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

Executive Committee members present were as follows: Mr. Anop Vora, Mr. Kirit Daftary, Mr. Sushil Jain, Mr. Jit Turakhia, Mrs. Lata Champsee, Mr. Udai Jain, Mr. Sumati Shah, and Mr. Pravin Shah.

Directors, Center Presidents, Committee chairs and Cochairs, and guests present were as follows: Dr. Narendra Shah, Mr. Dilip V. Shah, Mr. Girish Shah, Mr. Bipin Shah, Mr. Chirag Shah, Miss Nisha Jain, Mr. Anil Shah, Mr. Sameer Shah, Mr. Nilesh Chheda, Mr. Raju Shah, Mr. Kirti K. Shah, Mr. Vasant Kenia, Mr. Deepak Shah, Mr. Vinod Jain, Miss Shilpa Shah, Mr. Jitesh Mehta.

Mr. Raju Shah, President of Atlanta Jain Society, welcomed every one and announced events and activities for the next two days. Anop, JAINA President, called the meeting to order at 0.15 AM with the

9:15AM with the opening prayer by all. After a brief introduction by each, Anop offered many positive accolades in favor of JAINA volunteers. He remarked that as a result of committee

**Minutes of Executive Committee (EC)** meeting held on 3 Oct 2003 at Siddhachalam were approved. The minutes of Directors at Large meeting held on 4 Oct 2003 at Siddhachalam would be presented to Board of Directors for approval in Oct 04.

**Treasurer's report:** Jit announced that YJA has ~\$48K & YJP has ~\$6K. These monies are in separate accounts under the supervision of JAINA treasurer. Due to convention surplus and

Jain Exhibit: Presentation by Robert Arnett. Mr. Arnett made a Power Point presentation of a sample exhibit he has created regarding India. He proposed that a similar photo exhibit be created on Jainism/JAINA. Pravin volunteered to explore other available options.

**Technology Committee:** Girish Shah made a Power Point presentation outlining goals, objectives, scope and developmental process to revamp JAINA website. In addition, he outlined necessary elements of a website, as well as suggested a site menu and associated project time lines. Vinod Jain, web master of Jain World com, made an excellent presentation of his web site. He outlined his multi lingual web site and the global usage rate

including organizational infrastructure and the material content. He made recommendations as to how JAINA website may be organized and offered his assistance in this task.

**Membership Guidelines:** Sushil Jain led a brief discussion on this topic and requested that every one provide their comments. In the interest of time EC members will provide their written comments by e-mail by "Reply to All" for compilation. The EC noted that there are no dues for JAINA affiliate members. After a long deliberation, EC passed a resolution (EC03-006) that an affiliate member dues will be \$100 per year effective Jan 2005. However, the dues for 2003 will be \$50 effective July 2003. The Jain Visa Oshwal Group requested affiliate membership to JAINA. The EC will be mailed a copy of the package for deliberation at next teleconference.

**Constitution Committee:** A discussion was led by Sushil Jain to consolidate comments and suggestions. The EC members deleted comments and suggestions that did not warrant inclusion into constitution or the by-laws. The committee also agreed not to prioritize suggestions. The constitution committee will deliberate based on their research into each suggestion and make recommendations to EC.

**JAINA Logo:** Anop Vora led a discussion to review the current JAINA logo. One of Acharyajis in India pointed out that JAINA logo is out of proportion and recommended that JAINA should correct it. After a careful deliberation, including advantages and disadvantages a resolution (EC03-007) was passed to accept the JAINA logo as is and promote it with brief explanation as applicable.

JAINA Patron Program: Udai Jain reported that over 50 individuals have signed up in support of the program. As a result JAINA has generated pledges of over \$60K, of which over \$45k has already been collected. He informed of the confusion regarding the Patron program and JAINA Charitable Trust program. The EC members had healthy discussion regarding the question. In conclusion, everyone agreed that we should encourage donors to contribute and support at least one program. Ultimately both programs are set up in support of JAINA activity.

Wheel of Hope: Kirit Daftary made a slide presentation of committee's accomplishments since Oct 2003. At the end of presentation he presented a plaque that JAINA received from World Medical Relief for support, dedication and contribution to the needy.

Liability Umbrella policy: Kirit Daftary announced that he is working with Chandrakant Shah and Pravin Vakhani to obtain quotations from various sources. The EC authorized Kirit to spend up to \$2500 or less and proceed with the policy purchase ASAP to cover JAINA officers and representatives. **Teerthoddhar Committee:** Kirit Daftary reported that this committee will soon meet its objective of donating \$25K. This project was very successful and, as a result, the organizers in India are building additional schools. He further stated that JAINA is being recognized for the support we provide. He thanked every one for their continued support.

YJA Committee: Chirag Shah and Nisha Jain presented a very comprehensive report. They announced that the initial preregistration response is very good. They expect that the convention will be sold out very soon. The convention will focus on religion, mini series, and social services on topics such as "Young Jains to see, to know, to realize Jainism."

Chirag reported that there were multiple well attended mini regional conventions during the month of Nov and Dec. He closed by presenting a brief description of upcoming projects. Nisha, in charge of fund raising for YJA appealed to all and their respective Jain Society to financially support YJA efforts. Their goal is to achieve 100% participation from societies regardless of the amount donated. For additional details on YJA or convention, please visit. www.yja.org.

**YJP Committee:** Shilpa Shah and Jitesh Mehta outlined YJP mission, goals and objectives. He outlined how they will accomplish their goals as well as announced the names of new leadership and their roles. She presented the details of local leader program, community service program, past events and planned future events. For additional details, please visit. www.yjponline.org.

**Education Committee:** Pravin Shah presented the details of financial transactions conducted during this year. He informed that there is a worldwide demand for JAINA books. He added that his committee maintains that none of the material published by his committee is copywrited. People may duplicate as they wish on honor system. He described the books in print now and gave release dates. He thanked many members of his team for their hard work, especially Narendrabhai of Chicago for designing book covers.

JAINA Public Affairs Council: Sushil Jain reported that his team is working on a multimedia presentation regarding "JAINS and JAINA in Action in North America." He contacted many committees and requested chairs and Jain Society to send short video or pictures for inclusion, if not already done so. The JAINA members took part in two Washington area conferences; first titled "Compelled to Relationship – What does your scriptures say about it". Sushil Jain spoke at the conference explaining that concept of Anekantwad is one of the basic tenets of Jain

philosophy. The second conference dealt with "Religious accommodation and Care of ill and dying". This conference attended by Mamta Shaha, Ila Vora, Hema Pokharna and Sushil Jain was in partnership with clergy and doctors. Inspired by these conferences, this council is working on JAINA's guidelines for "Hospital Accommodation for Jains," as well as "JAINAs Social Justice Stands".

Senior Housing Project: Kirit Daftary reported that there were 46 responses to survey by committee, all from individuals eligible to retire in the next few years. The results uncovered that 80% will retire in next 4 years, of whom 90% want to move to Florida. Most (80%) wanted to either live in a town home or two bedroom apartments approximately 1500 square feet with kitchen facility. If offered, the option to purchase, most did not want to spend over \$160K and wanted to live close to hospitals, shopping, and temple facility. The respondents also indicated that most people prefer to live near their children and friends, regardless of the weather. The EC agreed that the data collected is interesting and that additional information would be useful.

**Long Range Planning:** Jit Turakhia distributed a survey to all and requested that everyone fill it out and mail to Yogendra Jain. He reported that the committee is interviewing many Jain families, JAINA leaders, Monks, Samniji, Scholars and pathshala teachers in an effort to establish community needs for JAINA to act upon. They hope to present their results in January 2005.

World Jain Confederation (WJC) & JAINA Partnership: During his visit to India Anop Vora attended meeting with Mr. Pratap Bhogilal, Dr N.P. Jain and other Jain leaders. A memorandum of partnership was developed to help with V. R. Raghavji Gandhi Memorial. Anop Vora appointed Pravin C. Shah, as the JAINA's representative to work on the project. In addition, JAINA will explore opportunity to develop educational material in English for broadcast in the western world in an effort to educate them about Jainism.

**Vegetarian Food Availability:** Anop Vora explained that many restaurants claim they serve vegetarian meal. However, research showed that this is not true. The fact is that some of these restaurants are cross-contaminating vegetarian foods with non-vegetarian foods as well as using meat by products in their recipes. Pravin Shah will contact Promodaben and Narendra Sheth for their continuous vigilante of identifying appropriate restaurants and foods good for Jains.

World Religion Conference: Pravin Shah reported that there are 18 delegates from N. America and most of them are presenting lectures and/or seminars on Jainism. The World Religion conference organizers have approached JAINA with the opportunity to partner in sponsoring lectures, seminars, mini series and or an evening event. The EC welcomes the opportunity and will explore further. JAINA Spectrum/ Pilgrimage Committee: Dilip V. Shah reported that JAINA has approved spectrum as the official site for JAINA news. This monthly web based newsletter reaches over 3500 individuals around the world and subscription is anticipated to grow to 7000 in no time. He urged everyone to send news releases with link to details of the story. Over 40 travelers went to Jaisalmer, Abu, Girnar and Palitana. Once again the organizers did an outstanding job resulting in successful yatra.

Ahinsa Center report: Girish Shah has been working with Dr. Tara Sethia to establish an Ahinsa Center at California State Polytechnic University. Prem Jain, Dilip Shah, as well as Sulekh Jain in India are exploring similar offers and initiatives. In the interest of streamlining JAINA resources and coordination, a resolution (EC03-007) was passed to appoint an ad-hoc JAINA Academic Liaison Committee of 5-7 people to explore all options and make their recommendation to EC. The EC recommends the following individuals as part of the committee: Sanjay Pandya, Pravin Shah, Dilip Shah, Prem Jain and Girish Shah. The committee may choose their chairperson for coordination.

**Jain Network Forum:** Sunil Jain submitted a written report stating that all YJA participants will be automatically enrolled in to JNF. Sunil will create a flyer to be distributed during YJA convention.

**Future Meetings:** The EC decided that the next Board of Directors and EC meetings would be in Santa Clara, CA on Friday, 2 July 2004, and at Siddhachalam on Saturday, 2 October 2004. The EC teleconference meetings will be on Friday, 30 April 2004 at 9:30 EST and Friday, 4 June 2004 at 9:30 EST.

JAINA announces the selection of Jain Center of Northern California (JCNC) to host 13th Biennial Convention. JAINA and JCNC selected the Santa Clara Convention Center in Santa Clara, California as the venue for the convention which will be held from July 1 to 4, 2005. A joint Board has been established to oversee the convention. ### PADAMSHREE SHRI KUMARPAL DESAI



Shri Kumarpal Desai (61), has been awarded the Padma Shri by the Govt. of India. He is a many-faceted personality. Director of Gujarat University's School of Languages and Dean of Faculty of Arts, Desai is an eminent litterateur, columnist, sportswriter and a scholar of Jainism and has more than 110 books to his credit of which nine have received awards from Central and state governments. He started writing at the age of eleven and now guides research students in the fields of Gujarati literature, journalism and Jain philosophy. He has received several awards including 'Ahimsa International, Deeptimal Adishwarlal Award for Literature for 1997', Best sports journalist award, Gujarat Ratna, Jain Jyotirdhar Award, President's Special Award 'Diwaliben Mohanlal Mehta Charitable Trust award for promoting spiritual values and Indian Culture', Jain Ratna' award and many more.

Sh. Desai regularly delivers lectures on Jainism in the US, UK, Singapore, Hong Kong, Belgium and Kenya. He attended as a key speaker on Jainism at the seventh biennial Jain convention at Pittsburgh in July 1993 and had addressed the World Parliament of Religions at Chicago (1993) and again at Cape Town in South Africa (1999). Desai was a member of the Jain delegation, which had an audience with Pope John Paul II at the Vatican.

### SACHIN JAIN WINS MAJOR NATIONAL SOROS GRADUATE FELLOWSHIP



Sachin Jain, a native of New Jersey, and now at Harvard Medical School, is among the thirty 2004 Paul and Daisy Soros New American Fellows. Fellows receive up to a \$20,000 stipend plus halftuition for as many as two years of graduate study at any institution of higher learning in the United States.

Almost 1000 applicants, who are naturalized citizens, resident aliens, or the children of naturalized citizens, completed applications this year. They represented 141 countries of national origin and came from 360 colleges and universities. The thirty fellows were selected from eightyfour finalists who were interviewed in New York and Los Angeles.

SACHIN JAIN is a second-year student at Harvard Medical School, where he is president of the Harvard Medical School Student Council. In 2002, SACHIN received his BA magna cum laude in Government from Harvard College. As an undergraduate, SACHIN co-founded a homeless health care clinic and was named a John Kenneth Galbraith Scholar. He has authored and published works in health policy while working at the Institute for Health Care Improvement and the Alpha Center. SACHIN has been awarded an Albert Schweitzer Fellowship to support his work with the homeless, as well as a President's Discretionary Fund grant from the Commonwealth Fund to lead the development of a health policy education program for medical students.

#### FIRST F. T. BACON MEDAL TO DR. HANS C. MARU



Dr. Hans Maru. Chief Technology Officer of FuelCell Energy, Inc. has received the FIRST F.T. Bacon Medal for fuel cell research and deployment. The award was presented on March 9 at a ceremony sponsored by the University of Connecticut's Global Fuel Cell Center. Dr. Maru is executive vicepresident and chief technology officer at FuelCell Energy, a leading manufacturer of stationary fuel cell power plants for distributed generation. He is an internationally recognized expert in the fuel cell field and has been granted 13 patents in this area.

The medal was established by the Connecticut Global Fuel Cell Center in conjunction with its first annual International Conference on Fuel Cell Development and Deployment held March 8-10 on the UConn Storrs, Conn., campus. The medal honors the memory and work of the late British scientist F.T. (Tom) Bacon, an early pioneer in the practical applications of fuel cell technology.

"The customers, employees and shareholders of FuelCell Energy benefit from Hans' technological leadership in bringing fuel cells to the point where they are no longer a mere laboratory curiosity or found only in space ships, but are available for commercial sale today."

Dr. Maru has authored over 140 publications, including chapters in two books. He has also edited from symposium proceeding volumes for fuel cells and batteries. He received a Ph.D. from Illinois Institute of Technology in Chemical Engineering in 1975.

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

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## Herculean Task on Humannitarian Front

Shree Bidada Sarvoday Trust follows Mother Teresa's footsteps in remote areas of Kutch

**Bidada, Kutch:** A humongous annual medical camp organized by Shree Bidada Sarvodaya trust(SBST), an NGO, at Bidada, to help poor and needy in remote areas of Kutch. The annual camp is organized every year for twenty days where thousands of patients take advantage of the facility and expertise of the doctors from USA,Canada, UK and big cities of India.

'A strong mind always hopes, and has always a cause to hope. SBST has proved to be an oasis in the desert of Kutch when it started its 30<sup>th</sup> Annual Medical camp on January 1 ushering in a new ray of hope to the people having health problems.



Vora Anop inaugurated the event on January 1<sup>st</sup>, 2004 in presence of many dignitaries including Acharya Chandanaji, Dr. Dhiraj Shah, Vijay Chheda. Bachubhai Rambhia, Inder Bindra, and Peter Bhedda of

Nargis Dutt Memorial Foundation. He was moved by the dedication and hard work of hundreds of volunteers who came from far away places to serve the poor and sick of people of rural India where scarcities are plenty. He was able to relate the pain of the rural folks because he himself has come from a small village-Pachhegam near Vallabhipur in Gujarat.

JAINA got involved with Bidada Sarvodaya Trust in 1992 and Dr.Dhiraj Shah, Chairman of World Community Service, a service arm of JAINA took the responsibility of providing doctors, volunteers and all the expenses of 1992-93 medical camp. He with the help of Dr, Manibhai Mehta of LA brought 40 doctors, 40 volunteers and \$130,000 to start this long lasting partnership between these two organizations. JAINA was honored by 49 different organizations from all over INDIA including the parliament of India represented by speaker Shivraj Patil and Health minister Mafatlal Fotedar. Since then this partenership has progressed and more and more doctors, volunteers and financial help is being provided by JAINA and Jain center of S.California. This year's camp was sponsored by Ramesh and Prafulla Shah of LA in memory of their sister in law.

The feeling of hundreds of people suffering from various diseases in remote rural areas of Kutch in Western India is difficult to express. The men and women volunteers, high ranking medicos and supporters of the SBST have changed the lives of thousands and generated hope for those who are alive but live life as dead. A land of extremities and hardship, the region has given birth to many generous and adventurous people in Kutch, who have scattered all around the globe but still have strong ties with the birthplace. They donate and help open heartedly to the poor and needy in their motherland.

Bidada is a small town in Mandvi taluka about 45 kms away from Bhuj in Kutch district. As its logo says-"Compassion in Action"- a small non-profit charitable organization, SBST arranged its first "Eye and Dental camp' in a Panjrapol (Animal Shelter) in 1974 in the remote area where no medical help was



available at that time. In 30 years, with dedication and devotion, the Trust has expanded its services and has become a household name in the area. It has a 50-bed hospital and arranges many medical camps during the year. The

Annual Medical camps draw many patients from not only Kutch but also from far away Rajasthan and Madhya Pradesh.

Chairman of the Trust Bachubhai Rambhia informed, "If the treatment is not available in SBST, we send patients to Mumbai for further treatment or major operations and patients do not have to pay anything."

Dr Dhiraj Shah of Buffalo,NY thanked the volunteers and donors for their time, talent and treasure and to build a bridge between Land of Deeds (karmabhumi) and Land of Birth. Anop Vora said, "I am honored to be a part of this noble work to help our community" Acharya Chandanashriji of Virayatan conveyed best wishes and told people to consider *janseva* as *prabhuseva*. (service to people is service to God). Virayatan is an organization in Kutch which provides free education and boarding to children and has become parents of the children who lost their parents in the earthquake of 2001.

Many humanitarian organizations from USA have joined hands with SBST to help people are Share & Care, AAPI, Nargis Dutt Memorial Foundation of NY, JAINA, Cultural Club of India, Wheel of Hope and many more. Ramesh Shah of Wheel of Hope said that by serving the community we can achieve spiritualism.

Past President Peter Bheddah and President Inder Bindra of Nargis Dutt Memorial Foundation.

As the winter sets in migratory birds from many parts of the world swoop down

on Kutch and similarly many doctors and volunteers of SBST also flock to the desert region. A team of well-known doctors and volunteers from India, US, England and Africa come to Bidada to serve in the huge Annual Medical camp every year. It is amazing to see the devotion of theses volunteers working 16 to 18 hours a day with a smile. Chichuben from Mumbai is a volunteer who visits SBST every year for many years. All day long she just washes legs of the patients with dedication who are going to be operated.

A pioneer volunteer couple Damayanti Jain and her husband Lax Jain started helping 25 years ago and now their daughter also joined the SBST.

Every year Consul General of USA visits the camp. This year Consul General Mr. Agnus Simons visited the camp with his wife Julia and their children. They visited the patients and were very much impressed to see the huge medical camp to ease the pain of the sufferers. As Julia said that we all are a huge family, sharing and caring very important values in life. She remarked," I am very happy to feel the warmth of the family



values here of helping people in need."

Hitesh Bhakta, Chairman of A A H O A (A s i a n American Hotel- Motel Owners Association) of USA, congratulated the Trust for its outstanding humanitarian service to

the community. "Service provided by SBST is extraordinary which we don't see anywhere in the world." He showed his eagerness to help SBST. "We can find many donors to help financially but it is rare to find the people who serve the community," he said.

Director of Tata Cancer Hospital Mumbai, Dr Dinsha visited the SBST. She talked about the increasing rate of cancer in Gujarat due to habit of chewing tobacco in different forms (Gutka). She explained that marriage and children at early age, lack of hygiene and education leads to cancer of uterus. She said "I was very much impressed with the work done by SBST and supported their work".

Member of Parliament, Dinesh Trivedi who is originally from Kutch said that he is proud of the organization and humanitarian work.

Many enthusiastic young interns also devoted their time and talent to the noble cause of helping needy and had unique experience.

Dr Manibhai Mehta, who is serving SBST for last 12 years said that there are many diseases due to environment and lack of education. Bladder stones are very common in Kutch due to scarcity of pure drinking water, extreme heat and lack of education. "With new technology and machines these stones can be removed without surgery, but these machines are very expensive. Donors and doctors can help to get them."

Cardiac Camps started in 1984 at SBST. Every year heart patients get free check up and selected patients are sent to LTMG Hospital, Sion, Mumbai for further treatments. This year 40 patients were selected for further treatment and the youngest patient is only two years old," said Popat Savla, a volunteer.

Mukesh Doshi, Director of Bidada Rehabilitation Institute and Research Center said, "This institute is the result of rising needs of the community." The new Rehabilitation center is built on 4 acre land and 18000 sq ft constructed area to provide education, preventive care, counseling and vocational training to bring back confidence despite their disabilities for better living in the society. It is also to help victims of the earthquake of 2001, physically and mentally challenged people.

Three Millions Treated and Served

Kunal Fadnis (16) from Baroda, a handsome, enthusiastic and energetic young man, is a volunteer to help to make prosthesis for the victims of the earthquake. It was very difficult to know that he had lost his both legs in the earthquake of 2001. He said that he could play basketball and can dance with the artificial limbs provided by SBST. "I also drive the car and my desire is to give dance performances in USA and UK." He smiled and happiness on his face was priceless.

Aminaben. a young woman was a victim of the earthquake, who lost one of her two daughters and was suffering from spinal cord injury said, "Today I can stand up only because of care and help of Mukeshbhai Doshi and staff of SBST. Now I am able to make living by working as a beautician."

Dr Mrudula Shah, Occupational Therapist from UK visited SBST for the first time and working 16 hours a day said that to be able to help other human beings was a great experience but it was very sad to see so many people suffering. "They need help and it is our duty to help them at our best. I will be coming next year again," she said.

Vijay Chheda, one of the trustees residing in California informed about the growth of the Trust in the past 30 years and have more than 34 medical specialties like-General Surgery, cancer, diabetic, endocrinology, urology, gastroenterology, squint eye, asthma and allergy, orthopedic, rehab medicine, arthritis, psychiatric, cardiology, rheumatic heart, ENT, dermatology, eye camp. Dental cap, pediatric, pediatric surgery, pediatric orthopedic, pediatric urology, pediatric cardiology, pediatric hematology/oncology, pediatric endocrinology, pediatric neurology, gynecology, epilepsy were treated in SBST. "This year 5433 patients for eyes, Cardiac 340, and pediatric 795 patients were treated. A total of 22,053 patients were treated during this camp which ended on January 20 sending the patients home with a gift of smile, sweets and clothes.

## A HOLISTIC APPROACH TO PEACE WITH SPECIAL REFERENCE TO NON-VIOLENCE AND THE ROLE OF WOMEN

History stands testimony to the fact that the 20th century has been an era of wars, unrest and wrath, with bloodshed, conflicts between nations and the terror of terrorism-that has doddered each heart living in apprehension in this dangerous and critical situation .The lure and pursuit of material pleasures has set the human race on the path of reckless exploitation. There is agony over the state of the world and the real tragedy is the plight of defenseless civilians, especially women and children, who fall a victim to the most ferocious and rampant onslaught, rape, torture, bull-dozing, mutilation of limbs, murder by firing squads and burgundy .The awe of weapons has been replaced by the horrendous chemical and bio-chemicals wars that has alarmed each soul and made life more dreadful than ever! What could be the reason behind such vehement acts?

Truly enough, they are the outcome of the evil thought-process brought into innocent minds by selfish power-mongers - the few whose only aim is to amass wealth, be the masters of the inanimate world, little realizing, that this momentary happiness is temporary in nature and this avarice can ruin the lives of their kith and kin, the state, the nation and take toll of the entire world.

The so called modern man in an era of science and technological progress appears to be deeply engrossed in a restless race that yearns him to pile up lifeless material possessions and life taking armaments, little knowing that the so called palace of pleasure is built on the summit of a silent looking volcano which will annihilate all the priceless treasures that have been bestowed by the economic and pragmatic mind in the twinkling of an eye. The fire of animosity and atrocity is burning at the threshold of our homes and we have no other alternative but to combat it.

Mindless terrorism and wars in the name of religion should be eradicated. The human race has to be prevented from the scourge of war that brings untold misery destruction, devastation, and frustration. A holistic approach to peace is the immediate requirement to the dreadful situation. What then is peace? Peace, is a relative term that cannot be defined directly. According to my understanding, peace can be defined as:

1) Individual Peace and

2) Peace in Society

**INDIVIDUAL PEACE**: Individual Peace is a state of being in which one's mind is calm and serene. A state when one feels totally relaxed with the absence of causes of unrest like stress, excitement, desire, agony and tension.

**PEACE IN SOCIETY:** It is a state of co-operative, peaceful co-existence with the development of feeling of tolerance, mutual understanding where each one honors another's view-point, lives and wants others to live for the welfare of all living creatures of the universe in total harmony with a feeling of fraternity and friendliness. Such a situation cannot be brought about by law-making bodies, government decrees, force and coercion, but by arousing internal consciousness and inculcating feelings of love, compassion, friendliness and equanimity with the one and only aim of service to mankind.

<u>PURPOSE OF THE PAPER</u>: As a solution to the problems of peace I have tried to highlight as to how the age-old principle of Non-Violence laid down by Lord Mahavira, can help in establishing the long-lost peace in society and how -women can play a vital role in inculcating these values and bringing about awareness alertness and awakening, so that peace, progress and prosperity can be globally restored once again.

**NON-VIOLENCE** Never before in the history of the world has such a grave situation occurred where people in every nook and corner of the world have been in a disastrous situation, living in fear of death due to unpredictable bomb-blasts and other forms of violence. Life and non-violence are integrally related. Lord Mahavira has called it Universal and everlasting. As a matter of fact, no culture can survive in its absence. It forms the basis of all religions. Not a single religion in the world advocates violence. What then is Non-Violence or Ahimsa?

Acharya Amritchandra defines Ahimsa as,

"The non-appearance of attachments and passions and their appearance as Himsa or Violence."

The Sixth Chapter of Dasavaikalika Sutra describes Ahimsa as:

'A disciplined behavior towards every living being."

The Yogasutra of Patanjali pronounces Ahimsa as: "The absence of violence of all sorts towards all beings at all times." The Chhandogyopanishad, Bhagvad Gita, Sankhya, Buddhists have all criticised violence. Also, the Jewish religions, Taoists, Confucianism have all condemned violence of all kinds.

Thus, Ahimsa is neither a rule nor ritual, but a disciplinary act for all people at all times.

#### THE ROOT CAUSES OF VIOLENCE:

1) The most significant cause of violence is 'Parigraha', meaning possession. The economic systems today, are based on promoting wants rather than curbing them.

2) The ever-increasing attachment towards materialistic objects.

3) The immense avarice to acquire more and more by fair or foul means.

4) Intolerance towards other religions is also a grave cause.

5) At the social level, pride and craving for power, racial discrimination, communalism, provincial and national prejudice between nations

6) Agitation and turbulence of thoughts derived from conflicting ideas.

7) At the international level, it is the greed for power and territorial expansion, cold wars, arms race.

THE EFFECTS OF VIOLENCE: Violence, in all its forms, induces fear, depression and uncertainty in the minds of people. It weakens one's mental balance, concentration and work efficiency. How can one think of helping the society or the nation when he himself and his family are insecure? This insecurity creates strong dislike, hatred, jealousy and mutual rivalry among individuals. The lure of possessiveness causes disparity, inequality and unrest, which ultimately hinders social, economic, political and religious harmony.

SOLUTIONS TO WORLD PROBLEMS BY MEANS OF NON-VIOLENCE: 1) As mentioned in the Acaraanga Sutra: 'All beings love to live, no one likes pain and misery, therefore we must have reverence for life. According to Mahatma Gandhi, if the world adopts Ahimsa of Bhagwan Mahavira, Peace will bless the universe. Nevertheless, he emphasizes that, "Non-violence is not a resignation from all real fighting against wickedness", hence crimes and terrorist acts should not be pardoned.

2) Says Dr.K.C.Sogani, that: 'The virtues of non-violence and aparigraha are capable of establishing universal peace. Therefore if these virtues are understood at the International level, the attitude of non-violence will synchronise'. Hence we need to build up a strong and cohesive social structure and put in selfless, on-going effort to work for just and fair international relations and spread the message of peace to remove hatred and malice and thereby totally eradicate the negative thought-process and transform it to positivity.

3) Says Victor Hugo, 'War begins in the minds of men'. The mind is both the master and the slave of the body it lives in, and the mind and body are so intimately interconnected through the nervous system that all the voluntary and involuntary functions of the entire system are affected by it. In other words, the thoughts that occur lead to actions. Hence it is absolutely essential to divert the impure, destructive thoughts to pure, constructive thoughts before it is too late. The outlook of education therefore needs orientation. From the very beginning a strong dislike and hatred for violence should be aroused .The children need to be taught moral lessons of peace, ahimsa, love, empathy, friendliness, compassion and equanimity and made to realize that passions like anger, pride, deceit and discontent are the root causes of unrest hence need to be lessened. Psychologist Mona Nanavati strongly feels that a well-trained mind will go a long way to understand the feelings of others and will help one to be more compassionate.

4) At the political level, mutual rivalry, jealousy, the deep incentive to usurp power should be considerably reduced and no unlawful intention to encroach on others land and property should be encouraged. The power mongers need to understand that the strength and power of non-violence is tremendous and more stable and healthy as compared to the ephemeral power derived from terror and violence.

5) At the social level, malpractices in business, trade and profession for amassing wealth should be blown out. Hoarding should be greatly curtailed. Principles of justice, impartiality should be developed.

6) Strong measures must be taken to curtail the growth of violence on grounds of race, caste, creed etc. All should be treated equally. There should be no injustice towards the weak and suppressed.

7) The subtle aspect of non-violence lies in the change in the inner self of the individual, to strengthen the feelings of peace, fraternity, tolerance, fellow-feeling and equality giving prime importance to reverence for life, vegetarianism, prevention of cruelty to animals and protecting the environment.

8) Intentional injury should be totally avoided, while a tyrant, oppressor or a terrorist should be taken to task. The mischief monger must not be spared, and the laity may use his arms to punish the culprit and scoundrel or such a person who tries to disturb the peace in society.

9) Moral laws should govern the world order. The rights of individuals, the oppressed, weak and minorities should be protected. International economic co-operation must be developed. Duties must be followed religiously.

10) Mere talks at Seminars and Conferences cannot serve any purpose. To overcome the present situation scholars, saints JAIN DIGEST- Spring 2004 / 15 and eminent social and political leaders need to work hand in hand and with the help of media try to promote and propagate the principles throughout the world.

#### THE ROLE OF WOMEN IN ACHIVING PEACE

At the outset, one may wonder why I have selected women as a key solution to the problem of peace and questions may arise in many minds as to what can a women do? I would rather like to counter question, what not can a woman do? We have just talked about inculcating the several principles like Ahimsa, Anekantavada and Aparigraha, but the question is who should take over the task and when and where should it begin? The one and only answer to this question is 'at home', by none other than the most competent, greatly neglected fairer sex -'THE WOMAN'.

Yes, the society, the community or a nation cannot solve the persistent grave problems of war and terrorism single-handedly.

Says Kalelkar, "Women in fact are not weak. There is no reason why she should be dependant on men. There is no eternal rule that leadership in society should always remain in the hands of men".

#### PLACE OF WOMEN IN SCRIPTURES

2,600 years back, Lord Mahavira pronounced that women are equal to men in all respects. He admitted and initiated several women like princess Chandrabala, and women of many other castes into his order without any caste distinction. In fact, Dr. Hemchandra warned men to beware of women, and emphasized upon the dependency of men to women in all fields of life- "in infancy, youth and old age". Moreover,

the Vedas, Puranas and the Upanishads have shown women to be the greatest force of nature, a creator of mankind. The Bhagwat Gita also talks about the greatness of women in the tenth Adhayaya. 'Manu' too talks about honoring women. The Aiterya Upanishad shows regards and stresses upon the fact that a child carriers forward the thoughts and manners of his mother. The Satpath Brahmana says that the mother is the child's first teacher, for from the foetal state, the child imbibes the thoughts, words and actions of the mother. In the Naradasmriti Dr. Sunanda Shashtri emphasizes on several rituals being performed by women, like choosing her husband at the 'Swayamavara', giving the daughter in marriage in default of fathers and brothers after the elders tested the 'Grooms' masculinity.

#### WOMEN IN GENETIC SCIENCE

According to Gynaecologist Dr. Jayesh Sheth, the monthly realease of the specific hormone,"Estrogen" is responsible for the peculiar feminine nature .It is for this reason that women are very affectionate, loving, tolerant, calm and composed as against the violent, aggressive and criminal nature of men. Adds Dr. Murari Nanavati, that genetic studies too reveal that though men are physically stronger, it is the lady , who is physiologically, psychologically and emotionally stronger and superior to men.

#### WHAT THE UN SECURITY COUNCIL OPINES

The most remarkable example of mass participation of women leading to great success is the 'Satyagraha Movement of the great leader Mahatama Gandhi. At several other instances they have proved their worth in socio-economic affairs, and the religious and political front. A woman's zeal, prowess, deep insight, her inborn compassion and tolerance traits and willingness to sacrifice whole-heartedly, gives her an edge over her male counterparts. The selfless service of Florence Nightingale, the sacrifice of Joan of Arc, the dedication of Mother Teresa cannot be forgotten. From all the above description, it is clear that a woman is the most capable, efficient and the most appropriate person to promote PEACE.

Thus, wars have to be abandoned and peace has to be restored to immediately, before it is too late, before human race comes to the verge of extinction. In short, 'The welfare of humanity lies in practicing and professing the principles of Non- violence to solve the problem of unrest, insecurity with the whole-hearted intervention of women who can help bring back the long-lost peace in all walks of life. Such a Holistic approach will prove to be successful in bringing about awareness and alertness about the disasters of war and the pleasures of peace in the minds of men and only then can the society, the state, the nation and the world look forward to a prosperous and progressive future where the wants will be minimized, the mind will be non-aggressive and nonviolent and there will be eternal peace and harmony!!

The Jalmandir lake is so polluted that there are no lotus blooming on the surface and town people are using it to wash laundry or worst, for fishing. The Government of India has recently awarded funds for the cleanup of the lake but the town has definitely deteriorated and is crying out for help. Hardly any Jains live there, vegetarianism is all but forgotten and most kids practice just one thing – begging. Town elders are blaming Jain Pilgrims of havingg turned their town to Beggar's heaven!

Acharya Shri Chandanaji of Veerayatan is trying to solve this blemish on Jain Heritage. Veerayatan has purchased a parcel of land to build a Jain School suitable for a thousand students to pull the kids off the street and prepare them for productive life and instill Jain values in them. Acharya Shri Chandanaji would like to have state government declaring it a holy site- a zone of non violence – preventing selling of meat or fish etc at Pavapuri, Lachhwar and Samet Shikharji. She has asked JAINA to help in the building of the school. JAINA's participation can be a powerful statement of our unity and our resolve to make a difference in the lives of thousands in a land dear to all Jains everywhere. ## INTERFAITH INITIATIVES



## YATRA 2004

2004 JAINA YATRA to teerthdhams of Rajasthan and Gujarat started on January 18<sup>th</sup>. JAINA President Anop Vora and incoming President of Jain Social Group Federation Dr. Chandrakant Shah wished us a happy pilgrimage at a small gathering in Matunga, Bombay that morning. We visited three temples in Matunga before boarding a train to Falna near Ranakpur our first stop. After the night stop in cottages of a hotel that looked more like a nature's preserve, we undertook a long bus trip to Jaisalmer. We stopped overnight in Jodhpur and visited temples of Osiyaji and Falodi.

In Khichan, a farming village near Falodi, we visited a hospital inspired by Acharya Shri Kalapurnsuriji, and run by Dr. Kanti Jain who had done research on diabetes in the US for more than 25 years and has now devoted all of her wealth and her life to this rural hospital servicing population of more than 300,000. The most remarkable thing about this hospital was the cleanliness and pleasant atmosphere miles away from any major city but equipped with very modern equipment. Our yatris including many physicians greatly admired devotion of Dr Jain, one person making such a difference in the lives of hundreds and thousands of people.

In Jaisalmer, we had a wonderful local guide, a devout Jain who loved every carving and knew every nook and cranny of the vast Temple Complex, patiently explaining religious significance, artistic uniqueness and historical facts. In the afternoon we got to see the world famous Patwa Havelis and the Thar Desert. At night, in a palace like hotel Rang Mahal, local folk dancers performed during the dinner. Next morning we visited Temples of Lodravpur and Amarsagar before reaching Sri Nakodaji. We were greatly surprised by the new Dharmsala we stayed in. Next day we visited a newly built Teerth Pawapuri. After visiting the famous Delwara Temples in Abu, we went to Nakhi lake and sunset point to admire nature's gift. Next day being Republic day of India, we were invited to the flag hoisting ceremony in the Polo ground where children from all the schools in town presented a patriotic program.

Before reaching Mehsana, we visited Temples of Kumbhariyaji and Taranga. Next day we reached Shankeswara. In Shankheswara, we had arranged to spend half a day with Shri Jambuvijyaji Maharaj. He gave a moving lecture on the power of Navakar Mantra, answered questions from Yatris and for those willing, gave them vows of refraining from certain ABHAKSYA AAHARS. At night we participated in a Bhavana inside the temple. Next day we started by bus to Junagadh via Rajkot.

We started Pahad Yatra of Junagadh at 5.00 in the morning. The weather was nice and yatris had a very comfortable and smooth Yatra without any difficulty. Some even climbed the highest peak temple of Ambaji. At least the Palitana Yatra after this would be a breeze! Just outside the town of Palitana we saw a huge colorful tent in a field. It was a "CHHA RI PALAT SANGH" a 600 yatri sangh that had been traveling by foot for 14 days. In the best of Jain tradition the Sanghpati of such a large Sangh honored our Sangh, invited us for dinner and gave our yatris Prabhavaña. Our Yatris got to see how traditional Sangh yatras are done. Their youngest member, a seven-year old girl sang a stuti for us and Acharya Maharaj recited Manglik.

The next Teerth on our itinerary, Palitana Pahad Yatra was what every one was anxious for. Again early morning start of Yatra was a peaceful, pious and joyful day for everyone. At night a few of us visited a Kutchhi Sangh of 1200 Yatris performing rites of 99 Yatras. We got to see a procession honoring the Aarti and Mangal Divo with an elaborate celebration and music conducted by Sri Narendra Nandu.

On the last day of the yatra, we were in Ahmedabad. It was the day of Bakari Id, a holiday but Dr. Jitendra Shah, Director of L .D. Institute of Indology opened the museum and the institute especially for our Yatris. Shri Shrenikbhai, Chairman of Anandji Kalyanji Trust came to pay his respect to the Sangh and answered questions put by Yatris. A scholar of ancient languages (Prakrit etc.) showed us old Jain manuscripts and we got the tour of the museum of Jain art. Later we went to Ashapuram hospital managed by Dr Shekhar Chand Jain. We got to see many parts of the facility donated by various individual Jains from North America. For the benefit of our Sangh, Dr. Jain had arranged first public felicitation of Shri Kumarpal Desai who had just received Padmashree Award from the President of India. Yatris presented a plaque from JAINA honoring Dr. Kumarpal and he asked if JAINA could arrange a Sangh Yatra from India to the Temples of North America. Dr. Dhiraj Shah on behalf of our Yatris and JAINA, invited Kumarpalbhai to lead such a sangh and assured JAINA's hospitality. At night we visited the temple at Hathisingh's Wadi and our Yatra concluded.

As always, we were fortunate to have a scholar – Diptiben Shah join our Yatra as we got the benefit of her lectures during tedious bus journeys. At each of the temples she was explaining religious significance, We also had a one yatri observing her Varshi Tap that acted as a spiritual leader of the Sangh. Patni Tours had once again excelled themselves in organizing the tour and serving memorable meals.

# AHINSA

The Non-Violence

Samayä Savvabhooesu Sattu-Mittesu Vä Jage Pänäiväyaviraee Jävajjivae Dukkaram. – Uttarädhyayan Sutra

(Equanimity towards all beings in the universe, to the friends as well as the foes, is Ahinsa;, (though) it is hard to refrain from hurting the living beings for the entire life.)

The first Sunday of October, we celebrate as Ahinsa Din or the day of non-violence. This is in token of the birth day of Mahatmä Gändhi who was born on October 2 1869. He gained freedom for India by conducting a non-violent struggle for independence against the Britishers who had occupied India. His principal mission was to extend the observance of Ahinsa in every walk of life. He said that Ahinsa was his life as well as breath. The celebration of his birth day as Ahinsä Din is thus in tune with his concept. It would however be worthwhile to examine that concept at some length.

Ahinsä or nonviolence literally means not to hurt. Though having thus a negative derivation, it has very positive connotation. The concept of Ahinsä is based on the fact that every living being wishes to be happy and tries to avoid pain. Hurting results in pain. Therefore in order to avoid giving pain, we should refrain from hurting others. For most of the people, this approach is restricted to the realm of human beings. There are some who go beyond that and would not like to hurt the animals as well. But their concept is usually limited to the domesticated animals. 2500 years ago, Lord Mahävir extended the concept of non-violence to all the living beings. He could visualize that not only the minutest insects, but most of the seemingly inanimate objects like vegetation also are one-sensed living beings. They have life and undergo the sense of pleasure and pain. He therefore urged to refrain from hurting even such one-sensed beings.

As long as we live, we happen to hurt many living beings. The air that we breathe and the water that we drink contain minute organism. Even the vegetarian food that we may take is prepared from plant life which has to be destroyed for the sake of our food. The question would then arise: 'How is it possible to observe nonviolence?' The plain answer is that it is impossible to stay totally non-violent, because indulging in some sort of violence is inevitable for the survival. Lord Umäswäti therefore defines violence as 'Pramattayogät Pränvyavaropanam Hinsä'. It means that the deprival of life on account of non-vigilance is violence. For all practical purposes, non-violence is therefore defined as avoiding all possible violence. As such, Jainism exhorts every one to undertake all necessary activities in a way that does not cause avoidable violence. For our requirement of food also, it asks us to take only vegetarian food and that too of the type that does not involve multi-organism.

This is only a physical and rather superficial aspect of the concept. But Ahinsä has a deeper and subtler significance. Physical non-violence, we observe primarily for the sake of pity. True Ahinsä requires the elevation of that sense of pity to the level of sympathy and compassion by developing sensitivity for others. As believers of Ahinsä, we cannot remain content with not hurting others and stay insensitive to their pain and misery that may be caused by other factors. True observer of Ahinsä has to develop the sympathetic attitude. He should get rid of the feelings of anger, arrogance, animosity, jealousy and hostility that defile the mind and generate the violent instinct.

Such feelings mainly arise because of wrong perception. In the life, we come across different situations from time to time. We happen to perceive some of them as favorable and some as unfavorable. If we perceive any situation as painful, unfavorable and against our interest, we react to that with sense of dislike, hate, aversion, abhorrence etc. and try to change it to our liking and satisfaction. There is nothing wrong in trying to change it, as long as we do it calmly, peacefully and without hurting others. But if situations do not change favorably, we happen to feel perturbed or distressed and blame or curse the unfavorable situations for that. We may also attribute motives to the persons concerned with those situations and indulge in wrath, anger, animosity and hostility towards them.

We fail to realize that our perception might be wrong. As a matter of fact, the situations that we perceive as painful, might be pleasurable to others. We also fail to indirectly responsible for such situations. The wrong perception arises because we fail to think dispassionately and also because we might be feeling that our self interest would be at stake, if the situation does not change favorably.

Our concept of self interest however generally happens to be parochial. We therefore nurse grudge for the people whom we perceive as acting against our interest. We fail to realize that the

person, against whom we have grudge, may or may not get hurt by our action; but our narrow-mindedness does hurt us by defiling our mind. It is a fact that if we adopt broad and liberal approach, others too tend to reciprocate. The reciprocity is the innate nature of living beings. This is observed even in the case of animals. If we are kind to them, they express, in their own way, the sense of gratitude. Human beings have better and more sensible way to reciprocate. We are however prone to forget this aspect and happen to ill treat other beings. Such hurting amounts to transgressions of this restraint. If we cannot avoid all types of such trannsgressions, we should at least not get involved in the following types as laid down in the Vanditu Sutra:

#### Vaha Bandha Chhavichchhea Aibhäre Bhatta Pän Vuchchhea Padham Vayassaiäre Padikkame Desiam Savvam

It means that if I have indulged in transgressions of the first restraint in the form of deprival of life or tying too hard or amputation or overloading or depriving of food and drinks during the day, I atone for the same.

If we remember that all living beings have identical souls and all of them are destined to gain liberation sooner or later, our outlook towards them would change. We can then realize that by indulging in defilement towards any one else, we happen to defile our soul. With that realization, we would develop regard for every soul and stop perceiving any one as our foe. If any of them undergoes pain or misery, we would have sympathy and compassion for him. Eventually, this would lead to sense of amity. Extending the compassion and amity to every being is the symbol of true Ahinsä.

In order to illustrate true Ahinsä, let us take an event of Lord Mahävir's life. During the 11th year of his spiritual pursuit, a heavenly being named Sangam perpetrated terrible distress on the Lord in order to break his bearing capacity. For that purpose Sangam created a havoc during one night, while the Lord was meditating. Any other person would have been killed by those atrocities. Lord Mahävir however remained steadfast in the meditation and did not develop any ill will for Sangam. In the morning when Sangam was almost exhausted of inflicting pain, he saw tears in the eyes of the Lord. At last, he thought, he had succeeded in breaking the Lord's will. The Lord could read his mind and therefore said that the tears did not any way indicate his breakdown; they were flowing out of compassion for the horrible fate that Sangam had acquired for himself by inflicting the pain. This has been depicted by Acharya Hemachandrasuri in the following verse of the Sakalärhat Sutra

#### Krutäparädhepi Jane Krupä Manthar Tärayoh Ishad Bäshpärdrayorbhadram Shrivirajin Netrayoh

It means: 'Blessed are the eyes of Lord Mahävir that got wet with tears of compassion even for the one who had been the offender.' A true Ahinsak has this sort of innate compassion even for the offenders.

Mahatmä Gändhi also could show the capacity of positively reacting to others' wrongs. He had to face terrible distress from the Durban whites, when he went back to South Africa. He however felt that the whites indulged in such action on account of their misunderstanding about him and therefore declined to take any action against the offenders. In tune with that thinking, he evolved the movement of civil dis-obedience and non-violent resistance to all unjustifiable rules and regulations. During that movement he was careful to see that no harm is done even to his opponents. He did not want even to mentally hurt any one. His concept of non-violent resistance was effective there and ultimately that very concept gained independence for India. At the time of Partition of India, when communal situation got out of control, the Govt. had to deploy large military force for maintaining civic order in the west. For the eastern border, however, Mahatma Gandhi constituted one-man army for reestablishing the communal harmony. He had a vision to exile non-violence from the world.

The next day in Gujarat Vidyapeeth, founded by Mahatma Gandhi, The International Centre for Jain Studies arranged, at their Prayer Hall, for Pramodaben's special lecture on *Reverence for Life for All Religions through Ahimsa*. After being welcomed and honoured by the Vice-Chancellor, Registrar and Principal, she gave an inspiring lecture with many religious references, practical examples, and psychological analysis of present conditions of today's societies, stressing humanity, human relations, and social tolerance. Hundreds of students were stimulated and inspired. Her dominant emphasis was that a nonviolent lifestyle is the only way to replace the present violence.

## SATYA The Truth

Musäväo Cha Logammi, Savvasähuhim Garihio Avisäso Cha Bhuyänam, Tamhä Mosam Vivajjae — Dashvaikälik Sutra

(Telling lie has been denounced by all the saints in the universe. Lie causes distrust among the people and should therefore be given up.)

By truth, we normally mean not to tell lies. This is verbal truth which has its own importance. Let us therefore first examine its implications in dealing with other people. If we happen to believe that what a person speaks, is true, we can rely upon his statement. In that case, we can afford to take action in light of what he states. But if we have doubts about what he says, that causes distrust as stated in the above mentioned verse of the Dashvaikälik Sutra. In that case, we have to find out the truth before coming to any decision. If people speak truth, the life would be easy and dealing with one another can be smooth. Speaking truth is therefore in overall interest and is helpful to every one.

The purpose of telling lie is to hide some fact. On the other hand, truth discloses it. But the question that would arise, is about a statement that is verbally true but which purports to hide the reality from the responding party. For instance, it is possible to make use of equivocal words that can enable the conveyer to interpret it the way he likes, while causing the respondent to draw different conclusion. Or, one may deliberately indulge in ambiguous words so as to keep the other party in dark about the reality. In such cases, the speaker usually intends to hide the truth while making apparently correct statement. That makes it hard for the other party to correctly understand the situation. In order to avoid this, it has been laid down that truth must be unambiguous and unequivocal. With this view in mind, Mahätmä Gändhi has said that in case of unclear statements, the meaning drawn by the respondent should be considered as binding. If this standard is applied in every case, no one would be tempted to indulge in ambiguity or equivocality.

Another aspect of truth is that it has to be beneficial. The scriptures, while dealing with truth, frequently mention: Satyam Hitakaram Cha. It means that what one speaks, should be true as well as beneficial. So the question arises: 'What should we do when we think that speaking truth would not be beneficial?' This is a very pertinent question, because we do come across situations in which it may not be beneficial or even appropriate and advisable to speak truth. Do we have to state the truth even when it evidently seems undesirable?

For replying to that question, let us examine an anecdote of the time of Lord Mahävir. One of his principal pupils was Muni Metärya, who is also known as Metäraj Muni. One afternoon, the Muni went to the house of a goldsmith for alms of food. At that time, the goldsmith was preparing barley shaped grains of gold for making some costly jewelry. Seeing the Muni at his door, he left his work and went inside to get some articles of food. Meanwhile, the Muni noticed that a pet bird of the goldsmith came there and swallowed the golden grains thinking them to be the real barley grains. As the goldsmith came out with the food, he saw that the grains of gold were missing. He therefore asked the Muni about the whereabouts of the precious grains.

For Muni it was a dilemma. He could not tell a lie and if he spoke the truth, the goldsmith would kill the bird for getting the grains out of its stomach. In that case, the Muni would become instrumental in causing the violence. He therefore decided to keep mum. The goldsmith asked him again and again, but the Muni would not reply. Since there was no one else there and since no reply was forthcoming from the Muni, the goldsmith concluded that the Muni had somewhere hidden the golden grains. He could not afford to lose the costly grains and therefore decided to use force for getting the same back.

As the normal force did not yield any result, the goldsmith decided to resort to extremely violent means. He brought a moist lace of leather and tightly tied it round the Muni's head. Then he made the Muni to stand under the sun. As the lace began to dry by the sun's heat, it started compressing the Muni's head. The compression went on increasing as the lace got drier. Ultimately, the eyes of the Muni came out on account of too much pressure. The Muni however took the pain as a consequence of some evil Karma that got operative and bore the same with equanimity. This accelerated Nirjarä or the eradication process of Muni's Karmas. Thereby, all his Karmas were destroyed and he gained omniscience on the spot.

Meanwhile, the bird could not digest the golden grains and excreted the same. As the goldsmith saw that, he repented very much for the distress perpetrated by him. It was however too late for him, because Muni's soul had already left the mortal body.

The question may arise what one should do under similar circumstances. Religion expects us not to indulge in violence or to be instrumental to the same by any of our physical or verbal activity. If a person is spiritually oriented, he cannot therefore speak anything that would result in violence to other beings. Metärya Muni could have saved his life as well as that of the bird, if he had fabricated some story acceptable to the goldsmith. That would however amount to telling a lie which the Muni could not do. He therefore decided to sacrifice his life1 for saving the life of the bird. Some persons may perhaps think this as violence to oneself. But implication of the term applies to the violence caused to others not to oneself. Sacrificing one's own life willingly for saving others is not violence.

In addition to being beneficial, truth has to be nice so as to render it palatable. We come across many cases when people expressing some truth, present it bluntly and some times bitterly. They seem to be thinking that bitterness is inevitable for stating truth. They have to realize that truth need not be unpleasant. It can be expressed sweetly and nicely. The approach should be Satyam, Shivam, Sundaram which means that what one speaks should be true, beneficial and nice. Prima facie, it may not seem easy to put this into practice. But if a person stays vigilant enough, it would not be hard to do so. The experience gained from that would show that the amount of patience and the sacrifice, if any, required for the purpose was worthwhile. Spiritual aspirants should particularly put this into practice. Every such person has to overcome the impatience and be prepared for the sacrifice required in observance of truth.

The Pauränic story of the king Harishchandra describes how he faced all sorts of adversities and distress for keeping his word. That story has been considered an ideal for those who have regard for truth. Mahätmä Gändhi was highly impressed by watching a dramatic version of that story in his childhood. That caught his imagination. He writes in his autobiography that he repeatedly played the drama in his mind and while visualizing the distress that Harishchandra faced, tears rolled from his eyes. His mind got hold of the idea that every one should be truthful. The importance that he attached to truth can be traced to that story.

But all of us cannot be Harishchandras. Sacrificing for the sake of truth is not easy and may be beyond the capacity of ordinary people. In our routine life, we happen to indulge in lies on many occasions. Sometimes we tend to conceal the truth for the sake of our self interest as perceived by us. Sometimes we like to tell lie for securing some gain or for averting some loss. Such situations generally arise from our short sightedness. If we are enlightened enough, we can easily see that the so called self interests are not in our genuine interest. But we are unfortunately not immune from pursuing parochial gain and at times we resort to lies, even though that may be harmful to others. Total observance of truth being rather difficult, Jainism lays down two levels for its observance. It lays down total observance of truth for monks and nuns. They have renounced the worldly life and are not after any material gain. They can therefore afford to make any sacrifice for the sake of truth. For the laymen, Jainism insists on refraining from making statements that would grossly hurt others.

The Jain tradition lays down that at least the following five types of statements that involve gross transgressions of this restraint should be avoided:- 1) Sudden utterance that would shock others, 2) Disclosure of the close secrets, 3) Divulgence of spousal secrets, 4) Wrong teaching and 5) Forgery. If any one happens to indulge in such transgressions, he should recall the same and beg for their atonement.

But resorting to verbal truth in a way that does not harm any one, is only a small and rather superficial aspect of truth. In Jain terminology, we call it Vyavahär Satya or practical truth. Satya has however a deeper and subtler implication. The word Satya is derived from 'Sat' which means existence. As such, whatever exists is Satya. The science now conforms to the concept that nothing can be destroyed in entirity. But Jainism has been believing it since the very beginning. It lays down that whatever exists, continues to exist in one or other form and what we term as production or destruction, happens to be a transformation. Thus 'Sat' means everlasting existence. Understanding the nature of the everlasting substances and behaving in tune with that nature is therefore real Satya.

It has also to be remembered that Satya and Dharma (truth and religion) are not different from each other. It would be of interest to note that Jainism defines religion as Vatthu Sahävo Dhammo which literally means that nature of a thing is religion. In this context, Vatthu stands for everlasting substances that we know as Dravyas. Jainism lays down that there are six such Dravyas in all. Of these, we are mainly concerned with Jiva or soul. For all practical purposes therefore, Satya is soul, which is also known as Brahman, Ätmä, Chaitanya, consciousness etc.

To speak and to act in tune with the nature of the soul is therefore religion as well as truth. This is the supreme truth and is known as Paramärth Satya as distinguished from Vyavahär Satya. A truthful person has thus to be primarily concerned about the well being of his soul. If one has the right perspective, he can easily see that by resorting to lie, he may or may not hurt others, but he surely hurts his own soul by defiling it with the lie. Observance of truth or Satya is thus in one's own interest.

## GURUDEV CHITRABHANUJI's visit in Ahmedabad – GUJARAT International Conference on world peace

#### War Is Dehumanizing

Gurudev Shri Chitrabhanuji, visited Ahmedabad – Gujarat, India - from the 31<sup>st</sup> of December 2003 to the 4<sup>th</sup> of January 2004. Invited to attend the International Conference on World Peace, organized by the Department of Philosophy of Gujarat University, as one of the Chief Guests, he chaired the afternoon session of the conference, where a large number of the scholar-delegates presented papers on various aspects of World Peace. Gurudev summarized his message by saying that, "War is ugly and Peace is beautiful. There cannot be a good War or a bad Peace! So, we have to heighten our awareness to a level of unconditional Love and Compassion for the other. Only then can we bring about peace in our lives and in the lives of others, which is the very foundation of World Peace."

Next morning, in the plenary session of the conference, Gurudev delivered a lecture on the subject "Universal Peace through Ahimsa and Friendship." He gave the message of Bhagwan Mahavira that only through Ahimsa and Amity one can get real peace. Ahimsa envisions one's counterpart in others. Now there is no 'others'! It is a state of universality of total consciousness. For this purpose one has to make his/her own efforts without passing on responsibilities to others. More than five hundred scholar-delegates, coming from over forty different countries, listened spellbound.

#### **Be Universal Man**

On the 2<sup>nd</sup> of January 2004, Gurudev Shri Chitrabhanuji presided over a function conducted by the Gandhinagar Kelwani Mandal, Madhuri Mansukhlal School at Koba, near Gandhinagar, Gujarat. On this occasion, he honored the outstanding students of the school. While addressing them, he narrated beautiful stories about how they should endeavor to enrich themselves with knowledge and culture, and to acquire discerning sense of awareness for right action. He said, "Our two eyes are for seeing the outer material world. But Knowledge is our powerful third eye which makes us see our inner selves. This leads to selfknowledge, which is the basis for our becoming Universal Man. This is the key to true success in life." Suresh Hiralal Kobawala and Ravindra Kobawala, who attended this function, were pleased to donate Rupees One Lakh each to the School. Chitrabhanuji has always been supporting this school with his generous donations. This school has been making great progress in excellence.

#### **Banks of Discipline**

On the same day at noon, he visited Tapovan Sanskar Pitha where he delivered a speech about the essentiality of discipline and decorum in student life. "Without discipline our energies are dissipated and our actions and life lack focus. It is only when the iron of Body and Mind is tempered with the fire of discipline that we acquire the strength and flexibility of steel. Lack of decorum in our lives reflects on our lack of sensitivity for the feelings of others, and it becomes a hindrance in living in Amity."

#### Service to Living Beings Is Service to God

In the afternoon on the same day, he specially visited 'Manthan,' a Non-Government Organization working for the welfare of the Handicapped, Disabled and Mentally Retarded young, teenage girls. Smt. Niruben and Shri Girishbhai Patel, who have been working hard to run this center, welcomed Gurudevji and others. Gurudev blessed the children, who were smiling and happy. Despite their handicapped condition, the girls gave beautiful performances of dances, garba, songs and enactments of scenes, etc. on the stage. Gurudevji donated a cheque of Rupees one lakh to this Organization on behalf of Divine Knowledge Society of Mumbai. He explained that when we see any physically or mentally challenged people, it is not enough to ascribe their fate to their Karma and to close the matter in our minds. By being a passive sympathizer without Karuna, we are in fact earning negative karma for ourselves. Therefore, it is necessary for us to actively contribute in as many ways as is possible, to help those who are less fortunate than we are.

#### Pramodaji in Ahmedabad 2003

Pramodaben Chitrabhanu – visited Ahmedabad the middle of October, 2003, there she delivered a talk on *Jainism in Foreign Lands*. An interesting note is that a great number of people in North America have adopted a lifestyle of non-violence and non-dairy products out of compassion for animals, such as cows and buffaloes that are cruelly treated to obtain more milk.

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## JIVADAYA Compassion in action

The concept of Jivadaya in Jain Dharma is a unique concept that emphasizes compassion and reverence for all life. Jiva means life and daya means compassion. The fundamental idea of Jivadaya is compassion in action towards all living beings beginning from the micro-beings possessing one sense to those evolving to beings possessing five-senses.

The general understanding of Jivadaya is to spend one's resources for animal shelter homes – panjrapols. But Jivadaya has a much broader meaning to it than this. Jivadaya encompasses all aspects of non-injury to all living beings. It is, therefore, in its active form, goodwill towards all life. As all are sparks of divinity, no matter how little developed as yet they are, we should not look down at any part of life. We are all here to grow and thus have no right to hurt or to exploit any part of our kingdom. Jivadaya means reverence for all life. Jivadaya means harmlessness. Jivadaya means non-violence.

So Jivadaya, put into practice, can transform our life if we follow the following steps in our day-to-day living:

J ustice in one's approach to life.

I ntegrity of thoughts, words and deeds.

V ision to translate compassion into action.

- A bstinence from violence.
- D ynamism to work for the mission.

A lleviate the pain and suffering of living beings.

Y earn to make a positive difference in the world.

A dvance in truth and understanding.

The idea of having a Jivadaya Committee in JAINA is to facilitate individuals to lead a least harmful life by providing them with information and encouragement to donate generously to animal shelter homes – panjrapols – especially in India. In these shelter homes the management sees that fodder, water, medicine, veterinary care and other facilities are provided to the animals and the birds. Those cattle that are likely to be sent to slaughterhouses are rescued and protected in these homes. In this way hundreds and thousands of animals and birds find home in the panjrapol. The Jivadaya Committee has set up this outline of its vision and mission:

**VISION:** Jivadaya will help translate the concept of nonviolence in life with a particular focus on living lives as free of animal exploitation as possible. It aspires to be a primary source of education and inspiration to Jain values, to the Jain population as well as to Indian Communities and to anybody in North America seeking to lead a compassionate lifestyle.

**MISSION:** With humility and service, Jivadaya aims to illuminate the concept of Ahimsa in the context of life in America

and to promote non-violence globally, using "Compassion in Action" as the guiding motto.

**OUR OBJECTIVES:** Our objectives are to educate, promote and support life styles that are harmless in theory and as much as possible in practice, with particular emphasis on the impact our everyday choices of diet, adornment and personal ethics make on our lives and others living on planet earth with us.

We put a strong emphasis on promoting a wholly vegetarian, plant-based diet as the most ethical diet, as well as the best single action we can take to do minimal harm to the environment and our own health. We are against exploiting animals in any way, by using ingredients in cosmetics, clothes, and other household items that are animal origin.

\* We believe in simplicity of life that benefits us, animals and the environment. To accomplish these goals, our mission and objectives focus on education, outreach and support. Specifically:

\* We intend to publish, physically or electronically, news to keep our audiences reminded about the importance of a plantbased diet and the value of treading lightly on the planet, minimizing the suffering we may cause, possibly inadvertently.

\* We intend to publish pragmatic summaries, welldocumented, with appropriate references of topics that our audiences can immediately use in evaluating and modifying their lifestyles, such as, publishing recipes, documenting deleterious effects of a non-plant-based diet, pointing to authoritative checklists of cruelty-free products.

\* We will publish reference materials: e.g., from the Book of Compassion, websites, etc. – on topics of our interest, and give our audiences ready access to them.

\* We recognize that in the Indian population, well-meaning vegetarians may not be aware of the cruelty of dairy and poultry products, so we will devote specific energies to getting the word out about these issues.

\* We will support animal shelter houses or animal sanctuaries- panjrapols – in India wherever it is possible.

\* We will setup a procedure by which individuals or Sanghs can send their Jivdaya funds to JAINA for further distribution to institutions in India of their choice or to the areas of the country where the need for fundss more urgent.

Jivadaya Committee aims at achieving these objectives and this is all in line with Lord Mahavir's philosophy of the least harm to the least number and the greatest good to the greatest number of life forms.

### SAMPRATI MAHARAJ A story from Tristha Shalaka Purush

This is a story during the reign of emperor Ashok.

One afternoon a beggar encountered group of Jain munis returning from Gochari (alms). The beggar pleaded for some food as he was starving. The munis told him with utmost love that they could not give food to anyone other than their Gurudev who in turn will distribute the food to all the Sadhus. "Our guru will do the right thing."

The beggar followed the munis to their Guruji – Acharya Shree Aryasuhasti. The munis requested to him to consider the plight of the beggar. Acharya Shree was an extremely learned scholar and possessed a special knowledge of things to come. He thought for a few moments and recognized the potential of this beggar. He told the beggar that if he were to become a sadhu, he can share the meal today and for all the time to come.

Hunger was troubling the beggar so much that he agreed and changed into the sadhu clothes. After all the food was good and he did need new clothes. He sat down with sadhus and consumed as much food as he could since this was the first time in a long time he had a chance at such nice food. At sundown he developed pain in his stomach. As the night progressed his pain became unbearable. After the Pratikaman, all the munis sat next to this new sadhu and started praying and reciting Navkar Mantra. Village people who had come for Pratikaman also stayed behind and ministered him. Acharya Shree himself started reciting prayers for him and tried to give him solace.

All this astonished the new Sadhu. Just hours before he had no good clothes, he was hungry and towns people never paid any attention to him. Just changing into sadhu clothes had changed all that. He realized that although he had changed into white clothes just to be able to eat what would happen if he really were a sadhu? He died that night listning to Navkar Mantra and praising the life of a Jain sadhu. He was reborn as the grandson of the emperor Ashok. He was named Samprati. He became the king of Ujjain and was later known as Samrat Samprati.

One day from a window of his palace he saw some sadhus passing by. He thought he knew the one leading them and as he thought more of him all of a sudden he remembered his past life. He yelled out to his Gurudev and ran down the steps to bow down to his beloved Gurudev. He invited Gurudev in to the palace and after sitting him on proper place asked if he recognized him. The Gurudev acknowledged him as his student.

Samprati Maharaj thanked Gurudev for his enormously good fortune. If it were not for the "DIKSHA" given by him, he would never have gotten the blessings of Navkar Mantra at the time of his death. It was a SAMADHI MARAN that gave him birth into a royal family so he offered to give his kingdom to his Guruji.

Acharya Shree Aryasuhasti smiled and praised Samprati Maharaj's devotion. He explined to Samprati that a Jain sadhu cannot accept such a gift due to Aparigrah Vrat. Samrat Samprati did not know all that since he was a sadhu for less than half a day in his previous life. Acharya Shree gave knowledge of Jainism to the emperor.

Samprati Maharaj became a staunch follower of Jainism. During his life time he built 125,000 Temples; and installed 12,500,000 Jin Murtis. He also preached Ahimsa

The story above illustrates the importance of devotion to one's Guru and need never to forget his obligation.










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
