeraytan: They want to send 20 volunteers to work with Veeraytan. The total air and land cost will be about \$1,000 pp. YJA will be willing to subsidize \$200, if Jain Sangh would subsidize \$600 so the final cost to youth will be \$200.

Habitat for Humanity: They would build house with habitat for humanity agencies.

They agreed to help JAINA raise funds for their 2003 convention.

**Temple Committee Guideline:** Fourteen members were added to this committee with the following tasks:

Teerthodhar Committee: Kirit Daftary reported collecting over \$15,000 from various Jain Centers and JAINA trust. JAINA has paid off \$9,500 worth of bills. We are expecting additional bills of at least \$15,000 more from the rehab center and equipment.

Besides this JAINA has sponsored September month for Vaiyavach of Sadhu and Sadhviji in India. Shri Navkar Sarvar Kendra of Ahmedabad would carry this out. We expect to serve aryuvedic medicine to over 1000 monks in Gujarat area only.

Scholar committee: Nirmal Dosi reported that scholars are not going through JAINA any more. Each of them has their own sponsors. They have been requested to bring insurance from India before they leave the country. Except for few most of the scholars are not insured. We have lined up information about insurance companies in India and US. All of this information will be sent to all scholars through their local sponsors. The newly appointed insurance task force would look into covering existing conditions and evaluation of various affordable insurance policies. Anop Vora appointed Dr. Sulekh Jain, as chair this task force. Dr. Sushil Jain, Kirit C. Daftary, Nirmal Dosi and Pravin Vakani will aid him. Mr. Vakani is health insurance agent who can help us identify and evaluate various possibilities. With this information there is no reason for any scholars to be under or uninsured.

Public Policy: Dr. Sushil Jain pointed out that under new legislation, churches can now support or oppose political candidates. The question remains should we speak up or remain quiet? For example, IF a candidate supports display of 10 commandments in the public building only, then we don't want to support such candidates. We much rather support candidates who promotes religious freedom. We could even hold fundraiser for candidates who believe in our issues and causes. Such practices were not allowed in the past. In the same fashion, if we were to join political organization and if the candidate endorsed by the organization may or may not be supporter of Jain principles and beliefs. For example promoting of slaughterhouse would be a big issue with us. In such a circumstances it would be difficult for JAINA to misalign them selves from such organization in the middle of the game plan. Dr. Sushil Jain proposed a motion that JAINA should not become member of any political organization such as NFIA and others. Anop Vora seconded this motion. The vote was unanimous and the resolution was approved. Dr. Bipin Parekh pointed out that our constitution does not allow us to get involved in Political activities.

Education Committee: The first set of 2000 CD has been distributed and order of second set of 2000 copies is already in works. Their first phase of having Pathshala material is already completed. They are now in their phase II. This involves adding Sutras and Stavans, curriculum enhancements and continual refinement of the material. They would like to see that they add teachers aid and have more of training workshops. Deadline for the phase II is currently set for September 2003. They feel that even though the CD have gone out, but now we have to make them use it on a regular basis. They will also make sure that there are sutras of all three traditions to make sure that all benefit by its publications.

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#### THE JAIN TEACHINGS

#### 1. Ahimsa (non-violence)

The Jain ecological philosophy is virtually synonymous with the principle of *ahimsa* (non-violence), which runs through the Jain tradition like a golden thread

"Ahimsa parmo dharmah" (Non-violence is the supreme religion)

Mahavira; the 24<sup>th</sup> and last *Tirthankara* (Path-finder) of this era, who lived 2500 years ago in north India consolidated the basic Jain teachings of peace, harmony and renunciation taught two centuries earlier by the *Tirthankara* Parshva, and for thousands of years previously by the 22 other *Tirthankaras* of this era, beginning with Adinath Rishabha. Mahavira threw new light on the perennial quest of the soul with the truth and discipline of ahimsa. He said:

"There is nothing so small and subtle as the atom nor any element so vast as space. Similarly, there Is no quality of soul more subtle than non-violence and no virtue of spirit greater than reverence for life"

Ahimsa is a principle that Jains teach and practice not only towards human beings but towards all nature. It is an unequivocal teaching that is at once ancient and contemporary. The scriptures tells us:

"All the Arhats (Venerable Ones) of the past, present and future discourse, counsel, proclaim, propound and prescribe thus in unison:

Do not injure, abuse, oppress, enslave, insult, torment, torture or kill any creature or living being."

In this strife-torn world of hatred and hostilities, aggression and aggrandisement, and of unscrupulous and unbridled exploitation and consumerism, the Jain perspective finds the evil of violence writ large. The teaching of *ahimsa* refers not only to wars and visible physical acts of violence but to violence in the hearts and minds of the human beings, their lack of concern and compassion for their fellow humans and for the natural world. Ancient Jain texts explain that violence (himsa) is not defined by actual harm, for this may be unintentional. It is the intention to harm, the absence of compassion that makes action violent. Without violent thought there could be no violent actions. When violence enters our thoughts, we remember Tirthankara Mahavira's words:

"You are that which you intend to hit, injure, insult, torment, persecute, torture, enslave or kill."

#### Parasparopagraho jivanam (Interdependence)

Mahavira proclaimed a profound truth for all times to come when he said: "One who neglects or disregards the existence of earth, air, fire, water and vegetation disregards his own existence which is entwined with them"

Jain cosmology recognizes the fundamental natural phenomenon of symbiosis or natural dependence, which forms the basis of the modern-day science of ecology. It is relevant to recall that the term 'ecology' was coined in the latter half of the nineteenth century from the Greek word *oikos*, meaning 'home' a place to which one returns. Ecology is the branch of biology, which deals with the relationships of organisms to their surroundings and to other organisms.

The ancient Jain scriptural aphorism Parasparopagraho jivanam (All life is bound together by natural support and interdependence) is refreshingly contemporary in its premise and perspective. It defines the scope of modern ecology while extending it further to a more spacious 'home'. It means that all aspects of nature belong together and are bound in a physical as well as metaphysical relationship. Life is viewed as gift of togetherness, accommodation and assistance in a universe teeming with interdependent constituents.

#### 3. Anekantavada (the doctrine of manifold aspects)

The concept of universal interdependence underpins the Jain theory of knowledge, known as *anekantavada* or the doctrine of manifolds aspects. *Anekantavada* describes the world as a multifaceted, ever-changing reality with infinity of viewpoints depending on the time, place, nature and state of the one who is the viewer and that which is viewed.

This leads to the doctrine of *syadvada* or relativity, which states that truth is relative to different viewpoints (*nayas*). What is true from one point of view is open to question from another. Absolute truth cannot be grasped from any particular viewpoint alone and because absolute truth is the sum total of all the different viewpoints that make up the universe.

Because it is rooted in the doctrines of *anekantavada* and syadvada, Jainism does not look upon the universe from the anthropocentric, ethnocentric or egocentric viewpoint. It takes into account the viewpoints of other species, other communities and nations and other human beings.

#### 4. Samyaktva (equanimity)

The discipline of non-violence, the recognition of universal interdependence and the logic of the doctrine of manifold aspects, leads inexorably to the avoidance of dogmatic, intolerant, inflexible, aggressive, harmful and unilateral attitudes towards the world around. It inspires the personal quest of every Jain for *Samyaktva* (equanimity) towards both *jiva* (animate beings) and *ajiva* (inanimate substance and objects). It encourages an attitude of give and take of live and let live. It offers a pragmatic peace plan based, not on the domination of nature, nations or other people, but on equanimity of mind devoted to the preservation of the balance of the universe.

#### 5. Jiva-daya (compassion, empathy and charity)

All though the term "ahimsa' is stated in the negative (a=non, himsa=violence), it rooted in the host of the positive aims and actions which have great relevance to contemporary environmental concerns.

Ahimsa is an aspect of daya (compassion, empathy and charity), describe by a great Jain teacher as "the beneficent mother of all beings" and "the elixir for those who wonder in suffering through the ocean of successive rebirths".

Jiva-daya means caring for and sharing with all living beings, tending, protecting and serving them. It entails universal friendliness (maitri), universal forgiveness (kshama) and universal fearlessness (abhaya).

Jains, whether monks, nuns or householders, therefore, affirm prayerfully and sincerely, that their heart is filled with forgiveness for all living beings and that they have sought and received the forgiveness for all beings, that they crave the friendship of all beings, that all beings give them their friendship and that there is not the slightest feeling of alienation or enmity in their heart for anyone or anything. They also pray that forgiveness and friendliness may reign throughout the world and that all living beings may cherish each other.

The five fundamental teachings of Jainism are deeply rooted in its living ethos in the unbroken continuity across the centuries. They offer the world today a time-tested anchor or normal imperatives and a viable route plan for humanity's common pilgrimage for holistic environmental protection, peace and harmony in the universe.

#### JAIN COSMOLOGY

Jains do not acknowledge an intelligent first cause as the creator of the universe. The Jain theory is that the universe has no beginning or end. It is traced to *Jiya* and *ajiya*, the two everlasting, uncreated, independent and co-existing categories consciousness in *Jiya*. That which has no consciousness is *ajiya*.

There are five substances of ajiva:

- 1. Dharma the medium of motion
- 3. akasha space
- 5. kala time

- 2. adharma the medium of rest
- 4. pudgala matter

Pudgala (matter) has form and consist of individual atoms (paramanu) and conglomerates of atoms (skandha), which can be seen, heard, smelt, tested and/or touched. According to Jains, energy, or the phenomena of sound, darkness, shade, heat, light and the like, is produced by conglomerates of atoms.

The Jiva (soul) has no form but, during its worldly career, it is vested with a body and becomes subject to an inflow of karmic 'dust' (asravas). These are the subtle material particles that are drawn to a soul because of its worldly activities. The asravas bind the soul to the physical world until they have brought about the karmic result when they fall away "like ripe fruit" by which time other actions have drawn more asravas to the soul.

With the exception of the *arihantas* (the ever-perfect) and the *Siddhas* (the liberated), who have dispelled the passions, which provide the 'glue' for the *asravas*, all souls are in karmic bondage to the universe. They go through a continuous cycle of death and rebirth in a personal evolution that can lead at last to *Moksha* (eternal release). In this cycle there are countless souls at different stages of their personal evolution: earth-bodies, water-bodies, air-bodies, vegetable-bodies, and mobile bodies ranging from bacteria, insects, worms, birds and larger animals to human beings, internal beings and celestial beings.

The Jain evolutionary theory is base on a grading of the physical bodies containing souls according to the degree of sensory perception. All souls are equal but are bound by varying amounts of *asravas* (karmic particles), which is reflected in the type of body they inhibit. The lowest form of physical body has only the sense of touch and are therefore able to experience pleasure and pain, and have souls. Mahavira taught that only the one who understood the grave detriment caused by destruction of plants and trees understood the meaning and merit of reverence for nature. Even metals and stones might have life in them and should not be dealt with recklessly.

Above the single-sense *Jivas* are micro-organisms and small animals with two, three or four senses. Higher in order are the *Jivas* with five senses. The highest grade of animals and the human beings also possess rationality and intuition (manas). As a highly evolved form of life, human beings have a great moral responsibility in their mutual dealings and in their relationship with the rest of the universe.

It is this conception of life and its eternal coherence, in which human beings have an inescapable ethical responsibility that made the Jain tradition a cradle for the creed of environmental protection and harmony.

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## A TRIBUTE TO ANANDGHANJI

Dr. Pravin L. Shah, Reading, PA

#### YOGIRAJ ANANDGHANJI (1600-1682 A.D.)

During the last two thousand years, we have been blessed with at least a dozen most eminent Acharyas in Jain religion including Acharaya Umaswati, Kundkund, Pujayapad, Samant Bhadra, Siddhasen, Haribhadra, Amrutchandra, Hemchnadra, Yasovijayji Upadhayay and Yogiraj Anadghanji and Shrimad Rajchandra. Each of these great seers has made monumental contribution to Jain philosophy and culture.

While Jain literature has been highly enriched by the epic writings of each of the above Jain Masters, it is accurate to state that the main credit for reviving Jineshvar Bhakti-yoga in Jain religion must go to Anandghanji who lived the life of a great Yogi some three hundred and fifty years ago. It is believed that Anandghanji lived approximately 125 years after Mira Bai. A unique aspect of Anandghanji's writing is that his devotional Stavans are equally popular in Digambar and Swetambar Jain followings. Anandghanji composed the most popular "Tirthankar-Stavan-Chovisi" which contains 24 Stavnas named and dedicated to each Tirthankar. In addition he has composed more than two hundred Bhajans which resemble the style of wring of Mira bai and Kabirji and Surdasji.

#### TIRTHANKAR CHOVISI:-

The entire T-Chovisi is written by Anandghanji in Gujarati and has been expanded by (1) Motilal Kapadia (2) Maneklal G. Javeri. (3) Rev. Buddhisagarji and (4)Dr, Kumarpal Desai. Each author has made an admirable effort to explain the spiritual depth of Anandghanji's T-Chovisi. Pandit Sukhlalji has stated that if a disciple studies noting else but the T-Chovisi and submerges himself in the spiritual flow of Anandghanji, one can attain the self realization in no time.

Anandghanji's T-Chovisi is an outstanding treatise which combines and beautifully integrates the three great spiritual pillars of self realization: (1) Gnan-yog, (2) Bhakti-yog, and (3) Adhyatma-yog. For example, in his first Stavan, the author uses the metaphor of "Pritam" or beloved master for Lord Aadinath and declares that once I have pleased my master, I am united with Lord Adinath from now until eternity. Let us submerge in the divine nectar of Anandghanji's first verse of this epic stavan:

Rushabha Jineshvar Pritam Mahro' Or Na Chahu re Kanth: Rijyo Sahib Sang Na Parihare, Bhange Saadi Ananat

He describes many of our worldly relationships as nothing but illusion or false leading one to despair or pain and misery while the true and genuine surrender in devotional love

with Lord Tirthankar illuminates the heart of the disciple with divinity and enlightenment. The author, however, puts a condition for pleasing the master that one must completely surrender to the Lord without any deceitful motives. The author says the real worship to my Swami or the Lord is to melt away my ego and identity, and completely surrender to the Lord in devotion and Bahakti-yog. Shrimad Rajchandra has translated the first Stavan in great depth and is an excellent reference to study (see Shrimad Vachanamrat letter 753).

In the second Stavan, the author warns us that in order to recognize the true Master, one can not use the physical eyes but one needs the divine vision which can be granted only by the grace of God. Here, he emphasizes the importance and need of a spiritual teacher to attain self realization. Let us rejoice the second verse of the second Stavan which is really a very divine verse for a true disciple to find the real path to salvation:

Charam Nayan Kari Marag Jovatan Re, Bhulyo Sayal Sanasar; Jene Nayane Kari Marag Joiae Re, Nayan Te Divya Vichar. Panthdo Nihadu Re Bija Jin Tanu Re

The author says the most common mistake one makes is in finding the right teacher for the spiritual awareness based on his own judgment which is full of self ignorance. One truly needs the divine vision to find the right teacher and the path for self realization begins only after one has known and surrendered to the Sadguru.

In the third Stavan the author describes the prerequisites for a disciple to enter into the Adhyatam-Marg and in the fourth Stavan, Anandghanji points out how difficult it is to attain Samyak Darshan. In the fifth Stavan the author describes a complete process of Adhytma yog by defining the nature of Bahir-Atam, Antanr-Atama, and Parmatma. Let us examine Anadghanji's enormous powers of poetic and spiritual expressions from the 5<sup>th</sup> verse of the 5<sup>th</sup> Stavan:

Bahiratam Taji Antar Atama, Rup Thai Thir Bhav Sugnani; Paramatamnu Ho Atam Bhavavu, Atam Arpan Dav Sugnani

The author guides us to give up our external object orientation and enter into self analysis by meditating on the self by concentrating on the divine inner nature of Lord Sumti Nath and to surrender to Him fully to attain self realization.

#### A TRIBUTE TO ANANDGHANJI....

In the 13<sup>th</sup> Stavan, the author praises Lord Vimal Nath as Anandghanji has attained self realization and is over joyed by the divine grace he has received from the Lord. Verse 4 of the 13<sup>th</sup> stavan is an epic by itself:

Sahib Samarath Tu Dhani Re, Pamyo Param Udar; Man Visarami Valho Re, Aatam Cho Addhar. Vimal Jin Ditha Loyan Aaj, Mara Sidhya Vachhit Kaj

Anadghanji says to Lord Vimal Nath that my mind has now found a permanent place to rest in your lotus feet as I have found the most graceful and generous Master who has gifted me with self realization. Seeing the divine "Murti" of the Lord, Anandghanji says all my problems and miseries are over and now I am the ever lasting soul with bliss and happiness as he describes in the following Stavan:

Ab Ham Amar Bhaye Na Marenge Asha Oran Ki Kya Kije; Gnan Sudharas Pije

The master key for attaining self realization is summarized by the author in the 15<sup>th</sup> Stavan. Let us review the most important verse of this immortal composition of the author:

Pravachan Anjan Jo Sadguru Kare, Dekhe Param Nidhan Jineshvar; Hruday Nayan Nihade Jagadhani, Mahima Meru Saman Jineshvar. Dharama Jineshvar Gau Rangsu

Anandghanji declares the universal principle for self realization which can only be attained when one receives the true grace of the teacher (Sadguru). When the third eye called the divine vision or "Agnanetra" opens up, one can see the treasure of the universal truth and infinite knowledge in his own self and the illusion of the materialistic wealth vanishes. At the same time all the bondage of Karma melts away and one attains the state of a Siddha.

In conclusion, Yogiraj Anandghanji has made a monumental contribution to the spiritual seekers of all faith by showing us a complete step wise process in each of his compositions on how to immerse in the divine nectar of Adhyatma "Masti" and experience the divine peace by surrendering to the Lord. Let us pray to Lord Mahavir for His divine Grace using the 1<sup>st</sup> verse of Anandghanji's 24<sup>th</sup> Stavan:

Virji Ne Charne Lagu, Virpanu Te Magure.

# AHINSÄ, THE NONVIOLENCE

Not to kill any living being is characteristic of the enlightenment. Equanimity coupled with nonviolence is the essence of religious science.

Mahätmä Gändhi was born on October 2, 1869. He has been universally acknowledged as the apostle of Ahinsä, the nonviolence. As such October 2 or some other date in the month of October is celebrated as Ahinsä day. It is therefore worthwhile to write about nonviolence in this issue of Jain Digest, particularly bringing out his contribution to the concept of Ahinsä.

Almost every individual belongs to some religion. The Indo-Aryan religions are more concerned with wandering of the worldly beings from birth to birth and their principal objective is to get rid of the said wandering and to attain the liberation. The term 'liberation' connotes the perfect purity. As such, spiritual pursuit consists of overcoming the defiling instincts so as to attain the purity. These overcoming and attainment interact upon each other. It is not possible to attain the purity without overcoming the defilement and merely overcoming it without the objective of purification leads nowhere. Lord Mahavir laid emphasis on the former, because at that time there was too much talk of inherent purity of soul. There were many persons, who laid down their own doctrines. Quite a few of them insisted that soul is pure and it always remains unadulterated. As such the spiritual pursuit consists of nothing else but of understanding the inherently pure nature of soul.

They were right in the absolute sense. It is, however, a fact that the worldly soul happens to be in the state of imperfection. The exclusive emphasis on the inherent purity leads to ignoring the present imperfect state. Jainism therefore lays emphasis on the way of attaining the purity and lays down nonviolence, restraint and austerity as the means. As such, Dashvaikälik Sutra states: Dhammo Mangalam Utkittham, Ahinsä, Sanjamo Tavo; Devävi Tam Namanssanti, Jassa Dhamme Sayä Mano. It means: Religion, comprising nonviolence, restraint and austerity, is supremely blissful; even gods bow to him, whose mind always stays in religion.

There is a vital significance in associating restraint and austerity with nonviolence. It is not possible to observe nonviolence without resorting to restraint. A nonviolent person cannot afford to behave as he likes. He needs to lead a restrained life.

Moreover, he has to undergo the rigors and hardships, that he may come across. For being equipped to undergo the same with equanimity and peace of mind, he needs to observe austerities. As such, restraints and austerities are inalienable parts of non-violence.

Ahinsa can be conceived in three phases. The first one is: 'Live without hurting others.' In this concept nonviolence is restricted to human beings. That is normally observed by all the civilized societies. The second is: 'Live and let live.' In this concept nonviolence is extended to other living beings. That is mostly observed in India. The third is: 'Protect other life even at the cost of your own.' That is Jain concept. With that concept in mind, Lord Mahavir risked his life and went to the abode of venomous snake Chandkaushik for conveying the message of nonviolence That concept is vividly exemplified in the following story.

One of the principal disciples of Lord Mahavir was Muni Metärya. He is popularly known as Metäraj Muni. Once he went to the house of a goldsmith for alms. The goldsmith was making barley shaped grains of gold to be embedded in jewelry. Seeing the Muni at his door, he left his work and went inside to get some food. Meanwhile, a pet bird came and swallowed the golden grains taking them to be the barley. As the goldsmith came out with food, he saw that the golden grains were missing. Hence he asked the Muni about the same.

For Muni it was a dilemma. He could not tell a lie and if he spoke the truth, the goldsmith would kill the bird for getting the grains out of its stomach. The Muni would then become instrumental to causing the violence. He therefore kept mum. The goldsmith asked him again and again, but the Muni would not reply. Since no reply was forthcoming, the goldsmith concluded that the Muni was hiding the grains somewhere. He could not afford to lose the costly grains and therefore decided to use force for getting the same back.

As normal force did not yield the result, he decided to resort to more violent means. He brought a moist lace of leather and tied it tight around Muni's head. Then he made the Muni to stand under the sun. As the lace began to dry by the solar heat, it started compressing Muni's head. The compression continued to increase, as the lace became drier. Ultimately, Muni's eyes came out on account of too much pressure. But he took the pain as a consequence of his evil Karma and bore it with equanimity. That accelerated Nirjarä, the process of eradicating Karma. All his Karmas were thus destroyed and he gained the omniscience.

#### Ahinsa, the nonviolence(cont.)...

Meanwhile, the bird could not digest the golden grains and excreted the same. As the goldsmith saw that, he repented very much for the distress perpetrated by him. But it was too late, because Muni's soul had already left the mortal body. Here is the case of sacrificing own life for protecting the life of others. The Muni could have saved his life as well as that of the bird, if he had fabricated a story acceptable to the goldsmith. That would, however, amount to telling a lie, which the Muni could not do. Jainism insists on avoiding violence as well as lying. As such, the Muni did not want to speak anything, which could lead to either of them.

Now let us review the concept of nonviolence in historical perspective. Its first phase of not killing other human beings was prevalent in India during very ancient times. But there was no bar against killing animals. Even the Rushies (Muni) did not have objection to eating meat. That pattern seems to be prevalent even among Jains. We learn about the birds and beasts confined in a yard for giving feast to the wedding party of Lord Neminäth. The Lord objected to the slaughter of animals on such grounds and adopted the renunciation. Another example occurs during the time of Lord Pärshwanäth. By virtue of his occult knowledge, he noticed snakes in the firewood, which was offered in the Panchägni Tap of Kamath. The Lord intervened at the cost of courting Kamath's wrath and saved the snakes from being annihilated.

The concept of extending nonviolence to the animal life, however, might not have made much headway. The animal sacrifices were adopted and they took a gigantic proportion by the time of Mahäbhärat. Horse sacrifices were in vogue and there are also mentions, though rare, of human sacrifices. Moreover, there were several social customs in which violence was implicit. Brahmins considered themselves as the agents of gods and looked down upon others. The condition of women was far from satisfactory. Polygamy was the order and multiple wives became a symbol of eminence. Shudras were treated as worse than animals and their miseries knew no bounds. Lord Mahavir had to lay down his message under such conditions.

He could see that every being seeks to live happily; as such no one has the right to hurt others. For that purpose he laid down nonviolence as the creed. He held the ritual sacrifices as irreligious and declared that self-control is the true sacrifice (Uttarädhyayan Sutra Chapter 25). He insisted that one becomes Brahmin, Kshatriya, Vaishya or Shudra by his deeds. That very chapter therefore lays down equanimity as the criterion for monasticism, Brahmacharya for Brahminism, enlightenment for Muni and Tap for Täpas.

He did not rest merely by laying the message, but actually put it into practice. Metaraj, who was raised in the home of a Shudra, was given the high rank of a Ganadhar. Similarly a Shudra named Haribal (the same book chapter 12) was initiated and was sent for alms to a sacrificial Mandap. Chandanbälä, though born as a princess, was undergoing the life of a bonded worker. The Lord gave her the privilege of offering alms at the end of his fast for 5 months and 25 days. Moreover, he gave equal status to the females in his order. Accordingly Chandanbälä became the head of nuns' cadre and even queen Mrugävati had to become her pupil. Similarly he gave equitable status to lay women. Revati, Sulasä and Jayanti were known Shrävikäs of his order. The former two are now in heavenly abode and are supposed to be 16th and 17th Tirthankars in the ensuing Utsarpini. The last was highly learned. She could even raise questions in the Lord's assembly.

Of all these measures, non-violence in the sense of not killing animals took roots in various parts of India. Vegetarianism grew in Gujarat with the onset of Chävdä rule in the middle of the 8th century under the influence of Shilgunsuri. Its growth was accelerated during Solanki dynasty, which was set up in 10th century and it was well established during the administration of Jain ministers like Vimal, Santu, and Udayan. It reached the pinnacle with the proclamation of Amäri (forbidding of animal slaughter) by Kumärpäl under the inspiration of Hemchandrächärya. Since Märwäd was a part of Kumärpäl's dominion, that was also covered and vegetarianism was established there. Hinduism slowly adopted it in other parts of India and that trend grew under the influence of Vallabhächärya and Rämänujächärya.

But there was a setback on several other fronts during the medieval times. Untouchability took stronger roots and the condition of Shudras became more miserable. The plight of woman worsened; she had to be married as per choice of her elders and remain loyal to her husband irrespective of his drawbacks, vices etc. In case, the husband died, she had to cremate herself along with his dead body. The child marriage became the rule and widows were forbidden to remarry.

This was the condition till the advent of Gandhiji on the scene. He gave a new dimension to the concept of Ahinsä and developed it on a scale not conceived earlier. He knew that the sense of justice lies within every heart. But when the inner voice is suppressed by force, not only does one succumb to such force, but may also start cooperating with the injustice. It was not within the nature of Gändhiji to tolerate the injustice. He considered it as, a spiritual suicide. As such he urged not to give way to injustice and gave the call to resist the same non-violently. Since that constituted the fight for truth, he termed such resistance as Satyägrah.

### Ahinsa, the nonviolence(cont.)...

The strength of Satyägrah lies in the fact that every one has a soft corner at heart. That may be shrouded by the evil tendencies, but it can be awakened by compassion and by willingly undergoing the pain and hardships that may be caused by the adversary. What is needed is a heart throbbing with love and affection. That is called Vätsalya. One need not harbor ill-feeling for any one. That can prompt even the wicked to reciprocate. The internal purity and just as well as moral character can arouse kind feeling even among the wicked people.

Gändhiji had pacified the temper to an extent where he felt affection even for those who differed from him. He had eradicated the fear. Alone and unprotected, he braved the threats of assassins. He declared that if he were to die comfortably in bed, he should not have been called the Mahatma. Food meant to him nothing more than the fuel to keep the bodily machine running. He kept rigorous control over all other needs and had annihilated the desires

The concept of nonviolence was till then mostly restricted to not causing physical hurt. The concept meant that if some one hurts or abuses us, we should not reciprocate and should forgive him. Gändhiji insisted on extending the concept to every level. If a drunk abuses, if a delirious hurts us, do we retaliate? Do we not pity their lot? The wicked also are disease stricken and should be dealt with compassion. His concept of just treatment to everyone, refusal to tolerate injustice and equality of every one led him to fight against the social evils like untouchablity. He called it a bane and fought against it till it was eradicated. Similarly he removed the fetters that the women were suffering from and brought them in line with the males.

His main contribution lies in use of Ahinsä in the political realm. Since foreign rule was the greatest injustice to the people of India, he started the struggle for independence and gave the call for civil disobedience. By abstaining from violence during the struggle, he wrested the moral advantage from the British rulers. By breaking the law peacefully, he showed the injustice of the law. By accepting punishment voluntarily, he confronted the captors with their brutality. By undertaking fast unto death, he demonstrated the extent to which he was willing to go for defending the truth. He thus rendered the continuation of British rule an impossibility. That eventually resulted in grant of independence.

Gändhiji's approach is grossly being misused at present. The people resort to Satyägrah for redressing their grievances, but disregard his insistence on moral standards. Their grievances are mostly feigned and are against the interests of the society. They forget that Gändhism minus morality is not merely

zero; it has a negative value. The sooner they turn from that, the better would it serve Gändhiji's cause.

Surprisingly enough, Jains had adopted several abuses from the Hindu community. Untouchability was the foremost. Since we had borrowed the concept that eclipse occurs by virtue of obstruction caused by Rähu and Ketu, and since they were considered evil planets close to the rank of Shudra, we believed our temples to be polluted by an eclipse and they were required to be washed after an eclipse. We had also adopted the lower stature for women and were embedded with the concept of higher and lower classes, etc. The Jain concepts of non-possession and the purpose of monastic life were distorted. Gändhiji's mission changed that. His contribution to Jainism is thus immeasurable. No wonder that thousands of Jains, inclusive of some monks, joined his movement and accepted his leadership.

His concept of non-possession or Aprigrah is of utmost importance to Jainism. He termed non-possession as essential for observance of Ahinsa. Non-possession normally leads to inactivity, to parasitism; Gändhiji rendered it active while practicing it to the utmost extent. Many of his close followers managed to see that their sons were well placed. Nehru, in particular, virtually set up his dynasty. But the progeny of Gandhij became a part of the common folk.

In the name of Ahinsa we, Jains, have developed pacifism. We have encouraged inactivity on the ground that every activity leads to Karma. But Jainism has no objection to the laymen undertaking the required activities. It urges doing everything with Yatanä, the awareness. We are familiar with the concept of Samiti. Yatanä is the essence of Samities. We should observe that to the possible extent and undertake the activities with detached mind. We should also develop the sense of amity for all. By virtue of birth in a Jain family, we have inherited the privileges, like vegetarianism, non-alcoholism, tolerance and not killing or hurting. We should become conscious of those privileges and go ahead by developing servicing and helping attitude. Can we afford to remain unconcerned at the distress faced by others?.

On the global scale we are now witnessing two contradictory trends. One is the rise of vegetarianism in West on health ground. We need to bring the significance of prevention of cruelty to the notice of such people. The second is the rise of terrorism in the form of hijacking, suicidal attacks etc. Its roots lie in fanaticism, intolerance, misplaced faith and easy availability of weapons of mass destruction. How to avert that is a problem. It seems that only way is to extend compassion and the right understanding to the evil-doers. There is no alternative. That method will take time but we need to have patience for that.
