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Joday there is a broad and deep movement toward openness, goodwill, and warm-hearted and loving engagement among religious and spiritual communities around the world.

Sustained encounters between people of different religious, spiritual, and cultural traditions have created heightened momentum toward actualizing our many visions of a better world, as well as stronger possibilities for establishing ethical common ground.

New awareness and shared ethical principles opens the way into a new era of creative engagement—where we find and implement new modes of outreach, cooperation, and constructive common action, not only among the world's religions but among all of the world's guiding institutions.

FFERING GIFTS OF SERVICE TO THE WORLD

The Parliament of the World's Religions is committed to providing inspiration and direction for those wishing to offer gifts of service to the world. To give such a gift is an expression of the fundamental spiritual inclination towards generosity, caring, hospitality, compassion, and good will. The extent to which goodness has existed in the world has often been directly related to the giving of such gifts and the spirit in which they are given. In spite of the progress made though ambitious endeavors and noble institutions, the fate of the world continues to rest on such gifts—and now, more than ever.

The Parliament's invitation to offer gifts of service comes in the midst of worldwide attention to the crossing of the threshold into a new century and, for many, a new millennium. The Council for a Parliament of the World's Religions—in partnership with the Millennium Institute of Arlington, Virginia—has seized this unique opportunity to inspire individuals, organizations, groups, and religious and spiritual communities to offer strategic gifts, which are projects that will make long-term differences within the planetary community.

For the past two years, the Council has worked to encourage the offering of such gifts and to collect descriptions of some of them for publication in this volume, The 1999 Parliament Book of Gifts. This collection of exemplary gifts/projects will be shared at the 1999 Parliament, and will provide inspiration to Parliament participants and others to ask what they can do in their own communities, regions, and lands, to make a difference.

We believe that many new gifts/projects will be created at, and after the 1999 Parliament, and we encourage all interested parties to register such Gifts of Service at the 1999 Parliament or after the event, by contacting the Council. CPWR pledges to work in close cooperation with the Millennium Institute and other organizations to nurture a responsive network for the exchange of ideas, information, contacts, and

support for individuals, groups, and communities choosing to offer their projects as Gifts of Service to the World. In addition, the Council pledges to track the progress of all Gifts of Service and to report on them periodically to Parliament supporters and within the next three years. The Council will endeavor to publish a revised and expanded Parliament Book of Gifts, incorporating new gifts/projects created at and after the 1999 event. As we approach the 2004 Parliament, therefore, the Gifts of Service project will continue to grow. New seeds will be planted; new ideas will emerge; new commitments will be fostered; and a new day will indeed be dawning.

Note

Those interested in proposing a project for inclusion in the Gifts of Service to the World program should complete the Gift Description Worksheet included in this book. Please read the Criteria listed below before completing the Worksheet.

Aims

Gifts proposed for CPWR's Gifts of Service to the World program should give expression to one or more of the following aims and should be consistent with each.

- To embody the highest human aspirations for meaning and purpose in life
- To alleviate suffering
- To assist in the pursuit of justice, peace, and the humane treatment of all human beings
- To nurture harmony with the Earth
- To foster respect and mutuality between diverse peoples, cultures, and religions



Gifts in Service to the World should be consistent with CPWR's commitment to interreligious convergence:

Very few religious and spiritual communities can reach consensus with one another on an extensive religious, moral, ethical, or social agenda. This is true not only of relations between diverse traditions, but nearly as often of relations among various constituent groups within a particular tradition.

However, there are points of convergence—of shared interest, common purpose, or common cause—that can provide a basis for dialogue and cooperation. Points of convergence do not presume agreement on other matters of belief or practice.

- The Council cannot consider Gift projects or programs which in themselves take polemical positions with regard to internal issues of contention or dispute within a given participating tradition. (This policy does not imply any position on the part of the Council with respect to such issues.)
- A Gift which approaches a polemical situation within a given tradition by bringing opposing parties together in order to encourage mutual understanding, etc. might well be acceptable.

- Gifts should be offered in a spirit of respect for one's own tradition and for the traditions of others.
- All gifts must be non-violent in character, although the Council acknowledges that many individuals and groups continue to struggle with the question of violence in service to justice.
- All Gifts should be non-proselytizing and non-sectarian. (That is, Gifts should not be designed to further only the self-interest of the gifting organization. The Council of course acknowledges the right of each religious and spiritual tradition to proselytize and pursue legitimate self-interest.)
- CPWR can only consider Gift proposals from individuals, groups, organizations, and communities that share the Council's commitment to interreligious dialogue, understanding, respect, and cooperation.
- Gifts should be inspired by the mission, themes, and occasion of the Parliament of the World's Religions.



Gifts of Service to the World tend to fall under one or more of the following Headings. (When filling out the Gift Description Worksheet, mark the single heading that most closely corresponds to the proposed Gift.)

Building Bridges of Understanding and Cooperation

Gifts that reach across the gulfs which often result from our diversities; Gifts that promote encounter, dialogue, and shared action among diverse religions, ethnic groups, genders, cultures, and life styles

Celebrating Life and its Possibilities

Gifts of celebration, art, music, dance; Gifts that create events which suggest and shape the richness of possibility.

Fostering Creative Engagement

Gifts that promote the cooperative, visionary, and creative engagement of religion and spirituality with other guiding institutions, including: business/commerce, government, education, and media; Gifts that promote institutional and systemic reform and healing

Meeting Essential Needs

Gifts that are designed to address issues relating to the basic needs of living beings: survival, food, shelter, education, etc.

Nurturing Transformative Community

Gifts that involve communities that build, enrich, and transform humanity and the planet

Offering Sacred Practice

Gifts that involve religious or spiritual practice, ritual, liturgy, prayer, meditation, etc., and whose primary focus is outreach, healing, and transformation of a larger whole

Pursuing Universal Human Rights

Gifts that express concern for civil, political, social, and economic rights of all human beings



A small, double-sided book, *Race: an Open and Shut Case*, explores through the stories of the Open and Shut families, the question, "How many races are there?" The book works to unveil a fundamental paradox about racial divisions: we are either countless multitudes of races or we are one race.

Through a simple, memorable fable, this book exposes this inherent paradox and renders the question of race irrelevant.

Copies of the book will be given to participants at the Parliament so that they may take it back to their communities to use in a variety of ways and settings, as a tool to help young people begin understanding this subject, and help older people reassess their presumptions and conditioning about race.

Abraham Esau Memorial Trust — an Act of Reconciliation

The Abraham Esau Trust was established to recognize an important contribution to reconciliation in South Africa. During the Anglo-Boer War, a colored Blacksmith – Abraham Esau – led a resistance group against the invasion of Calvinia by the white Afrikaners. This group fought against the Afrikaners to preserve the small measure of dignity afforded by British rule. His heroic acts of intelligence gathering and consultations with British officials made Abraham Esau a mythical figure among the people of Calvinia. The Abraham Esau Trust was registered on the 6th of June 1992 to rebuild the Abraham Esau Memorial Chapel and to preserve the act of reconciliation for the people of Calvinia, a town in the North-Western Cape.

These booklets will be sent to key leaders in our country and throughout the world, and in particular, to countries of conflict such as Rwanda and Kosovo as a sign of our support and prayers for peace.

Pilgrimage: a Way to Interreligious Understanding

Pilgrimage, as a way of increasing interreligious understanding, can be done in one's village, town, city – on a state, national or international level. The Interfaith Conference of Metropolitan Washington has held eight different, day-long and half-day interfaith pilgrimages. Participation has ranged from 15-80 persons and usually hovers around 40-50. Many of the pilgrimages involved visiting diverse religious congregations. One visit was to three sacred gardens; another was chanting in Hindu and Christian traditions. Each interfaith pilgrimage is preceded by a lecture-discussion to familiarize participants with the tradition(s) involved.

The DePaul University College of Law Center for Church/State Studies developed the Interfaith Family Mediation Project to help courts and interfaith families find solutions for the children's faith development following divorce, while seeking to maintain the integrity of each former spouses' faith, in a non-adversarial setting. Interfaith families facing divorce may work with the Center's mediators and volunteer religious leaders to seek mutually satisfactory agreement. The goal of the Interfaith Family Mediation Project is for both spouses to find a solution and offer their agreement to the courts for final judicial resolution of this critical issue.

Administered by the Department of Religious Studies at the University of South Carolina, this project seeks to link academic inquiry in the comparative study of the world's religions with ventures in interfaith understanding between religious groups in the community. Partners in Dialogue includes participants from the Hindu, Buddhist, Jewish, Christian, Muslim, Unitarian Universalist, Bahá'í, Sikh, and Native American communities.

In addition to annual interfaith conferences, potluck suppers and dialogue meetings have proven to be very popular. Individuals bring prepared dishes characteristic of their tradition or culture. The opportunity to share a meal inevitably opens up conversation about the dietary habits of each group, providing a reminder that knowing about eating habits is one of the most effective ways to learn about a group. The evening typically includes a panel discussion and group conversation on the announced topic. Examples of topics include: Signs and Symbols of Light in Our Respective Traditions; Views of the Afterlife; Religious Values and Politics, and; The Place of Interfaith Relations Within the Programmatic Emphases of My Faith Community.

Partners in Dialogue has also sponsored worship open-house experiences, when a special invitation is extended by one faith community to the others to attend an important event at their place of worship.

The faith communities involved in Partners joined together in Witness for Reconciliation, an effort to heal the racial divisions in the State caused by the flying of the Confederate flag atop the State House. More recently, Partners has become involved with the South Carolina Department of Corrections and other groups to provide an interfaith support program for the families of prison inmates who are terminally ill.

E Pluribus Unum Project — Out of Many, One

The *E Pluribus Unum* Project (EPU) began as an opportunity for students from around the nation to explore how their religious values interact with public policy and civic engagement. Each summer, the project convenes 60 recent high school graduates – 20 Catholic, 20 Jewish, and 20 Protestant students – in Washington, DC for three weeks to explore how their religious traditions deal with questions of social justice and the common good.

The workshops included:

Spiritual Arts Workshops: Spiritual Arts workshops in dance, creative writing, voice, art and drama provide a setting for individual expression. Worship, in both particular traditions and of an ecumenical nature, challenges students to connect with their own spirituality.

Volunteer Service: Service learning opportunities provide ways for students to actively pursue social justice. Students are exposed to local efforts that address community needs, and they also gain familiarity with Washington-based initiatives that aim at finding global solutions to problems concerning human rights, poverty and the environment.

Community Life: Students, faculty, and administrators learn how to create a community centered on agreed-upon norms. A governance council, representing all sectors of the community, faces the challenge of reconciling individual and communal interests. In daily covenant groups, eight diverse students and a mentor forge intimate friendships, spend time integrating strands of the EPU experience, and apply valuable lessons to their own lives.

Academic Track: Three faith-alike classes for Catholic, Jewish, and Protestant students explore, using sacred writings and histories, how religious traditions have dealt with human rights, poverty, and the environment. In interfaith forums, students hear from religious and policy leaders in the three issue areas. They then engage in innovative simulations and discussions, which broaden their understanding of the issues.

Interfaith Community Relations in India

In spite of peaceful co-existence among Hindus, Muslims, and Christians in India, there have been instances of cultural and religious disagreement that have caused violent conflicts to spread. This project works towards reconciliation through developing an inter-community compact addressing a range of issues: communally-biased readings of history (especially the Medieval period); cow protection; religious processions; mosques/temples at Ayodhya, Kashi and Mathura; conversions from Hinduism to Islam; community-based religious law versus other laws; usage of Urdu language and script; and discrimination against religious groups. This community relations project is based on the assumption that, in addition to strengthening the institutions of law for settling disputes, there is also a need for communities to come to an honorable and equitable understanding on these issues. Agreements will be recorded in the form of a compact that shows respect for each other's religious beliefs and values.

International Peace Force

Peaceworkers is working to develop a multi-ethnic, multi-spiritual, standing international peace force. This group would be trained in nonviolent strategies and deployed, at the invitation of local nonviolent movements, to help resolve conflicts in order to help prevent or stop violence. The international peace force would include thousands of volunteers from all of the world's religions who would be available for nonviolent peacemaking, peace-building and peace-keeping. Peaceworker's hope is to develop a model of peacemaking on a larger scale which can be replicated by others around the world.

Creating a Meeting Place for World Religions

Paint Creek Unitarian Universalist Congregation offers classes, writing, and dialogue opportunities for gaining insight into other religions and spiritual practices. In this way, it can become a 'clearing house' for information about world religions and a respectful meeting ground for dialogue.

Peace Building Project

The Peace Building Project creates bridges of understanding among religions throughout South Korea. This is a project devised and executed by the Ven. Dr. Jinwol's United Religions Initiative of Korea. Meetings are held at Buddhist temples, Christian churches, schools, and other venues, and consist of forums, workshops, seminars, and informal talks centering around interreligious encounter and understanding. The meetings are publicized and open to all interested persons, no matter what religious tradition they follow. The goal of the project is to have different cultures and religions learn and share with one another. United Religions Initiative of Korea carries out the initiatives of URI's other branches, while also acting and responding to local issues. One example is how the Order working towards the reunification of Korea, and contributing to the spiritual education of young people.

The seven-year-old Jewish-Palestinian Living Room Dialogue Group is comprised of 30 women and men. After 85 meetings, strangers are becoming friends, and "enemies" are becoming partners. With face-to-face relationship building, this group initiates concrete projects to help people and invigorate the public peace process here and overseas.

Building Bridges from the Heart

CoreLight, a non-profit organization, is dedicated to humanitarian service and to fostering world peace through developing inner peace. Inspired by South Africa's commitment to truth, reconciliation and forgiveness, CoreLight's vision is to build bridges between South Africa and the U.S. The project hopes to create a center for humanitarian services; teaching or exchange programs; and opportunities for bringing people together in spiritual communion.

Women Working for Solidarity

Immaculate Heart College Center's M.A. program in Feminist Spirituality offers the project Women Working In Solidarity, an interreligious project by women to counter violence. Inspired as a response to the Los Angels riots of 1992, and created by a multiracial team, this project has brought together women from diverse religious, cultural, and economic backgrounds to provide inter-religious and cross-cultural training in the method of faith-based social analysis. The project's primary goals are to: promote cross-cultural understanding and healing by enabling women participants to be in dialogue across lines of religion, race, class, and educational achievement; help women explore both liberating and oppressive experiences in their respective religious traditions and spiritualities; train women in the skills of faith-based social analysis so as to understand the roots of injustice in church and society, particularly the interconnected roots of violence against women; empower women to claim their own spirituality and cultures as a source of action for change, and; work together on strategies to improve their lives and the lives of their children, families and communities.

Play for Peace

Play for Peace is a non-profit organization which brings children from conflicting cultures together through cooperative play to promote positive relationships among people who have a history of intercultural tension. Play for Peace educators partner with organizations across the globe and train teenage facilitators from conflicting cultures to act as ambassadors for peace as they work with younger children from their respective cultures. Play for Peace structures noncompetitive games and activities that require groups to work together as a team to accomplish a set goal, with the primary focus on developing ways to work together to help advance peace within their communities. The project first started in Chicago, and is now being conducted in five areas around the world; Middle East, North America, Balkans, South Africa and Central America.

The World Movement for Non-violence

The World Movement for Non-violence was founded in 1998 to raise awareness of the critical importance of practicing non-violence in today's world. Its goal is to prevent violence in every form by promoting the use of nonviolent means for resolving conflict, and to show how non-violence is applicable to events and situations in everyday life, among all sectors of society. The World Movement for Non-violence commemorates the period from January 30 to April 4 as The Season for Non-violence, a time when cities around the world develop educational and cultural programs that promote the principle of non-violence. In addition to programs, workshops, retreats, conferences and task forces for youth and adults, the World Movement for Non-violence will develop curriculum for many grade levels and models for the formation of youth peace teams in communities around the world. This movement has forged partnerships and alliances with individuals and organizations world wide in the belief that a united effort will strengthen the commitment towards a more peaceful world.

Friends Peace Team Project: African Great Lakes Initiative

The Friends (Quaker) Peace Team Project is working in Kenya, 'Uganda, Rwanda, and Burundi to support Quaker peace work in the region. The Team has conducted trauma healing, Alternatives to Violence and non-violence training workshops, and plans to rebuild a church in Burundi that was destroyed in inter-ethnic violence.

Commitment to Interfaith Cooperation

Koinonia Southern Africa

Started in 1982, by bringing together families from different cultures (whites and blacks) to share a meal with one another in a society torn apart by the Apartheid (separation) political policy, Koinonia contributed in a significant way towards a peaceful transformation of an oppressive regime to a democratically elected government.

Koinonia Southern Africa came into existence when Dr. Nico Smith started his ministry in Mamelodi, a Black township in the vicinity of Pretoria. At that stage it was still forbidden by law for Whites to enter into Black townships. Dr. Smith decided to exercise civil disobedience by taking White couples into the township to have meals with Black families.

Koinonia soon spread to many cities of the country and eventually brought thousands of people together. Eating together has a magnificent effect on the attitudes of people towards one another. At the dining table they can look into each other's eyes and communicate as equals. Eating together is, in essence, sharing one's life with another. Without eating, there is no existence and without eating together, there is no co-existence.

Festival of Faiths

The Festival of Faiths, started four years ago, is an expression of its mission to share – with Kentuckians, Americans and ultimately our entire world – the vision of bringing together our vast faith traditions in an open and hospitable environment. This unique week-long faith oasis provides a venue for greater understanding and tolerance.

Spirituality and Different Religious Traditions

This education program – planned on an annual basis by Auburn Seminary, the Temple of Understanding, and the Psychotherapy and Spirituality Institute – explores how spiritual quests remain fundamental to human beings and their quality of life on the planet. The program investigates how spiritual and meditative practices can foster physical and mental health and wholeness, and it introduces spiritual and meditative practices from seven different traditions (Jainism, Hinduism, Buddhism, Judaism, Islam, Christianity, and Native American). Programs run all day Saturday and take place in the setting of a particular tradition. Team leaders from that tradition orient participants to its beliefs, spirituality and meditative practices, and printed materials are sent to participants in advance.

Towards a Global Ethic: Reworked for the Children and the Youth of the World

Since 1994, Ministries Outreach has presented 15 all-day workshops for adults on Spirituality, using Towards a Global Ethic and other materials from *A Source Book For the World's Community of Religions.* From the workshops, Ministries Outreach will construct *Toward a Global Ethic for Children* and Youth, based on stories from various cultures of the world. These tales will be centered around the Four Irrevocable Directives of *Towards a Global Ethic*.

Dhammadayada Training and Mass Ordination

This program is a prototype training course to round out undergraduate students' (age 20-35) academic knowledge with spiritual and ethical practice. Such a taste of ordained life for students instills a respect for morality which stays with them even when returning to their regular lives in society. The Dhammadayada Training Project created the opportunity to teach ethics and meditation by relating it to real life situations and contexts. The hands-on experience of students in Thailand and abroad has become particularly widespread as the result of the Dhammadayada Training and Mass Ordination Program. In 1999, the program enters its twenty-seventh year.

Youth Program for Culture of Peace and Meditation

The General Assembly of the United Nations has proclaimed the year 2000 as the "International Year for the Culture of Peace," and the period 2001-2010 as the "International Decade for a Culture of Peace and Non-Violence for the Children of the World." In response to the proclamation, the Dhammakaya Foundation has initiated a "Youth Program for a Culture of Peace and Meditation" for youth around the world. The Foundation will make grants available for the first batch of 90 male and female youth around the world to give them a chance to participate in this program designed to exchange different understandings from different cultures. Successful candidates are entitled to view beautiful sites of Thailand, to learn about Thai culture and history, as well as learning how to meditate by our experts. Eventually, these students will join the candle lighting ceremony on Maga Puja Day, on February 19, 2000. Successful candidates who are between 17-25 years old must be able to afford a round-trip air ticket to Thailand, but the Foundation supports expenses, including accommodation, meals, and transportation.

Alternatives to Violence Project (AVP)

The Alternatives to Violence Project (AVP) is a worldwide association of volunteer groups offering experiential workshops in conflict resolution, responses to violence, and personal growth. It was started by the Religious Society of Friends (Quakers) in 1975 in response to a request from prison inmates for nonviolence training. While prisons remain a major focus of AVP work, the training is also used in schools and community institutions, such as businesses, churches, schools, homeless shelters, youth organizations, etc. The AVP program hosts workshops that nurture skills essential to a culture of non-violence: affirmation (self-esteem, trust); communication (listening and self-expression); cooperation; conflict resolution. While AVP was founded by Quakers on the basis of their belief in an inborn power for peace in everyone, it is an independent organization that draws its participants and trainers from all religions, races and walks of life. AVP chapters are found in 40 states of the USA and 20 countries worldwide.

World Sabbath of Religious Reconciliation

The World Sabbath of Religious Reconciliation is establishing the first interfaith holy day dedicated to building peace, justice, and equality among all the religions of the world. Through public testimony, repentance and forgiveness, the World Sabbath will reveal the ethnic and economic roots of religious persecution and war, and will call on all people to recognize that true religious faith calls us to reconciliation, peace, and love. The event will be celebrated for the first time at Christ Church Cranbrook in Bloomfield Hills, Michigan, on Saturday evening, January 22, 2000. Artists, poets, musicians and dancers will commemorate the event along with religious, spiritual, secular and political leaders. Several interfaith leaders have asked to organize World Sabbath celebrations in their own states in 2001, with the hope that this will eventually become an official holiday celebrated by people all around the world.

The Veterans Restoration Project

The Veterans Vietnam Restoration Project (VVRP), a non-profit, non-governmental organization (NGO), does humanitarian work in Vietnam. It provides American Vietnam War Veterans opportunities to return to Vietnam to do humanitarian aid projects. It has arranged for one hundred Americans to complete thirteen projects to date. Seeing Vietnam begin to show signs of rebirth and learning that the Vietnamese people have forgiven the US soldiers helps the veterans to forgive themselves and to repair their war-torn self esteem.

Together with the Multifaith Association of South Australia, Ms. Singh works to foster understanding among different religious communities. The Association consists of elected representatives of nine faiths who work together (in meetings, hosting symposia, undertaking projects) to forge respect and acceptance among the religions. As a teacher, she offers counseling and meditation workshops (using multichanting with light and sound vibrations) for psychic and personal development, relation and self-realization, personal and family counseling, and for experiencing the infinite wisdom of eternity.

The Children's Peace Pavilion Pledge School Program

The Children's Peace Pavilion Pledge School Program is an extension of the Children's Peace Pavilion museum exhibits, and provides opportunities for elementary schools to integrate the successful elements of the four concepts of peace into their curricula. The four concepts of peace are:

Peace for Me: Helps children to discover the wonder and beauty within themselves, where peace begins.

Peace for Us: Explores daily relationships, stressing cooperation, communication, and conflict resolution.

Peace for Everyone: Encourages children to examine the possibilities for peace within groups, including cultural appreciation and diversity.

Peace for the Planet: Addresses planetary stewardship, care and appreciation.

This pilot year, ten elementary schools have agreed to join the Pavilion to work to develop and implement peace activities in their schools. The Pledge School program is designed to promote learning and respect by providing area schools with resources that further the development of peaceable schools, neighborhoods, and communities. Pledge schools receive field trips, teacher in-service training, school-based peace activities, and coordinated service learning activities, and pledge school participation for the pilot year is free of charge. The program will be evaluated and refined during the first year with the intention of creating a model that can be replicated in other schools in other communities around the world over the next five years.

Mending the World

The United Church of Canada has recently created a document – an evaluation of church priorities and initiatives – entitled *Mending the World*. The report introduces the concept of 'whole world ecumenism,' and links this larger ecumenism between faiths with the more traditional church-to-church ecumenical relationships. The United Church, in this document, declares that its first priority should be the healing of creation through the joining together of people of all faiths in the search for justice, wholeness and love.

Global Outreach

Global Outreach (GO) believes in the power of the individual as a source of hope in our global community. It places volunteers on international communitybased projects, which foster cross-cultural understanding, social awareness, and volunteerism in participants. Projects also help participants to overcome international differences through interaction and education. GO sent 10 volunteers to Guatemala in 1996 to work along side local volunteers to build a community center in the village of Monte Grande. Villagers use the community center for elections, as a health clinic when a doctor visits, for church functions, and various other functions. GO also worked with Island Ventures on the island of Mactan in the Philippines, and contributed support to several scholarship programs benefiting several young teenagers. In Guangzhou, GO has began a dialogue with Chinese Christians who have begun to host volunteers there.

Hispanic / Non-Hispanic Cross-Cultural Bridges

Su Casa works as a cross-cultural bridge between our country's Hispanic and non-Hispanic populations, with emphasis on mutual respect, information exchange, education, and recreation. Su Casa offers English classes and Spanish classes to all interested persons, and it translates documents for churches, health offices, and businesses. Su Casa also offers cultural diversity training to local industry, and serves as a place that the Hispanic population trusts to help with language, customs, and regulations. In a town of 30,000, 785 Hispanic people have used the services of Su Casa in the past three months.

Bearing Faithful Witness

A document, produced by The United Church of Canada, highlights ways in which the Church reflects certain anti-Semitic vestiges in its preaching, liturgy and practice. Bearing Faith Witness aims to steer the Church towards a more faithful and respectful relationship with Judaism. A related statement (to be considered by the Church's governing body next year) describes how more respectful Jewish-Christian relationships can illuminate relationships of respect with other world faiths.

Empowering Youth in the Apartheid Era

Ms. Patience Tyalimpi opened her tiny home in Zola Soweto to youth, and worked with groups of up to 70 young people at a time. These young people came to learn, and to discuss what it takes to be a responsible young adult working non-violently to eliminate apartheid, and what it takes to build one's sense of self. She maintained the spontaneous gatherings in spite of continuous army harassment (teargas in her home, etc.). In over 20 years of this work, hundreds of young people have been blessed to enjoy a different outlook on life born of the sense of self esteem and responsibility nurtured by Patience.

64 Ways for 64 Days Guide to Practice Nonviolence

The 64 Ways calendar was developed as an educational tool to introduce people to the values, principles and simple practice of non-violence as a way of life. It facilitates a daily practice by offering 64 basic things that anyone can do effortlessly. The first third of the calendar focuses on practicing non-violence within ourselves, the middle third guides readers in daily interactions with each other, and the last part illustrates how to become caring and contributing members of a diverse community. The calendar also contains inspirational quotes from dynamic leaders such as Gandhi, Dr. King, Black Elk, Maya Angelou, Cesar Chavez, Marianne Williamson, Thich Nhat Hanh and Eleanor Roosevelt. It demonstrates that non-violence is an intrinsic element of diverse cultures, ethnicities, religions and all walks of life. By implementing these daily practices, people can dramatically change their lives, and in so doing, change their entire community. A Season for Non-violence-LA has so far distributed 5,000 posters and has translated the guides into Spanish.

GMRS offers contemporary consultation and training services in reconciliation leadership to address the world's 21st century challenges – bringing closure and peaceful settlement to conflict situations.

A year-long pilgrimage of interfaith and multi-racial participants retraced the Triangular Slave Route from the U.S. to West Africa. This walking prayerful journey was created to nourish seeds of genuine consciousness, where the ravages of racism and oppression no longer plague our minds and the human spirit is liberated to grow in greater truth.

A Low-Cost Institute of English for Adults

The Inter-Cultural Research Center aims to promote English as a second language for Sri Lankans order to enable them to communicate with people of different communities both within and outside the country. To effectively achieve this goal, it strives to develop tools and techniques that could give adult Sri Lankans a proficiency in the use of the language in as short a time-span as possible, and (taking into account the low-income situation of the majority) at as low a cost as possible. In response to Sri Lanka's present economic uncertainty, ethnic conflict, and regression in educational standards, Dr. Fernando (the head of the Department of Western Classical Culture, Kelaniya University for nearly twenty years) created this Center in 1984 as an Institute of English for adults. Classes were conducted at first for a student-body of about 25 in a car-garage renovated for the purpose. Now a two-story building provides room for a daily attendance of around 600, with participants who range from twenty to sixty years old.

Supporting an Evolving Global Ethic for a Peaceful 21st Century

The Boston Research Center (BRC) is an international peace institute with a mission to foster dialogue among scholars and activists on common values across cultures and religions – seeking in this way to support an evolving global ethic for a peaceful twenty-first century. Human rights, non-violence, ecological harmony, and economic justice are focal points of the Center's work. This year and next, the BRC's programs and publications are focusing on Cultures of Peace to support the UN International Year for the Culture of Peace in 2000. A three-part conference series, "From War Culture to Cultures of Peace: Challenges for Civil Society" was held this spring along with parallel Peace Camps for children ages 5-12. Presentations from the series (on family life, education, economic justice, and religions and peace) can be read on the Center's website at: www.brc21.org.

A book to be published by the BRC in November 1999, Buddhist Peacework: Creating a Culture of Peace, is a collection of essays by Buddhist leaders from around the world, representing a wide range of Buddhist traditions, who describe, in practical terms, how Buddhist teachings and social actions are contributing to a culture of peace. The Center hopes this publication will serve as a model for leaders of other religions traditions to reflect and conduct further dialogues on their own faiths' practical contributions to peace. Other recent BRC books are serving to stimulate dialogue on the role of religions in creating a peaceful world. 'Subverting Hatred: The Challenge of Non-violence in Religious Traditions' presents articles by scholars from eight major religions on the roots of non-violence within their traditions. The three-volume Earth Charter Studies kit is a resource for teaching the grassroots, interfaith, global effort to develop a Charter to guide humanity's relations with Earth.

Victory Over Violence

Victory Over Violence is a project of the SGI-USA Youth Peace Committee (YPC) to raise awareness about violence, it's cause, and possible solutions. SGI-USA held 1,700 meetings in August 1999, resulting in 10,000 individuals signing a non-violence pledge. A traveling exhibit was created, along with a workbook and video, to facilitate discussion and inspire ideas about how to become non-violent. The program is being expanded to local governments, civic organizations and other religious organizations, and the YPC seeks to create a global network of youth who can speak with one voice toward resolving problems that threaten human lives.

Establish a World-Wide Network for Interfaith Dialogue

The World Summit of Religion and Conservation (WCSRC) in the year 2001 will celebrate the 2600th Janma Kalyanak, the birth anniversary of Lord Mahavira, and the building of Centers for Interfaith Dialogues in India, the USA, South Africa and throughout the world.

The WCSRC hopes to take initiative for the establishment of a Regional Parliament for the World's Religions comprising SARCC countries, commencing sometime towards the end of the year 2001. Vanasthali in New Delhi will be established as a model environmental project. Such projects may be established in many cities in India and abroad particularly in SARCC countries.

The WSRC proposes to establish distress relief work, such as orphanages, leprosy treatments, and sight saving initiatives. It will also undertake to establish new initiatives for the benefit of the aged and elderly that will assist them with options for public service, spiritual studies and enjoyment, cultural and other leisure occupations. It will also try to establish one to one relationships between elderly persons (those above 75 years old) and young persons.

Community Wide Dialogue on Racism, Race Relations and Racial Healing

Community Wide Dialogue (CWD) helps the Central New York community build trust and increase understanding necessary for finding common ground, developing relationships across racial divides, and working together toward action. The heart of CWD process is the dialogue circle which consists of 12 to 15 people from different genders, races, religions, ages, and socio-economic backgrounds. The Circle meets for six consecutive weeks for two-hour sessions lead by two racially diverse facilitators and a discussion guide that structures the dialogue. The program provides a safe and effective process for participants to talk about and work on issues of racism and race relationships with people from different racial, ethnic, religious, socioeconomic, and ideological backgrounds.

Founded in 1996, the Coexistence and Community Building Initiative (CCB) seeks to catalyze a global awareness of, and commitment to, creating a world safe for difference.

Most shows contained a panel comprised of a Rabbi, Roman Catholic Priest, a fundamental Christian, someone with an Eastern tradition, and another guest whose ideals or spiritual orientation differs from the other panelists. It is the goal of this program not only to provide thoughtful and thought provoking discussions but also to demonstrate how people with firm convictions can disagree – often profoundly – and remain civil.

Strengthening the Teaching of World Religions in Schools

The Interfaith Conference of Metropolitan D.C. (IFC) brings together the Bahá'í, Islamic, Hindu, Jewish, Latter Day Saints, Protestant, Roman Catholic, and Sikh faith communities to increase understanding and to work collaboratively for social and economic justice. The IFC is therefore in a terrific position to provide excellent speakers on diverse faiths for classrooms, and to arrange field trips to visit the sanctuaries of many religions. The IFC works with teachers in public, private, religious, and congregational schools at the high school level.

Buddhist Alliance for Social Engagement (BASE)

BASE is a program of social action and Buddhist practice that creates core spiritual communities of activists. It dedicates itself to providing services and organizational resources for the transformation of suffering. An initial commitment of six months includes retreat, group practice and process. Interfaith Peace Gathering — Commemorating Hiroshima and Nagasaki

Every August, the New York Buddhist Church organizes an Interfaith Peace Gathering to commemorate the Hiroshima and Nagasaki bombings. The gatherings start with a moment of silence to pray for the victims of atomic bombing, followed by Buddhist Sutra chanting. Sacred scriptures, meditation and prayers are offered by various religious leaders followed by messages and lectures for world peace. Half a century after Hiroshima and Nagasaki, the fear of atomic war still exists, and this gathering reminds us that we should never stop longing for the demolition of atomic weapons and for world peace.

The 64 Days Calendar of Community Events

A Season for Non-violence-LA has outreached to over 300 groups and organizations in Southern California who are succeeding in generating positive change through nonviolent principles and activities. During the first 64 Days campaign, SNV-LA inspired and coordinated the presentation of 174 events which focused on the philosophy, principles and applied practice of non-violence which were attended by over 35,000 people from all walks of life and all ages. Through the dedicated work of many volunteers who provided liaison services to all of the different organizations, SNV-LA edited and published a calendar of community events which was widely distributed. As a result, new partnerships were formed and continue to develop and deepen. Many were deeply touched to find out about all the positive things that are taking place in the city on a daily basis, giving them a sense of hope and encouraging them to network beyond the confines of their community. The most profound impact happened in schools where new curricula were created and promising young leadership was developed.

Quest of Divinity Circle for Women

"Quest of Divinity" - a year long, bi-weekly, grassroots worship for women of all religions – attempts to reconstruct devalued self-images in women through emphasizing divine attributes within them. The workshop cultivates an ethic of living, working, and "serving" which advocates creating sacred space and experiencing the divine in everyday life. The workshop addresses: "living the divine" in the practical, everyday things we do; changing the notion of service to others to become analogous to worshipping God; practicing spiritual communion by honoring the divine within us; creating sacred space at work and in our family settings; empowering ourselves to be creative women who have the power to make a difference in whatever way we choose, honoring and respecting each other's choices; creating a work ethic that reflects God's purpose for our lives; and practicing excellence in all we do.

In a riveting thirteen-stop itinerary, a bus takes adults on a tour of violence in their own neighborhoods to see first hand the violent influences to which their children are subjected. Many children have learned to hate by the time they reach the age of five. Participants of the tour discuss what the root causes of violence are that keep children at risk, and most importantly, what adults can do to change this situation. Also, libraries with anti-violence resource centers have established community centers throughout the city or town in which the bus tours are running, allowing citizens access to the materials and resources that will help them address the issues and problems of violence. These resource centers include books, journals, curricula, films and videos, other teaching materials, and the handouts that are available on the bus tour.



The World Religions Museum

The Earth Charter is a concise and inspiring declaration of global interdependence and universal responsibility with a special emphasis on sustainable living and sustainable development. The Charter affirms that we are one human family and one Earth community with a common destiny, and it upholds that everyone shares responsibility for the present and future well-being of humanity and the greater community of life. The Earth Charter is an urgent call for a major transformation in our ways of relating to the larger living world and one another. The document recognizes the interdependence of humanity's environmental, economic, social, moral, and spiritual goals.

The Charter provides individuals, families, civil society, business, and government with a much needed integrated ethical vision for building a free, just, participatory, sustainable, and peaceful world. The Earth Charter Initiative is part of the global ethics movement. It reflects the emerging global consensus on common goals and shared values, and it seeks to give expression to principles of enduring significance that are valid for people of all cultures, religions, races, and nations. For over a decade, hundreds of groups throughout the world have endeavored to create an EarthCharter. Today an Earth Charter Commission and the Earth Council in Costa Rica oversee the International Earth Charter Campaign, with over forty-five national Earth Charter committees at work in the different regions of the world. The principles of the Earth Charter draw upon international law. science, philosophy, religion, and the major United Nations summit meetings of the last decade as well as the International Earth Charter conversation on global ethics. The Charter will be circulated worldwide as a people's treaty in an effort to promote education, commitment, and implementation of Earth Charter values. The document will be submitted to the United Nations General Assembly for its endorsement in the year 2002, which is the tenth anniversary of the UN Rio Earth Summit.

Healing Religious Wounds: the Listening Project

The Listening Project takes an appreciative inquiry into the lived wisdom and guidance of the world's religious and spiritual traditions. It is a "research action" in the sense that the outcome of the work will provide the clay for a series of other Healing Religious Wounds projects to promote and make useful what we learn when we listen. The Project hopes to interview people who are particularly admired for their clarity and insight within their own faith families. Instead of focusing on victimization, the project seeks to map the journey away from violation to discern and appreciate the learned, living, spiritually-sourced process of healing, reconciliation and wholeness.

The Project hopes to conduct at least seventy-five interviews using a team of interviewers trained at the Interfaith Center. A longer protocol covering interviewer training will be used for interviews beyond the Bay Area. Highlights of interviews and particularly important stories will be documented, and the results will be published in different forms. The results will also be used to guide the planning team in putting together a charette (gathering) that will bring together at least 100 individuals with special interests and gifts regarding conflict transformation, community building and spirituality.

The Listening Project has been gestating for three years and will incorporate a wide variety of ethnic traditions and faith families.

In the Footsteps of the Magi

In the fall of the year 2000, a camel caravan will leave the one-time site of the Winter Palace of the Magi in the ancient Parthian Empire to reenact the famous journey to Bethlehem of 2000 years ago. This journey will spearhead a major philanthropic effort called "Remembering The Innocents" aimed at aiding children of all faiths and nationalities across the whole Middle East. The caravan of international pilgrims will travel for 99 days - each day dedicated to one of the "Ninety-nine Beautiful Names of God" in Islam – reaching Bethlehem on Christmas Eve. Caravan hosts will be representatives of two indigenous organizations: The Holy Land Trust, a humanitarian organization of Anglican, Catholic, and Orthodox Christians, chaired by Reverend Doctor Naim Ateek, and The Middle East Council of Churches, a group of ecumenical, ecclesiastical leaders representing all the church families in the Holy Land, whose General Secretary is Reverend Doctor Riad Jarjour.

When the international caravan reaches each waystation on their journey, the local community of Christians will gather to host them. These modernday Magi will present gifts to their hosts; these gifts will later be followed by continuing aid for the local community. The culminating gift at Bethlehem is hoped to be the construction of a planetarium near Manger Square, where the Biblical story of the Star of the Magi and their journey would be shown daily throughout the year. A museum of first century life and other educational attractions are part of the planned complex. Beyond adding further depth and meaning to the experience of travelers who come to view the traditional site of Jesus' birth, it is hoped that longer times spent in Bethlehem by visitors will bring increased economic benefit to the local population.

The Holy Land Trust and Middle East Council of Churches plan to initiate an inclusive program of continuing aid to children suffering from the tragic effects of modern political conflicts in the Middle East. The title of this outreach program – "Remembering The Innocents" – memorializes the male babies of Bethlehem slain by Herod's soldiers after the departure of the Magi.

Since 1982, Hartford Memorial Baptist Church has operated fourteen programs that address the basic needs of community residents. The larger, more successful programs include a Hunger Task Force and Clothing Mission, "Women, Infants and Children (WIC)", and a Tele-A-Friend Latch Key Program. Other successful programs include the Hartford Satellite Meals Catering, Hartford Senior Center, and the Kafo Academy (young manhood training). The partnerships have also created a Kentake Academy (young womanhood training) and the Hartford Start Agency (preschool program). In November 1998, through the partnership created between Hartford Memorial Baptist Church and Kmart Corporation, a retail outlet opened in the City of Detroit, an example of faith-based, social, economic development has been created. This partnership between business and an African-American faith community serves as a national model of creative engagement.

Developed at the Black Sea Conference (sponsored by the Ecumenical Patriarch, Bartholomew), the TRANSIT project seeks to raise consciousness about the bio-social impacts associated with Black Sea resource management. Actions for Peace — Peace Games

Peace Games, the largest sports tournament ever organized in the world, is taking place in the city of Rio de Janeiro, and is reconciling two long-time enemies: adolescents and the police. Forty thousand youth, mostly from low-income neighborhoods, organized into 2,509 teams, are playing soccer, volleyball and basketball under the guidance of the city's Police Force. The tournament uses sports as a means to bring youth together in a climate of teamwork and positive competitiveness in order to overcome their aggressiveness and distrust of the police. One team is comprised solely of youth offenders, the other is comprised of native Brazilian Indians, with the police acting as referees and organizers of the matches. Restoring confidence in the police and learning to respect "the rules of the game" are essential steps in educating responsible citizens for the future. The Peace Games are coordinated by Viva Rio and sponsored by the Rio de Janeiro State Secretariat for Sports and UNESCO.

In the year 2000, another tournament will be held in addition to an international mini-Olympic competition, bringing together teams from cities throughout the world where violent conflicts have erupted. Brazilian youth from the city's shanty-towns will be playing alongside adolescents from Harlem in New York, USA, Sarajevo in Yugoslavia, Medellín in Colombia, and El Salvador in San Salvador, among other cities.

Encouraging Creative Engagement

The St. Petersburg School of Religion and Philosophy (SRPH) was established in the early 1990s to offer educational opportunities for both Russian and foreign students in the field of liberal arts, particularly those which were not addressed by the Soviet system. SRPH encourages students to explore how personal experience affects, and is affected by, academic studies. Curricula also encourages experimenting with theoretical and systematical theologies for knowing God and nurturing the links between experience and spirituality. The School also encourages practical activities of students and teachers which include helping the Russian Orthodox Church in the area of interfaith dialogue, hosting conferences and seminars on the most urgent themes of faith and Russian spiritual culture, and academic and popular lectures on different religious aspects of life for a wide audience of St. Petersburg citizens.

Action for Peace — Education and Human Rights Training for the Police

Currently 650 police officers from twenty battalions in Rio de Janeiro are enrolled in the Telesala 2000 Educational Training Program which enables adults to complete their secondary level education. Part of the curriculum includes basic human rights training on issues ranging from racism to religious tolerance and women's rights. For the first time in the history of the city, the police force is debating these issues with the participation of civilian coordinators from Viva Rio. In addition to special courses for the police force, 5,000 other students are completing their basic-level education through the program in over 300 community centers throughout Rio de Janeiro.



Habitat for Humanity International is a non-profit Christian organization that attempts to solve the problem of inadequate shelter by forming partnerships between people in need and those with the willingness and resources to help. It is not a give away program - Habitat homeowners invest hundreds of hours of "sweat equity" in the planning and construction of their homes and then accept full responsibility for the cost through a no-interest mortgage. The payments go into a local "Fund for Humanity" which generates more houses for future homeowners. Because there is no profit or interest involved, owning a simple, decent home can become a reality for many families previously trapped in poverty housing. In Northern Ireland the Habitat's affiliate pairs Protestants and Christians in Belfast to break down the barriers and rebuild communities. The 11 houses built in Catholic West Belfast and 12 in loyalist Glencairn are the product of both groups working side by side to end to both religious apartheid and housing woes. Habitat is at work in over 60 countries around the globe and has built houses sheltering over 400,000 people.

Sir Syed University of Science, Technology and Management

The Trust for Promotion of Higher Education proposes to set up a University of Science, Technology, and Management in order to assist those less fortunate. The University will instruct students in science and technology, and will enable them to "get on their feet" and participate more fully in mainstream society. The University is still in its planning stages but hopes to fulfill three aims:

to have a strong research base and teaching program, which meets international standards, in various fields of engineering sciences, medical sciences and management; to train and educate students who might not otherwise have access to higher education, and to examine and award degrees to them at the undergraduate, Masters and Ph.D. levels, and; to work for the promotion of science and technology and contribute to the growth of scientific culture among Indian Muslims. The project will be instituted in three phases and, at its full strength, the university will house 380 members in various departments of studies.

These young people are trained and empowered to improve the health status of communities through the schools by lecturing and advising on topics such as: sex and sexuality education, the prevention of teenage pregnancy, the prevention of sexually transmitted diseases, HIV and AIDS, and the prevention of child abuse.

Project Himalaya: Travel for Education and Reconciliation

Volunteer individuals and groups (especially youth) interested in learning about the third-world areas of the Himalayas, the needs of its people, animals and environment, undertake various projects in order to meet essential needs and learn more about regional cultures. The program invites volunteers to work on a range of projects, including: community education; health care, hygiene and first aid; infrastructure construction and set-up (such as solar power and other village facilities); environmental and conservation projects (e.g. reforestation and land/water care); veterinary and animal welfare facilities including emergency care and clinic support; assistance for refugees, children and families in cities, villages and remote regions through education; and income-generation initiatives; management and coordination assistance on projects for street children and other homeless people; and diverse cultural projects for the preservation of ancient ways of life. However, projects are undertaken in other regions where it is possible to facilitate needs in some way, and a network for information on external projects of other like-minded organizations is being developed. The Project also incorporates volunteer work into adventure travel itineraries through pre-departure kits, cultural/language classes, and specific project orientation.

Resettling & Reintegrating Children and Youth Living on the Street

The aim of Streets Community Development is to find long-term solutions to the problems and needs of children and youth living on the streets, and to work toward getting them off the streets by engaging their families and communities of origin. The Streets Community Development project provides basic survival essentials and helps to build trusting relationships while youth are still on the streets. The project coordinators contact the relatives of homeless youth to try and resettle them back home. The project also works with other organizations to provide services to families and children to aid successful integration back into society after the children have returned to families.

Sanctuary for the Homeless

In 1918 the President of the Arya Yuvuk Sabha, Mr. D G Satyadeva, witnessed a soul stirring scene — an Indian beggar who had slept in a toilet in Victoria Street because he was homeless was beaten by a White policeman. The president was shocked, and he walked away with tears running down his cheeks. When he related the incident to the Arya Yuvuk Sabha members, the atmosphere was charged with empathy.

The ninth principle of the Arya Samaj reads: "No person must be content in promoting one's good only but must find one's good in promoting the good of all". Following this principle, the members agreed that they must build a home for the homeless. After tireless efforts to raise funds by staging dramas, a property was purchased, and on May 1,1921, Worker's Day, three beggars were picked up from the streets of Durban and the ABH was opened to provide care and sanctuary to the Homeless.

These projects quickly gained nationwide support from the Indian community, and the Society has now completed 73 educational initiatives. The first project, the Sivananda H. P. School in Mahlabatini, near Ulundi, KwaZulu Natal was completed in 1976, and there is a current project to upgrade this school to a Technical Institute, with the addition of 10 classrooms to accommodate the growing student body.

Dr. Gordon has been using holistic approaches with refugees from Macedonia and has traveled globally as part of his concern to provide effective healing approaches to those who are most at risk, or in situations of oppression and violence.

The River Fund will construct and operate a 40-bed Adult Congregate Living Facility, which will be a model for spiritual care-giving for the new millennium. The River Fund will expand its Florida volunteer programs dedicated to serving and educating people in care facilities, hospitals, and schools.

Clean Drinking Water Project is one of the projects organized by the World Ahlul Ul-Bayt Islamic League. The 5H Program's five main priorities are Homes, Hygiene, Health, Human Values, and Harmony in Diversity. Currently its focus is on social and community development in rural areas of developing countries. The "Homes for Change" initiative, a part of the 5H Program, builds modest but durable homes for poor families in rural south India, at no cost to the recipients. Each home is comprised of three rooms – a kitchen, a bedroom, and a family room – with a separate toilet provided. All homes are built of durable brick and cement, and each costs approximately \$2,000 (US) to build in India. Donors can contribute the cost of particular items, such as a toilet, materials, or labor. The program is being expanded to other countries. All 5H projects are planned in consultation with the local population to ensure that the greatest needs are met for both individuals and the whole community.

Smart Living Program for Public and Private Schools

Smart Living Program, created by Dr. Gaspar Garcia, MD., teaches children Qigong practice in a gamelike situation. The Fo Guang Shan Buddhist Order's Lin Ji Farm is being converted into an orphanage and primary school for up to 600 residents. The program will also invite elders who have lost their children to AIDS to teach at the school in an effort to preserve native languages and traditions.

The Long Term Care Ombudsman Program works to improve the quality of life for those living in long term care facilities and adult homes. Trained volunteers advocate on behalf of residents and their families, helping them preserve the dignity and rights of the frail elderly and people with disabilities.

The Senior Companion Program empowers over 100 low income senior citizens to serve as companions for those elders who are unable to care for themselves.

The Refugee Resettlement Program settles over 750 participants from all over the world each year through congregational sponsorships. The Southeast Asian Center serves over 3,000 Southeast Asians with community-building activities, English as a Second Language and Citizenship classes, and cultural events.

The Covenant Housing Program creates safe, accessible, and affordable housing for the homeless, the low income community, and those who are medically and physically challenged. People are empowered to live independently in the community and often can buy their own homes.

The Pastoral Care Program not only trains chaplains from many faith communities, but 20 contracted chaplains serve hospitals, elder homes and jails in our area.

Creatively Providing Accommodation for Community Needs

The Catholic Welfare and Development office in South Africa assists in providing accommodations and housing for sustainable, community based projects. To date this project has provided accommodations and offices for several creches, feeding centers, clinics, and resources centers. After the initial consultation, all treatments cost only R15. On Fridays, State pensioners are given free treatments. The clinic was started shortly after South Africa became a democracy and is ongoing. Through the Parliament of World Religions, Dr. Badat would like to offer this service to many more people in Cape Town.

Provision of Sewing Machines for Self-Help Programs

In addition to constructing capital-intensive school buildings, the Divine Life Society is engaged in encouraging self-help programs within the African community. The first of these took the form of building a sewing school at Esikhaweni in KwaZulu Natal. Subsequently, sewing workshops have been started at the Umlazi Technical College, the St. John's Apostolic Mission in Ntuzuma in northern Durban, and the Folweni Community Center near Adam's Mission in southern Durban. Presently the Society is inviting schools to form organized self-help sewing groups, to which sewing machines will be donated. Five machines have recently been given to the Abalindi Welfare Society under this initiative. More equipment will also be provided at the Umlazi Technical College.

Lifeline Network for Peace

Founded in 1982, Lifeline Network for Peace has created an international network of humanitarian aid and human rights advocacy, particularly focusing on the needs of women and children.

As part of an inter-faith coalition advocating peace in the former Yugoslavia, Lifeline Network with its sister organization, World Alliance for Humanitarian for Bosnia facilitated the collection and shipment of humanitarian aid to Bosnia-Herzegovina and Croatia and the placement of war-wounded Bosnian refugees in the United States.

In February 1994, the founder and President of Lifeline Network for Peace, Beverly Britton, made several trips to Bosnia-Herzegovina where she delivered medical equipment and pharmaceuticals, taught massage therapy to stimulate weight gain in low birth-weight babies, taught stress management for pain control and Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD), started the International Children's Peace Quilt Project with war-wounded and orphaned children and helped open the underground Velmos Hospital in East Mostar.

On December 1995, Lifeline Network hosted a meeting in Sarejevo with representatives from ZAR and Zena 21, coalitions that represent 60 Bosnia-Herzegovina women's organizations, discussing the women's post-war needs, self-help and empowerment strategies, meditation skills and support systems for enterprise outreach. The outreach included the setting up of a Bosnia-Herzegovina Women's Roundtable Network to connect the women's organizations through an on-line computer service such as International Global Communication's PeaceNet.

Participants utilize specific breathing techniques to alleviate anxiety and clear their minds.

Community Biodynamic Farm

The SEKEM farm in the desert northeast of Cairo provides an example for Egypt and the world. This sixcompany initiative combines Biodynamic farming and production with cross-cultural and religious cooperation and community building. The farm was founded in 1977 on 70 hectares of desert where Biodynamic agricultural methods, which had been adapted for their effectiveness in arid zones, were used for the first time under the guidance of the German agronomist G. Merckens. Subsequently, the desert sands have been converted into fertile soil, and green; flowering landscapes, supporting livestock and bees. A steadily increasing group of Biodynamic farms in Egypt has served as the base for the modern development of Egyptian agriculture, with more than 150 farms, totaling approximately 2,000 hectares now cultivated.

SEKEM aims to contribute to the development of the consciousness of the Egyptian people through an enlightened understanding of our contemporary culture by embracing three aspects of modern life: the economic, the social and the cultural. SEKEM strives to create effective, modern, social institutions, so that women and men can carry out their responsibility towards nature, mankind and community.

Oasis of Peace in the Middle East

Neve Shalom/Wahat al-Salam is a village in Israel established jointly by Jews and Palestinian Arabs of Israeli citizenship. In the framework of its School for Peace and children's educational structure, members of Neve Shalom/Wahat al-Salam are engaged in educational work for peace, equality, and understanding between the two peoples. The settlement has grown from one family to 30 over the last twenty-seven years. The School For Peace was established in 1979 as Neve Shalom/ Wahat al-Salam's major outreach educational institution. The SFP activates the principles upon which the Community was founded by engaging in encounter work between Arabs and Jews. The encounters sew the seeds for conflict resolution. Since the establishment of SFP, over 25,000 Jews and Arabs have participated in a wide range of activities. NSWS also sponsors Youth and Adult Encounter Programs that bring Jews and Arabs together in three-day events, which include personal, social, and political acquaintance activities. One Jewish and one Arab leader oversee small groups of participants and guide them through several experiences which culminate in a simulation game on the future relations between Jews and Arabs in Israel

Based at two people's nurseries in Kyalitsha and Nyanga, Abalimi supports the emergence of a new environmental and urban agriculture movement in the grassroots community. The people's nurseries are the only nurseries in the Cape Flats. Projects and programs of WPI include: start up inputs (manure, seeds, etc.) supplied to 1,000-5,000 survival food gardeners annually; training in ecological gardening given to 300-5000 micro-farmers annually; 1-7 year developmental partnerships with emerging community gardening associations resulting in sustainable food garden organizations; and 1-7 year developmental partnerships with grassroots environmental organizations such as schools, parks, youth clubs, and green street groups.


Grass Roots Peace Building

Establishing the Vedanta Center of Atlanta

After seven years of renting a home for itself, the Eternal Quest (Vedanta in Atlanta) has purchased property in order to establish the Vedanta Center of Atlanta. A Sacred Cairn for Harmony

The EarthSpirit Community will establish an outdoor sacred site surrounding a stone cairn at its home and conference center in western Massachusetts. The site will be dedicated to harmony among all peoples and between humans and the other aspects of creation, including animals, plants and spirits of nature. The first stone laid will be one found near the site as a tribute to the spirits of the land. The second will be a stone brought home from South Africa by EarthSpirit's representative to the Parliament in recognition of the work being done there. All who come to the Center will be invited to add a stone to the cairn with their own personal invocation for harmony. The cairn will be built in the ancient traditional manner (common to many cultures in Europe and other parts of the world) and will be set about with healing herbs and plants. 

Interreligious Pastoral Care of People Suffering Cancer and Their Families

A group of religious leaders (consisting of a Rabbi, an Imam, a Pastor, a Priest and a Roman Catholic teacher) go to a clinic to help patients, their families, doctors and nurses with the strength and hope that faith and prayer can give. They sit with the patients while they are having their chemotherapy, or whenever they need assistance. Each of these leaders commits at least one day a week, and often more. Every two weeks they have a general meeting where they meditate together about different subjects related to the situation: Why me? Fears, Listening to God's Voice, Real Happiness and other themes. In earlier stages of these meetings, there were only a few participants. At this point, about fifty people (patients, relatives, nurses and the interreligious group) participate regularly at meetings. They have also prepared an interreligious book of prayers.

Promoting the Rights of Indigenous and Aboriginal Populations in Africa

Actions for Peace — Rio, Put That Gun Down!

Viva Rio is an NGO in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, active in the fields of human rights, education and community development. Since 1993, Viva Rio has worked to integrate the socially-divided city of Rio de Janeiro through actions aimed at overcoming violence in the city and promoting a culture of peace. Peace-building activities of Viva Rio involve all sectors of society, and carry a powerful message for concerned citizens, urging them to work together to restore peace. Five projects are currently underway through which Viva Rio is mobilizing civil society in Brazil and abroad to support a government proposed law which will ban the sale of small arms in Brazil. Small arms are responsible for 27,000 deaths per year in Brazil, which has one of the highest rates of death by firearms in the world. The campaign is raising awareness about the threats posed by the proliferation of small arms, and how these weapons are being used in a cycle of violence that is spiraling out of control in many cities throughout the world. As a founding member of the International Action Network on Small Arms (IANSA), and with the support of the World Council of Churches, Viva Rio is gathering signatures for a petition to support a ban on the sale of small arms. This petition has already received over half a million signatures in favor of the ban, and has the support of Nobel Peace Prize laureate and South African Bishop Desmond Tutu. The campaign has also set up a network of church organizations in Rio which serve as neutral depositories for voluntary weapon hand-ins. The guns deposited at these centers are dismantled and destroyed by church personnel trained by Viva Rio.

World Tibet Day is a worldwide event, held annually in the beginning of July, near the birthday of H.H. the Dalai Lama. Founded in 1998 by Ma Jaya Bhagavati, and directed by her student Brahma Das, the event celebrates the unique beauty of Tibetan culture and thought through music and dance. Speeches are given by prominent figures in religion, academia, and the arts. This event is an affirmation of the basic rights of the Tibetan people, and their entitlement to fundamental religious, civil, political, social and economic freedoms.

Jubilee 2000

Jubilee 2000 USA is a campaign to cancel the crushing debts of impoverished countries in Africa, Asia and Latin America by the end of the year 2000. The resultant funds would be used for environmental protection, HIV prevention, literacy, and rural development. The campaign advocates canceling debts that are unpayable through a fair and open process, which could save the lives of 7 million children a year. It aims to accomplish this objective by pressing world leaders — including U.S. President Clinton and members of U.S. Congress — to make the relatively small contributions of government funds required to cancel the debts and set up a fair and open process for cancellation. To convince leaders, Jubilee 2000 has enlisted the support of faith groups, including the Roman Catholic Church, the World Council of Churches, the National Council of Churches of Christ in the USA. American Jewish World Service, Muslim Public Affairs Council, and others. Jubilee 2000 also has the support of Oxfam America and Friends of the Earth. Supporters from all faith backgrounds — or no faith background — are welcome to join in the campaign.

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The Incorporation of Women's Experiences and Views on Religion and Spirituality

Foundation for Pastoral Care for Women offers research and publications on women's experiences and views on religion and spirituality. The research focuses on aspects of religion that stimulate self-esteem, and sustain the promotion, protection and implementation of women's human rights at all levels of society. The foundation also collaborates with communities that want to highlight women's experiences and views on religion and spirituality.

School of Law

Founded and operated by Bishop Most Rev. Willy Romélus, this law school provides young college graduates with the opportunity to stay in their hometown to study law, instead of migrating to the Capital of Port-au-Prince.

For the first three years after obtaining their degree, students serve people in need of legal help acting as advocates, free of charge. In July 1999, the first 17 students obtained their degree. Among them, nine went on to practice law and eight proceeded to judicial school.

In order to help eradicate illiteracy in Haiti, which currently is at 80%, the Bishop founded 6 schools at the high school and technical levels. These school provided children with the opportunities for an education, which otherwise they may not have had.

Services for Victims of Torture

The Center for Victims of Torture (CVT) was founded in 1985, and provides direct care to survivors of politically motivated torture and members of their families. CVT, the first organization of its kind in the United States, has pioneered a comprehensive assessment and care program that is respected worldwide. In recent years, the Center has expanded its work to include research, training, and public policy initiatives designed to create new resources for torture survivors worldwide.

The Center on Violence and Human Survival is a research center devoted to the study of violence and the pursuit of non-violence. The center's community consists of the John Jay College, The Graduate School, and the City University of New York's faculty and students, writers, artists, and other concerned professionals from many fields. All of its programs are free and open to the public. The center has formed an ever-widening scholarly and professional community. The center believes that knowledge and intellectual growth emerge from disciplined, reflective, critical, and collaborative inquiry. The Center seeks to increase and deepen public knowledge around issues of violence and human survival in the 20th century.

Active Voices

A team of researchers from Cultural Survival proposes to collaborate with indigenous leaders in the analysis of information relating to indigenous peoples worldwide. This collaboration aims to identify the most critical issues that indigenous peoples currently face, and to propose a foundation for action to resolve them. This data will be obtained through Active Voices — an online research system that is currently in operation. Active Voices will enable a network of scholars to work closely with indigenous peoples in identifying and proposing solutions to the problems they face.

Long Term Plans for Non-violence

A Season for Non-violence - LA plans to undertake several long-term programs. The SNVLA Curriculum and Resource Package is available for all grade levels, as is in-service training for educators regarding application and tools. Voices of Vision – Non-violence Speaker/Workshop Series presents pioneers in various fields who are demonstrating the effectiveness of non-violent principles and strategies in those areas. It includes programs for the general public and workshops for professional audiences in each field. Non-violence Assessment Tools identifies non-violent of culture (behavior and attitudes); facilitates assessment of these elements in specific institutions (schools, families business, etc.), and provides referral and consulting services.

This project was established in 1993 as an NGO/CBO initiative to address the needs of the Maasai people in Tanzania. It serves a population of 500,000. The project promotes the pursuit human rights, especially the rights of indigenous groups.

The Container Recycling Institute (CRI) commits itself to providing information and technical assistance to those working to minimize beverage container waste around the world. More recycling and reusing can curb the rapid depletion of valuable resources and the corruption of native lands associated with mining.

The 5H Program and the Rural Youth Leadership Program

The program's five main priorities are Homes, Hygiene, Health, Human Values, and Harmony in Diversity. Currently, it is focused on social and community development in rural areas of developing countries.

The objectives of this program are to train a corps of volunteer service leaders to deliver the 5H program in villages throughout India, to dramatically expand community outreach, and to assist at-risk youth. The program begins with a four-month "Train the Trainer" program with carefully selected youths from disadvantaged backgrounds who represent various regions in India. The volunteers receive intensive training about 5H service projects, including health, hygiene, and life-skills education. Much emphasis is placed on human values, cross-cultural exchange, and an appreciation of diverse religious and spiritual backgrounds. Upon completion of the training, each youth reaches out to a minimum of ten villages in his or her region every year, initiating 5H programs that in turn reach 800-1200 people in every village. In a span of three years, these young service leaders will have touched between 10-14 million lives. These dedicated youth receive ongoing support, quidance and assistance from a network of experienced resource persons from the International Association for Human Values and its partner organizations.

Action for Peace — Disque Denuncia

As part of Viva Rio's strategy to empower citizens with the means to fight for their rights and care for their city, Viva Rio was instrumental in the setting up of Rio de Janeiro's crime watch hotline, called 'Disque Denuncia". An anonymous toll-free number linked to police squads, the hotline receives calls from citizens who report on crimes and kidnappings, and thus helps the police to carry out their work. Aside from helping to solve hundreds of cases per year, the hotline has also contributed to breaking the law of silence in the city and ending the cycle of fear among witnesses of crimes.

Human Kindness Foundation — Prison Ashram Project

In 1973, the founders developed a strategy to help prisoners use their prisons as ashrams if they were tired of seeing themselves as convicts just biding their time until they were released. The primary purpose of the project is to inspire and encourage prisoners and prison staff to recognize their value as human beings, and to act accordingly. The project posits that people's inmost nature is divine, and that the nature of our lives is an incomprehensibly wonderful mystery in which each human being can experience solitude and silence. Prisoners have opportunity to dedicate themselves to the inward journey without the distractions and luxuries which occupy many people in the "free world." The project is now in the United Kingdom, and is described in a book, We're All Doing Time, by Bo Lozoff, its founder. The book has been translated into several languages in Europe, and is available for free to prisoners.

Global Awareness Campaign

The Kashi Foundation will sponsor a campaign using 21st century media and grassroots education to raise awareness about racism, bigotry, and prejudice. This campaign will be in the form of public service announcements, online broadcasting, the internet, proactive documents and global interaction. The first phase of the campaign, already in production, is the Statement of Conscience regarding the Global HIV/AIDS Pandemic. Religious leaders and people of all faith traditions (among the first to sign were His Holiness the Dalai Lama and Desmond Tutu) will sign this document initiated by Ma Jaya Sati Bhagavati, and Cleve Jones, (founder of the Names Project). The Statement asks for people of all faiths to reach out and care for people living with AIDS that are fully deserving of love, compassion, care, and human dignity. The second phase of the project will be a series of public service announcement videos of youth speaking out to the world about the critical issues that are facing the human society today.

Educational Movement Toward the Dignity of the Poor

Serviço de Educação and Organização Popular serves twenty socially-excluded communities in the Greater Rio area through popular educators and community agents. The movement works to assist, educate, and organize children and women in kindergartens and social centers, fostering their cultural manifestations and involving them in environmentally sustainable production. The organization is financed by international solidarity, and maintains the Peace International House as a place for discussion of global issues, and offers an opportunity for popular diplomacy. They also publish a weekly tabloid, *Journal Popular*, a monthly in-house newsletter, *Terra Azul*, and a bi-annual magazine, *Poema Pedagógico*.

Stop the War Against the Poor Campaign

Composed of people of faith and conscience, Witness for Peace is called to speak out against economic wars in Central America and the Caribbean. Stop the War Against the Poor Campaign issues a call in response to the violent effects of the policies and practices of the US government, international financial institutions (like the World Bank and the IMF), and multinational corporations. Every month, the National Office of Witness for Peace in the U.S. puts out a Call-a-Week bulletin which includes background information on selected issues, talking points, and contact information. Everyone can join to raise their voices in protest.

America's Shadow Struggle: Native American Religious Freedom

America's Shadow Struggle combines video documentaries, nonfiction books, and a symposia at the 1999 Parliament of the World's Religions to shed some light on the rarely reported religious persecution of the Indigenous peoples of the United States. Featuring dialogues between the renowned Religious Studies Professor Huston Smith and eight eloquent Native American leaders, this effort seeks to foster respect for ancient religious traditions and to envision a world free of religious persecution for the next millennium.

Shelter from Hate Project

The Shelter from Hate Project grew from the participation of the Spirit of the Lake United Church's delegation at the World Council of Churches gathering in Harare, Zimbabwe in 1998. The project advocates for Christian churches to celebrate "Shelter From Hate Sunday" the first Sunday of every October. The Church has a worldwide website offering education, worship suggestions, and links to other relevant sites on hate crime of all kinds.

Campaign for Secure Dwellings (CSD)

The CSD, in cooperation with Israeli peace groups and Palestinians, calls on people of faith to actively advocate an end to Israel's home demolition policy. Fifty Palestinian families whose homes and lands are targeted for destruction are linked with sixty-three families, peace groups, and congregations in North America. This campaign is spearheaded by Christian Peacemaker Teams (CPT), a program of active peacemaking supported by Mennonite and Brethren congregations and Friends meetings. The CSD project is in cooperation with the Israeli Committee Against Home Demolitions and the Hebron Land Defense Committee. CPT has had a presence in Hebron since June, 1995 at the invitation of Hebron's mayor.

When Racism Becomes Law

A two-part exhibition: one covers Anne Frank and the Holocaust, the other the Apartheid era. The programme for young people presents the lives of Anne Frank and Nelson Mandela and examines how they were influenced when racism became law. The programme began just after the '94 South African elections and has been used throughout KZN - from Newcastle to Port Shepstons. It promotes human rights, democracy, decision-making and voter education.

Association for the Promotion of Batwa Women

The Batwa women need to be made aware of their rights and how to defend and apply them. To this end, The Association for the Promotion of Batwa Women was created in 1997 by a group of 10 women. Currently, the association has 54 associations in 6 parts of the country.

Prison and Literacy Programs

The goal of the Prison and Literacy Projects is to promote health and personal responsibility for physical, mental, and spiritual health in order to increase selfunderstanding and self-acceptance. These projects focus on developing libraries within prisons and lower-income communities, establishing healing relationships with inmates, and bringing needed information and supplies to prisons and lower-income communities. With the support of the Sufi Women Organization, the Prison and Literacy Projects will begin a Breast Cancer Awareness Program for female inmates. The program will also include a series of workshops to teach inmates about breast cancer and self-exams. In addition, the programs will gather relevant medical information and disseminate it among inmates and prison officials.

Action for Peace — Viva

Viva is a self-help network for victims of violence in the city of Rio de Janeiro, and aims to provide moral support to victims by offering guidance and counseling following a traumatic experience. Thirteen centers throughout the city of Rio de Janeiro are currently operating, where trained staff attend to the needs of the victims and their families, enabling them to talk about their experiences and to find concerted means of action to combat the wave of crime and violence in the city.

Education for Life — A Behavior Change Process

Education for Life – A Behavior Change Process teaches life skills throughout Africa, with a particular focus on the AIDS epidemic. This project emphasizes spirituality and education as key to curbing the AIDS issue. This project has been running successfully in Uganda, Kenya, Tanzania, Zambia, Zimbabwe and the Republic of South Africa.

The Interfaith Call for Universal Religious Freedom and Freedom of Worship in Tibet

A new worldwide interfaith event has been created which offers a forum and a vehicle for faith traditions to worship together while standing up for religious freedom. Since its inception, houses of worship around the world have been incorporating the Interfaith Call for Universal Religious Freedom and a call for Freedom of Worship in Tibet into their regular services. In the first two years (1998-99), well over one thousand houses of worship around the world participated. In this world observance, religious leaders offered prayers, meditations, and sermons. A valuable byproduct of the Interfaith Call has been the creation of a new network of spiritual leaders who are willing to take a common stand on issues of religious freedom and human rights.

The Names Project AIDS Memorial Quilt

The AIDS Memorial Quilt is a powerful emotional and spiritual reminder of the enormity of the AIDS Pandemic. The AIDS Memorial Quilt was conceived by Cleve Jones, who founded the NAMES Project, and has been brought to the Parliament by Ma Jaya Bhagavati and the River Fund. The experience of the Quilt provides a creative means for remembrance and healing, and engenders a call to remember and to serve. South Africa is among one of the nations hardest hit by the disease with 11% of the total population of 42 million estimated to be infected. 80% of world's AIDS deaths are on the continent of Africa and 8 million children are orphaned as a result. The Quilt, like the Parliament, is a tapestry that connects us to one another and transcends all boundaries. A presentation of the Quilt at the Parliament will coincide with World AIDS Day and AIDS Awareness Week Dec. 1-8, 1999.

International Code of Conduct — Year 2000 Campaign

The International Code of Conduct on Arms Transfers is a collaborative effort of The Commission of Nobel Peace Laureates together with arms trade specialists at BASIC, Safer World, Demilitarization for Democracy, the Council on Economic Priorities, and Amnesty International. Dr. Oscar Arias founded the Year 2000 Campaign with the goal to promote mutual, dramatic reductions in military spending and redirect the savings to human development. The campaign upholds that Governments must implement and defend internationally recognized standards of democracy, human rights and peaceful international relations.

Viva Rio — Citizen's Counter

Since December 1997, Viva Rio's human rights project provides free legal assistance and conflict mediation in nine shanty-towns of Rio de Janeiro. Thousands of citizens have benefited from the legal guidance provided at the Citizens Counters, which restore confidence in the legal system and create a culture of non-violence in the conflict-ridden communities of Rio de Janeiro's shanty-towns.

Millennium People's Assembly Network (MPAN) is a group of individuals and organizations from around the world who have long advocated a global and Permanent Global People's Assembly. Affiliated with the United Nations, the Network addresses the basic human needs which cross all political boundaries, and works to ensure the freedoms and rights listed in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights for everyone. The First Global Millennium People's Assembly will be held at the Capital City of Samoa on April 3 - 8 of 2000. Civic society and all the people of the world are invited to the inaugural sessions to explore issues and options for representation of all people.

Healthy Democracy: Citizen Voices in Public Policy

In fifteen months, America Speaks engaged almost 50,000 citizens in interactive dialogue on Social Security reform in the United States. Using face-to-face dialogue and two-way interactive teleconferencing supplied by networked laptop computers, citizens came to agreement on critical issues working simultaneously in ten cities over two days. In total the project reached 11 million homes and influenced the U.S. Congress. America Speaks is currently planning for international dialogues on critical issues.
