By doing that we reduce our four Kashäya - Anger (Krodha), Ego (Mäna), Greed (Lobha), and Deceit (Mäyä), or at least not increase them.

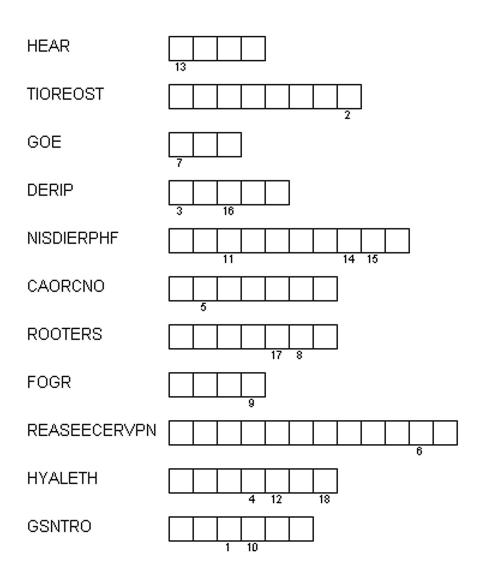

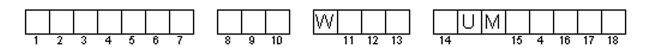

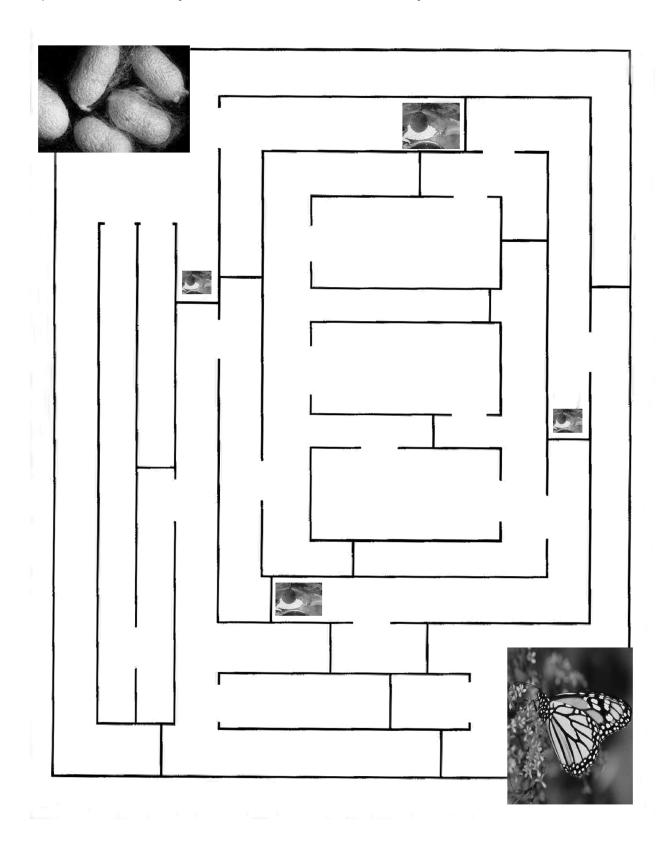
